TERMS OF REFERENCE

COUNCIL

Chairperson:	Her Worship the Mayor
Deputy Chairperson:	Deputy Mayor
Membership:	The Mayor and all Councillors
Meeting frequency:	Six weekly – or as required
Quorum:	Half of the members (including vacancies)

Purpose

- 1. To provide leadership to, and advocacy on behalf of, the people of the Waikato District.
- 2. To define and represent the total communities' interests, ensuring ongoing community and economic development, the effective stewardship of existing assets, sustainable management of the environment, and the prudent management of the communities' financial resources.

Terms of Reference

The Council's terms of reference include the following powers which cannot be delegated to committees, subcommittees, officers or any other subordinate decision-making body:

- 1. The power to make a rate.
- 2. The power to make a bylaw.
- 3. The power to borrow money, or purchase or dispose of assets, other than in accordance with the Long-Term Plan.
- 4. The power to adopt a Long-Term Plan, Annual Plan, or Annual Report.
- 5. The power to appoint a Chief Executive.
- 6. The power to adopt policies required to be adopted and consulted on under the Local Government Act 2002 in association with the Long-term Plan or developed for the purpose of the local governance statement, including the Council's Infrastructure Strategy.
- 7. The power to adopt a remuneration and employment policy.
- 8. The power to approve or amend the Council's Standing Orders.
- 9. The power to approve or amend the Code of Conduct for elected members, and consider any recommendations made in relation to a complaint lodged under the Code.
- 10. The power to appoint and discharge:
 - a. members (including chairpersons) of Council committees and subordinate decisionmaking bodies, subject to the Mayor's powers under section 41A Local Government Act 2002; and
 - b. elected member representatives on external organisations.
- 11. The power to establish a joint committee with another local authority or other public body and appoint elected members as representatives on such committees or bodies.

- 12. The power to make the final decision on a recommendation from the Ombudsman where it is proposed that Council not accept the Ombudsman's recommendation.
- 13. The power to approve or change the District Plan, or any part of that Plan, in accordance with the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 14. The power to amend or replace the delegations in Council's Delegations Register (except where expressly permitted in the Delegations Register).

To exercise the following powers and responsibilities of Council, which the Council chooses to retain:

- 1. To approve a proposed policy statement or plan under the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 2. To approve changes to boundaries of the District under the Resource Management Act 1991 or any other legislation.
- 3. In respect of District Plan decisions:
 - a. To appoint independent commissioners to a panel for hearings of a Proposed District Plan;
 - b. To approve the recommendation of hearings commissioners on a proposed plan, plan change or variation (including private plan change); and
 - c. To approve a proposed plan or a change to a district plan under Clause 17, Schedule 1 of the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 4. To adopt governance level strategies, plans and policies which advance Council's vision and strategic goals (e.g. Hamilton to Auckland rail), other than where expressly delegated to a committee.
- 5. To approve -Council's recommendation to the Remuneration Authority for the remuneration of elected members.
- 6. To approve the Triennial Agreement.
- 7. To approve resolutions required to be made by a local authority under the Local Electoral Act 2001, including the appointment of an electoral officer and reviewing representation arrangements.
- 8. To approve any changes to the nature and delegations of any Council committees or subordinate-decision making bodies.
- 9. To approve the Local Governance Statement.
- 10. To approve funding requests not allowed for within budgets, in accordance with Significance & Engagement Policy parameters.
- 11. To approve any additional funding decisions required for the Watercare Services contract.
- 12. To approve development agreements as recommended by the Development Agreements Subcommittee where infrastructure is not allowed for within the Long-Term Plan.
- 13. To receive six-monthly reports from each Community Board on its activities and projects.

1. Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

To enable the receiving and hearing of submissions on the proposed 2024/25 'enhanced' Annual Plan.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

In February 2024, Council resolved to take the option given by central government of preparing an 'enhanced' annual plan for the 2024/25 financial year (year four of the 2021-2031 LTP) and delay the 2024-2034 LTP by 12 months.

On 19 March 2024, the consultation document for the 2024/25 'enhanced' Annual Plan was adopted for consultation.

Public consultation took place between 25 March and 26 April 2024. A total of 227 submissions were received on the proposed annual plan.

The hearings pack consists of this report, the hearings schedule (Attachment 1 – subject to change), a copy of every formal submission received during the consultation period (Attachment 2), and social media engagement data and post comments (Attachment 3).

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

THAT the Waikato District Council receives and considers all verbal and written submissions to the proposed 2024/25 'enhanced' Annual Plan, draft Fees and Charges Schedule 2024/25, and draft Development Contributions Charges 2024/25.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

At its 28 February meeting, Council resolved to defer the LTP by 12 months and prepare an 'enhanced' annual plan for the 2024/25 financial year. This decision was taken by Council after the Water Services Acts Repeal Act 2024 ("the Repeal Act") was brought in by the current government, enabling councils to choose to defer the 2024-2034 Long Term Plan by 12 months.

The 'enhanced' 2024/25 Annual Plan consultation document was adopted for consultation on 19 March 2024.

5. Discussion and analysis Taataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

Public consultation was undertaken between 25 March and 26 April 2024 to get community feedback on the proposed 2024/25 work programme, including the proposed 13.75 per cent increase in general rate revenue.

Alongside this, feedback was also sought on the draft fees and charges schedule 2024/25, the draft development contributions charges 2024/25, and in anticipation of Council reviewing its levels of service for the 2025-2034 Long Term Plan, submitters were also asked if there were any Council services they wanted us to look at reducing.

Staff used the following communication methods to let the community know about the consultation:

- Media release.
- Council's Facebook page (five posts were put up during consultation period engagement data and post comments are in Attachment 3).
- Emails and a communications toolkit to elected members to cascade information to their networks.
- A video was produced and put up on YouTube, with a link to it in Council's newsletter¹. The video was also included in one of the Facebook posts².
- Some staff members were provided with communications to cascade to their networks (e.g. within the business community).
- A flyer drop to 27,533 letterboxes across the district (including residential, commercial and rural) during the week of 25 March.

Drop-in sessions attended by staff and elected members, were held in 18 different locations around the district. There were 212 attendees in total across these 18 events – Pookeno had the highest attendance with 34 people, while the event at Te Aakau did not have anybody attend.

Submissions

Shape Waikato is Council's main portal for engagement with the community. The 2024/25 Annual Plan page on Shape Waikato received 4,434 views and 2,740 individual visitors. In total, Council received 227 formal submissions. 50 submitters requested to be heard although this number is likely to reduce as hearings scheduling progresses.

Some submissions were received via email to the Consult inbox, and some hard copies were received. All email and hard copy submissions were entered into Shape by staff, with the original included as an attachment (hard copies were scanned).

As noted above, Facebook comments on the five posts about the Annual Plan are included in Attachment 3. These are not considered formal submissions but are included for elected members to consider as part of the broader picture of community views.

Submission themes on the annual plan

The purpose of the hearings is for the Mayor and Councillors to hear directly from submitters and to receive all submissions in full. It is not until the deliberations (scheduled for 4-6 June) when discussions, debate and decisions occur.

It is, however, helpful to note the general themes of the submissions, so that elected members have some context for the hearings and have an overview of the type of feedback that has been received.

The majority of submitters (156 out of 226) commented on the proposed 13.75 per cent rates increase, with the vast majority of these (149 out of 155) opposing the increase.

Themes in their responses were generally around unaffordability of rates due to the cost of living/financial stress, particularly for families and those on fixed incomes, dissatisfaction with services being provided as is, wanting Council to focus only on absolutely essential spending with no "nice to haves" and reduce or delay as much as possible, and a concern that the increase is significantly higher than inflation.

For those who supported the increase, there were general comments around understanding the reasons behind it and not wanting to further delay infrastructure maintenance and renewals. There were also comments around expanding the rates remission scheme to support those who would struggle to pay.

Some other themes coming through around the 2024/25 work programme were requests to get roads and stormwater systems fixed, limit spending on outdoor spaces, requests to reinstate funding for Hamilton and Waikato Tourism, and dissatisfaction with how rubbish and recycling are funded.

Analysis and staff comments around these themes and more will be provided in the deliberations material, for discussion and decision making at the deliberations meetings from 4-6 June.

Development contributions and fees and charges submissions

Alongside feedback about the 2024/25 work programme and budget, we also consulted on the draft development contributions charges for 2024/25 and the draft fees and charges schedule for 2024/25. While there were questions related to each of these, staff note that many of the responses in these fields were unrelated to development contributions or fees and charges, and were often related to the rates increase or the general work programme. A breakdown of feedback received specifically about development contributions and fees and charges will be brought to deliberations.

Review of council services for the LTP

A specific question was also asked on the submission form about whether submitters had any thoughts around services Council could look into reducing in the LTP. A summary of these suggestions will also be included in deliberations material, and will be utilised by the LTP project team in the coming year as levels of service are reviewed.

5.1 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

There are no material financial considerations associated with the recommendations of this report. If there are financial considerations to be made in response to submissions received these will be outlined in the deliberations reports, which will be presented to Council on the 4-6 June 2024.

5.2 Legal considerations

Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

Staff confirm that the staff recommendation complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements.

Council resolved to prepare an 'enhanced' annual plan for the 2024/25 financial year under the provisions of the Water Services Acts Repeal Act (the Repeal Act), and defer the 2024-2034 LTP by 12 months.

Consultation using the special consultative procedure is required for the 'enhanced' annual plan, and staff confirm this has been undertaken in line with the requirements under section 83 of the Local Government Act 2002.

The 2021-2031 LTP will continue to have effect until the 2025-2034 LTP is adopted.

5.3 Strategy and policy considerations



The Hauraki Rail Trail Charitable Trust appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Waikato District Council's Enhanced Annual Plan regarding the proposed funding cuts to Hamilton Waikato Tourism. We do not support the proposed reduction in funding and ask for funding to be reinstated at or above its current levels.

The Hauraki Rail Trail Charitable Trust's (the Trust) purpose is to provide benefits to the communities within the Region by operating, maintaining, repairing, developing and facilitating the use and enjoyment of the Cycleway, branded as the Hauraki Rail Trail. The Hauraki Rail Trail is one of 23 Great Rides in the Nga Haerenga Great Rides of New Zealand Network. The 160km long trail traverses from Kaiaua in the north to Matamata in the south. Our Trail sits at the North Eastern side of the large Waikato area and is actively promoted by Hamilton Waikato Tourism, which is the basis on this submission to you.


The Hauraki Rail Trail delivers economic benefit to the Regions valuing at over \$30 million per annum, (data extracted from Get Smart Survey analysis, and trip evaluation numbers by Jonathan Kennett/Marilyn Northcotte. In addition, MartinJenkins has evaluated the Trail to provide \$4milllion in health-related benefits each year. These figures do not include the extensive investment made by businesses alongside the Trail, or providers that supply maintenance services and/or other.



Hauraki Rail Economic Benefit based on Trip Numbers

Hamilton Waikato Tourism (HWT) offers valuable marketing services to the Hauraki Rail Trail Charitable Trust. A key role of HWT is the attraction of domestic and international visitors and increase length of stay and expenditure through effective destination marketing, development, and management activity. As such their services are an absolute necessity to ensure that economic benefit continues to flow to our region.

As per the diagram below, visitors to our region are a positive influence on the region's ability to attract investment in other sectors.



We understand that the draft LTP for Waikato District Council is proposing a 50% reduction in funding commitment to this organisation. We do not support this option. We firmly believe that HWT has been delivering strong economic benefit to our region, which is reflected in the economic value that we have been able to demonstrate above.

Visitors who decide to come to New Zealand, or New Zealanders who travel, have choices, and the work that HWT does is vital in ensuring we are still relevant and seen, in the marketplace. If you diminish our visibility in the international marketplace by not adequately funding the activities of HWT, we will lose market share. We will start to see a degradation of the high returns that cycle tourism is offering our region, as visitors move south to where the marketing voice remains strong. This cannot be allowed to happen.

The Hauraki Rail Trail actively works with HWT to invest in promotional materials and collaboration opportunities within the central North Island (ECNI) marketing collective to give ourselves a louder voice. We need to remain visible. We need to retain and grow our market share in an increasingly competitive space.

Less investment in this organisation means less for everyone. You do not have to be a direct tourism operator to benefit from the economic returns that tourism brings to our regions.

We ask that you reconsider your position to that of support to maintain or increase investment in this organisation.

I always used to quote "a senior citizen on a single income (pension) living in a house in one of our urban towns" and I would suggest that the rating increase that you are looking at this year is going to make life incredibly difficult for those people. I can completely understand some of the reasons for the increases, as your biggest enemy at the moment is inflation, and I have always said you must look after what you have before you start looking at what you would like to have. In closing I have spoken to a number of elderly people in recent months who have approached me around these issues and there is serious concern around how they will live and pay their rates as well.

This Hall was built back in the 1950's and was solely funded by the community at the time as my father and grandfather were heavily involved in that process of fundraising and building it.

Nothing in your plan indicate anything about public transport for the region even though you are planning over \$41millions for roading. You plan to spend over \$20million on sustainable community and over \$2million on sustainable environment while you have nothing for public transport. From Tuakau to Auckland, there is no reliable public transport that will cater for the those who work in Auckland. We have no choice but to use our cars. That is not sustainable to the environment and that is not sustainable to the community given the cost of fuels, and give no choice to residents in Tuakau and Pokeno but to use cars. The majority of people live in Pokeno, Tuakau, and north Waikato area work in Auckland and we are paying high rates compare to families in Auckland with properties that are higher than ours. Rates increase you are proposing of over 13% on top of the expensive rates we already paid shows the greedy in the council given the quality of services we have with reliable public transport. The roads in Tuakau are the worse and they contributed to some vehicle issues we have according to our mechanics. As a rate payer, reliable public transport must be on this plan. Waikato is the closest city to the biggest city in New Zealand (Auckland) with most of our rate payers are employed. We will never leave NZ without going to Auckland Airport because Hamilton Airport is not an International Airport anymore. Having a reliable public transport including trains and buses that connect with the Auckland transport will ease the burden on our main infrastructure including roads.

The lack of reliable public transport in our district simply contributed to the effect of climate change through our burning of fuels when we used our cars. We have no choices when we go to places including schools for kids and works for adults because public transport is none.

Q2 Do you have any comments on our draft development contributions charges for 2024/25? Your \$3 wheelie bin sticker should be removed. Historically, rate payers paid this cost through our expensive rates. Conversation I have with work colleagues in Auckland shows Waikato Council is making easy things hard by implementing this \$3 sticker to empty your rubbish bins. The economic expenses to the rate payer is not just \$3 because you have to go to the shop to buy them, and that trip to the shop will cost fuel.So that is an environment cost for buying fuels as well as the time cost. And no one will spend \$36 for 12 x sticker when they go shopping for food because that is a cost of a weekly meal for some families. So they normally buy 1 or 2, and then rush to the shop to buy some more when they need them

Can I also add, families are now put their bins on the road either once or twice a month. If that bin will have some food left overs, the smell is so unhealthy if they will wait for once a month to be emptied to save costs. Therefore, the council is allowing unhealthy and unhygienic practice that are detriment to health and safety including the health and safety of those who collect the rubbish. This rubbish sticker also gave the rubbish collectors no choice by to operate in a way that they have to get out of the truck to check the sticker, remove the sticker and empty the bin. The council is encouraging unhealthy and unsafe work practise because these drivers will physically get out in the rain and do that. So what is the point of have an automated truck to pick and dump the rubbish if the driver manually get out to check the sticker? Because of this, I notice that the

collection of rubbish in Tuakau takes more than 2 days instead of one day. That is an economic and environmental cost for time and fuel usage. I though we are smarter than this.

The solution should be, add \$20 to the rates and that is for the rubbish collection. Some families only takes out their rubbish twice a month based on the number of people in their household and that will be the saving for the council. Using the stickers is not economical, nor its environmentally friendly, instead it is an unsafe working practise. Imagine if our young people who protest climate change few weeks ago have an understanding about this Waikato Council practise. They will make some noise we do not want. reconsider or remove it.

Q3 Do you have any comments on our draft fees and charges for 2024/25?

The rate increase is ridiculously expensive. The council should be looking at wage cuts if not cutting staff.

For the automatic payment of our rates, the council should never dictate how much people can pay automatically based on the annual rates. What the council can do is encourage rate payer to pay what they can afford on direct debit/automatic payment, and the balance to be paid off on due dates. Rates is an unavoidable costs but the council can make it easily affordable if rate payers can set up direct debit of (.e.g) \$20, \$30, \$40 or whatever amount they can afford weekly to ease or make the balance looks smaller when its due. It is about helping our people how to manage finance in these difficult circumstances. Having the council calculate the direct debit amount based on the annual rates question the financial integrity of the council with these repayment. Especially when it comes to people have their direct debit put their balance in credit before the due date. That advance balance in the rate is considered an asset to the rate payer and a liability to the council. But the council is receiving interest from it because it sit in their bank account. It can be a case of why does the council impose a late fees for late payments of rates, but their are not paying rate payers with credit balance in their account for money that they are not due as yet or in order words they are liability to the council or the council owed to rate payer(s)? Some rate payers might end up taking the council to court to clarify debts (when rate payers rates are due) in contrast to money received by the council in advance (liability to councils) when rate payers paid their rates under direct debit.



WRC warned WDC prior to consenting the subdivision that flooding would be an issue however, WDC approved it anyway, and then issued permits for us to build in this location.

Over a 12 month period we had upwards of 17 occurrences where our properties were flooded for days. Numerous times we have had councils with pumps, civil defence, the fire brigade pumping water etc, this is a waste of community resources.

An independent report has been completed; we know what the issue is. This now need to be prioritised by both councils and fixed urgently.

This has caused a lot of stress and mental health issues for the families in our area, and we need the councils to take action.

Dear Waikato District Council,

We are writing to provide comment on your Draft 2024/25 Annual Plan and next year's Long Term Plan 2025-35. It is vital that Waikato District Council implements an Enhanced Annual Plan that is financially responsible whilst continuing to invest in the critical services that the Waikato needs. As you may know, Property Council is the leading not-for-profit advocate for New Zealand's most significant industry, property. Property is the second largest industry in the Waikato, with property providing a direct contribution to GDP of \$2.8 billion (12 per cent) and employment for 18,030 Waikato residents. We connect property professionals and represent the interests of 94 Waikato based member companies across the private, public, and charitable sectors.

Property Council sympathises with the financial situation facing Waikato District Council and acknowledges that there is upward pressure on rates or debt. We appreciate that there is regulatory uncertainty around initiatives such as 'Local Water Done Well' and transport funding. As such, Property Council is comfortable with the decision to pursue an Enhanced Annual Plan for 2024/25.

We are also pleased to see that Waikato District Council has proposed a responsible approach to development contributions for 2024/25, that helps ensure stability for the property sector and supports continued development of new housing supply across the Waikato.

When it comes to the development of next year's Long Term Plan 2025-35, Property Council strongly supports Waikato District Council making use of alternative funding and financing tools. Example of these include such as targeted rates, public-private-partnerships, or Special Purpose Vehicles ("SPVs") as enabled under the Infrastructure Funding and Financing Act.

For example, SPVs are an important tool for funding and financing infrastructure in a fair and equitable manner. SPVs are advantageous as they sit off a Council's balance sheet and do not impact debt levels. Property Council has previously supported Tauranga City Council's use of SPVs for the Transport System Plan and Civic Precinct project, as well Wellington City Council's use of SPVs for the Moa Point sludge minimisation project.

There is a critical and ongoing role for central government in helping fund new infrastructure. With the recent change in Government, there is increasing growing discussion regarding City and Regional Deals between central and local government that could unlock funding and create certainty for future infrastructure investment. We recommend exploring a City and Regional Deal for the Waikato region, to help unlock new funding for infrastructure (such as for water or transportation).

Enhanced Annual Plan Waikato District Council Ngaruawahia

Tēnā koutou katoa

Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) provides this submission to encourage Waikato District Council to reconsider funding levels for the Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO) for the 2024-25 Enhanced Annual Plan and retain at the current level.

HWT is the Regional Tourism Organisation for Waikato district; along with neighboring districts of Hamilton city, Waipā, Ōtorohanga, Waitomo and Matamata-Piako. Despite this size and growth, recent research confirmed total combined funding for Hamilton & Waikato Tourism from our six partnering councils is significantly lower when compared to the other 30 Regional Tourism Organisations throughout the country. Per capita, the funding we receive through Service Level Agreements places us 28th out of the 31 RTOs.

While there is strong case and evidence to support a request for additional funding, we are not seeking any funding increase in this LTP, despite the fact our buying power has been severely impacted by rising costs over the last three years.

Tourism is very important for the region and Waikato district, with visitors contributing \$266million to the Waikato economy for the year to October 2023 – \$43million of this is from international visitors, and \$223million from domestic visitors. This is \$729,000 of new money injected into your communities each day.

HWT's current funding amounts to only 0.04% of Waikato district's budget. However, the proposed funding cut of \$75,000 of HWT's annual revenue will inevitably result in lost tourism revenue to Waikato district.

Hamilton & Waikato Tourism's role is to grow tourism revenue through attracting more visitors to Waikato district and the mighty Waikato who stay longer and spend more. We do this by raising awareness, changing perceptions and building demand in target markets. We aim to attract domestic and international visitors and increase their length of stay and expenditure through effective destination marketing, development, and management activity.

Hamilton & Waikato Tourism promotes Waikato district and the mighty Waikato region, and the tourism businesses within it, as a preferred destination for domestic and international business, events and leisure travellers and provides leadership in regional product and event development, investment, and sector capability.

As passionate ambassadors of Waikato and the region, Hamilton & Waikato Tourism aims to ensure visitors are aware of and enjoy the wide variety of experiences and places on offer, in turn contributing to economic, social, environmental and cultural benefits for the community.

There is clear value and benefit from collaborating with neighbouring districts. Waikato and each district need each other to leverage the diverse visitor experiences and services to offer a compelling visitor experience. Partnering with HWT is proven to be a strong collaboration model ensuring the city and region are represented efficiently and effectively.

Working under a private-public partnership model, funding from partner councils enables HWT to undertake core activities including regional product development, sector capability building and the promotion of the region to leisure and Business Events visitors, media and the travel trade. When a project is appropriate, we work alongside and collaboratively with other regional entities: Te Waka, Creative Waikato, Waikato Screen, etc.

Tourism has the ability to actively benefit the community across the four wellbeing pillars – social, environmental, cultural and economic. Also increasing the profile of Waikato through HWT's activities and channels is not only good for visitors – it is an important attractor for people who may want to invest and live in our city.

Supporting the sustainability of our visitor economy is not a luxury; it's a necessity. The region cannot afford to lose visitor spend. We know with the right messaging, marketing, and mahi, tourism is an industry that adds value to the city, region and communities. If we take our foot off the accelerator now, long term damage will be done, and it will take more money and a very long time to catch up lost ground.

We need our regional and local leaders to understand and acknowledge the contribution of tourism to Waikato and the region, and to recognise attracting visitors is a sound investment of ratepayer dollars. If funding is reduced, we will not be able to offer the level and breadth of current services. Cuts will be inevitable, which will result in less tourism revenue, less employment and a less prosperous Waikato. At the very least, we request our current funding to remain unchanged to be able to stay competitive with other regions in New Zealand.

The HWT Board and HWT Shareholder are clear the current proposed 50% reduction in funding will result in significantly less services from HWT, resulting in materially less tourism revenue into Waikato district.

Therefore, the recommendation in our submission is to reinstate funding to the level of the last three years so Waikato district's tourism offer is able to be maintained at a compelling and competitive level.

On behalf of the board and management of HWT, we thank you for your consideration and urge reconsideration of the Enhanced Annual Plan budget for HWT.

Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) is the official tourism organisation for the Waikato region. Our role is to attract domestic and international visitors and increase the length of stay and expenditure through effective destination marketing, development, and management activity. HWT promotes the Waikato as a preferred destination for domestic and international business, events and leisure travellers and provides leadership in regional product and event development, investment, and sector capability. As passionate ambassadors of the region, HWT aims to ensure visitors enjoy the wide variety of experiences and places throughout the mighty Waikato, in turn contributing to economic, social, environmental and cultural benefits for the community.

HWT is funded through a public/private partnership with the region's tourism industry and six local authorities including Waikato, Hamilton city, Matamata-Piako, Ōtorohanga, Waipā and Waitomo. Funding is provided for services agreed to within a signed Service Level Agreement. This submission is made to the Enhanced Annual Plan to continue current funding through to 2035.



Our request

Waikato District City Council EAP indicates 50% reduction in funding. Any reduction in funding will directly impact deliverables and service

Economic development, grants and donations

From the 2024/25 financial year onwards, Walkato District Council is proposing to remove the funding it provides to Te Waka (Walkato's regional economic development agency) and reduce annual funding to Hamilton Walkato Tourism from \$150,000 in the 2021-2031 LTP to \$75,000 per annum. Existing internal staff will continue to provide support in this area.

delivery. Reduction in funding directly impacts the services we are able to provide to the visitor sector. Less resources = less services. Less services will inevitably lead to less visitors. Less visitors equals less visitor spend in our communities. This will impact communities across Waikato district and the mighty Waikato.

In the 12 months ended October 2023 visitors spent \$1.9billion in our region; of this \$266 million in Waikato district alone. This equates to \$729,000 new money being spent in your district each day. This is at risk should the RTO be unviable, or activities seriously diluted. By making the decision to shave just \$75,000 from your budget, a small percentage of your operating expenses but substantive in our budget, you put visitor expenditure in Waikato district at risk. While we acknowledge the council finances need addressing and 'tough decisions' need to be made, our submission to Waikato District Council urges reconsideration of funding allocation to the Service Level Agreement with Hamilton & Waikato Tourism. The HWT Board is clear the current proposed 50% reduction in funding will materially reduce the services we provide.

From past experience when the region had no RTO, tourism revenues were badly affected. The HWT board will endeavour to do all we can to keep some level of presence, however we will be less effective with any reduction in funding, let alone a 50% cut. The amount in the draft EAP budget of \$75,000 is less than Waikato's original contribution to the RTO when we were re-established in 2011 – the contribution from Waikato at that time was \$100,000 per annum.



Introduction

- 1. Tourism Waikato was disestablished in 2006 when Hamilton City Council withdrew funding to secure the V8 Supercar event. This resulted in a significant decline in domestic and international visitor expenditure, a drop in overnight stays, lack of national and international tourism profile and destination marketing.
- 2. Hamilton & Waikato was re-established 1 July 2011. HWT is the Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO) for the mighty Waikato region. The core purpose of HWT is to promote the region as an appealing destination to international and domestic visitors in order to generate economic benefits for the region and its communities.
- 3. We understand the economic climate is tough and councils need to make savings in operating expenses. We therefore avoided requesting additional or increased funding. If funding can be maintained at current levels we will need to reduce some activity, given the impact of inflation on costs over the last three years, but overall, we believe we can be an active and effective RTO.
- We understand savings need to be made. However, given the current funding amount for HWT is just 0.04% of the overall council budget the saving the proposed cut provides has minimal impact on Waikato District Council's operating expenses but a very large impact on HWT's viability. We propose the current reductions in the LTP are

Value of Tourism to Waikato district

- 10. Visitors spent over \$266 million in Waikato YE October 2024 \$43 million from international manuhiri and \$223 million from New Zealanders.
- 11. During 2023, 218,800 guest nights were enjoyed in commercial accommodation occupancy rate of 43%.
- 12. The HWT team have provided support and expertise to many operators in the Waikato district over the last few years. Of particular note, Cyclone Gabrielle

recovery funding from Government excluded the Waikato region until our team provided evidence to the MBIE Tourism team – our operators were then able to apply for funding; many were successful.

- 13. Raglan has been identified 'emerging hero' experience in the region and been promoted as such. We work with many Raglan operators and providers of Waikato produce as corporate gifts, ie: Raglan Chocolate and West Coast Pottery.
- 14. Specific guidance and assistance has been provided to new and developing operators in Waikato, recently specifically Rangiriri Paa, Te Puna Wai Tours, Te Karaka Lodge, Pookeno Whisky, Rally Drive NZ, Tata Valley.

What residents say

- 15. Research carried out surveyed what our residents consider to be the benefits of tourism, and the challenges tourism brings to their community. 85% of our residents acknowledge they experience benefits from tourism, including more businesses, more employment, inspiration to travel domestically, and a greater variety of goods/services available.
- 16. Waikato residents identified the key benefits of tourism of greater opportunities for employment and more local businesses opening or being able to stay open.

Comparative funding for other RTOs


- 17. Research conducted comparing funding to each of New Zealand's RTOs by population indicate we are 28th out of the 31 RTOs, at our current funding levels. While we do all we can, it is a fact we compete with the other 30 RTOs for visitors, especially domestic visitors, and even on current funding we are pushing uphill. The proposed funding cut strongly suggests Waikato district does not value the tourism dollar relative to other NZ districts.
- 18. Regional Tourism Organisations compete for visitors, events and conferences. If HWT is not funded appropriately, we will not be able to remain competitive in the NZ tourism sector.

Result of reduced funding

19. Payment towards HWT activity is by way of Service Level Agreement, ie: HWT provides a service for our six council. This is not a grant nor a handout. The RTO delivery these services on behalf of the partnering council. Without sufficient payment to conduct these services each council will need to have plans to deliver a number of these specialist tasks in-house or forgo them completely.

- 20. The reduction by Waikato District Council of \$75,000 is a small percentage of your budget, 0.4%. However, this represents sizable impact in our budget.
- 21. With other partnering councils also reducing by significant amounts, the current proposals have the potential to result in an approximate 40% reduction of budget. This will massively weaken the competitiveness of the RTO and our effectiveness.
- 22. Reduced council contributions will result in areas of work being reduced and some areas being removed from our activities and deliverables. We have a team of eight FTE staff who are subject experts, with experience and expertise in the visitor sector. Current proposed reduced funding means we will be forced to reduce staff.
- 23. When changes affect the visitor market, the RTO is there to provide expertise, support and guidance. This could be with negative incidents, ie: global pandemic, cyclone damage; or with positive changes, ie: new hotel development, investment and if/when international flights return to Hamilton Airport; or assisting maximising the impact of significant events, ie: FIFA Women's World Cup. A well-resourced RTO is here to support the sector through these times. Current proposed funding means the RTO would not be resourced sufficiently to assist during these times.
- 24. As Waikato Regional Airport Limited (WRAL) is HWTs shareholder, the WRAL board will make the ultimate decision on whether the organisation and work is viable to continue or disband the RTO function.

Conclusion

- 25. HWT thanks Waikato District Council for its support over the past 12 years.
- 26. Looking forward, the region needs tourism growth to increase the prosperity and living standards of its people. We can only do this by continuing a collaborative and long-term strategic approach, led by an appropriately funded and resourced Hamilton & Waikato Tourism.
- 27. Reduced funding will result in reduced services from HWT, with significant negative impacts on the sector and community.
- 28. HWT would like to request to speak to this submission at the LTPs hearings. The HWT Board will represent the organisation at the Hearing. Please accept apologies from Nicola Greenwell the Hearing date means she is unable to attend in person and hopes to be able join virtually.




Appendix – quick facts, data and insights

Visitors contribute \$266 million to Waikato's economy – a return of \$1,773 for each dollar contributed by Waikato council to HWT's work. While no concise measure to indicate how much of this is due to the RTO's work – if we assume as low as 3% - our activity directly contributes \$8 million. (Source: <u>MBIE Monthly Regional Tourism Estimates</u>)

Waikato's **population of 90,100** contributes **\$1.66 per person** towards HWT's activities. With the proposed reduction, this would be just 83 cents!

We are the only RTO with six contributing councils (every other RTO has less than this). We have the 4th largest city in our region. We are a large region, and yet... our funding per person compared to other RTO's – we are 28th out of 31 RTOs. Overall, HWT receives \$3.44 per person across the region. 
Proposed funding across the six partnering councils results in a smaller budget than the initial budget when HWT was re-established in 2011

The abstract, often unseen, support provided by the HWT team:

- Cyclone Gabrielle Government provided Cyclone Recovery fund which omitted Hamilton and Waikato.
 HWT successfully advocated on behalf of the operators who suffered damage and had to close for weeks in order to repair such damage.
- Covid-19 Global Pandemic hours and hours of work supporting our sector navigate the new rules and government subsidies. Provided many webinars on cash flow management, business plans, resilience, digital activations and many more subjects. Instigated the "mighty Local" activations, providing information to our local community at the various 'alert' levels.

Waikato Tourism disbanded in 2006. There was no RTO in our region for 5 years. Visitation, guest nights, visitor



Long-term Plans 2024-2034 for Waikato Councils: TIA Submission

Tourism industry Aotearoa welcomes the opportunity to set out the importance of continued Council investment into the tourism-related functions carried out by Hamilton & Waikato Tourism.

Key feedback

TIA views tourism as being an enormously beneficial contributor to people and place. The tourism and hospitality industry is integral to our national identity; when it thrives, so does New Zealand. It brings economic diversity, resilience, generates jobs and fosters regional prosperity while showcasing our cultural richness and timeless experiences, fostering pride and social connectivity both locally and globally.

Across New Zealand, local government is under immense pressure. TIA recognises this pressure, and the difficult decisions Councils are tasked with making. Notwithstanding this, we submit that funding for core tourism activities by Councils is an investment in the economic health and future prosperity of the towns, cities and region of the Waikato, an investment that will generate a healthy return on investment (ROI).

It is our understanding that tourism functions of Hamilton & Waikato Tourism are signalled as reducing in the long-term planning processes of the six Councils.

Given what the international evidence base tells us, we believe it is important to treat Council spend in these tourism functions as an investment, and not a cost. This spend will generate a dividend in the form of increased economic activity, increased Council revenues, more and better jobs, and increased vibrancy across the city. During this period of slowing economic growth and increasing headwinds, enabling buoyant tourism activity is a logical and prudent step for Councils to take.

TIA recommends that:

Each of the six Councils who collaborate and partner with Hamilton & Waikato Tourism ensure that funding provision for the Service Level Agreement is retained and maintained in their Long-term Plans so that the wider Waikato region can accrue its return on investment in these tourism functions.

Tourism Industry Aotearoa

TIA is the peak body for the tourism industry in Aotearoa New Zealand. With around 1,300 members, TIA represents a range of tourism-related activities including hospitality, accommodation, adventure activities, attractions, retail, airports and airlines, transport, as well as related-tourism services.

TIA is sharply focused on ensuring the sustainable future of the industry, and this is clearly articulated in our key guiding documents and programmes. These include the tourism industry's strategic framework, *Tourism 2050 – A Blueprint for Impact, He Pae Tukutuku, and the* industry's sustainability platform *New Zealand Tourism Sustainability Commitment - He kupu taurangi kia toitū ai te tāpoitanga.*

Tourism 2050 has ten Actions, one of which is 'Address Industry Funding' which includes local government funding for tourism. It is a priority for TIA that substantive progress is made in this area, and sustaining Council funding levels form part of this.

The tourism industry

Tourism is the movement of people to places where they don't normally live to 'do, see, visit or experience'.

In the year to March 2023 (the latest data point we have) tourism expenditure was \$37.7 billion, and with tourism making up 11.4% of exports and supporting 11.3% of New Zealand's employment.¹ Since then, further recovery has taken place as tourism works to restore its position alongside Dairy as New Zealand's largest export earning sectors.

The Waikato region received \$1.9b of international and domestic spending in the year to October 2023.² It hosted 1.3 million guest nights per year, or 3.3% of New Zealand's total guest nights.³ As such, tourism plays an important role within the region.

Nature of this submission

TIA recognises that the Regional Tourism Organisation of the Waikato region, Hamilton & Waikato Tourism, is supported and funded by six City or District Councils – Hamiliton, Waipa, Waikato, Waitomo, Otorohanga and Matamata Piako.

This makes it important that the contributions from each Council are in place to ensure that Hamilton & Waikato Tourism has the capacity and critical mass to drive the growth and development of tourism in your region.

As such, this submission is designed to inform each of the six Councils about the importance of sustaining tourism functions as a driver of economic and social well-being in each of the Council areas and across the region.

Tourism spend is an investment

Council spending on tourism activities such as destination marketing and events promotion is widely considered to be an investment, not a cost.

As an investment, resources spent in these areas generate a return over and above the direct cost, and that is why countries and cities around the world invest in these functions. Generally, for every \$1 invested in the local visitor economy there is a direct return for the funding party, such as the local government entity, and with a larger benefit for businesses and people working in the local economy. This is the globally accepted rationale for destination marketing and events attraction activities.⁴

⁴ There is extensive literature on the Return on Investment from destination marketing. However, there is a vast number of ways ROI can be calculated depending on the methods used. What is common is that the ROI is invariably positive, and usually strongly positive. In analysis by Oxford Economics for the World Travel and Tourism Council (WTTC) the following ROIs were cited: Visit Denmark: ROI 16:1, Visit Scotland: ROI 20:1; Australia's 'A Different Light campaign': ROI 64:1; Canada Tourism Commission: ROI 38:1; Visit California: ROI of between 25:1 and 200:1 depending on target market.

In cases where such funding has been withdrawn, the consistent outcome is a discernible decline in tourism activity and, over time, reinstatement of the funding, followed by a gradual period of catch up. The case study evidence shows that when tourism related investment is cut, visitor spending starts reducing immediately and continues to decline. Fortunately, there are not too many of these case studies because funding reductions are quite rare which indicates that the boost generated from this type of investment is recognised and valued.

The Colorado example is widely held as the classic case study.⁵ When Colorado's \$12m tourism marketing budget was cut to zero in 1993, annual visitor spending reduced by \$1.4b initially and then to \$2b annually. State and local taxes fell by \$134m. With re-instatement of funding to \$17m in 2006, the advertising spending of \$10.7m generated an additional \$2.1b of visitor spend and additional tax revenue of \$139m. For the State funder, for every dollar it spent, it received an additional \$12.96 of tax revenue. A 13:1 return.

Similarly, in 2013 the San Diego Tourism Authority had its budget reduced by 83%, down from \$28m to \$4m.⁶ ⁷ Over the following year, this rapidly impacted the performance of the San Diego hotel industry, with room demand, occupancy and price levels all trailing other regional and national destinations that had maintained funding. As funding was returned, the market position was restored reasonably quickly.

Events play a very important role in creating demand of high value visitors, and as a lever for tackling hard-to-address issues such as seasonality or time-of-week fluctuations. This elevates the benefits from investing in programmes that attract events and particularly those that can provide a boost to fill what would be an otherwise quiet period. Through having an ability to attract events, regions can create a more even and predictable demand pattern that can sustain businesses and the jobs that they create.

TIA submits that, in line with international evidence, the Councils that support and enable Hamilton & Waikato Tourism to ensure there is sufficient base funding for tourism functions in the interest of gaining both the return on investment and the intangible place-making and community benefits that will accrue from this expenditure.

Support Paper: The Essential Role of Regional Tourism Bureaus in Supporting New Zealand's Association Conferences and Events

Introduction

The Australasian Society of Association Executives (AuSAE) New Zealand, representing a vibrant community of chief executives and senior leaders from professional associations and trade associations across Aotearoa New Zealand. Our members are at the forefront of professional development, economic growth, and community wellbeing and underscores the urgent need to maintain or increase core funding for regional tourism organisations, specifically focusing on Hamilton and Waikato Tourism (HWT). This advocacy is driven by the looming threat of significant funding cuts across several councils, jeopardising the foundational support for our regional tourism and event-hosting capabilities. This paper champions the critical need to sustain, if not increase, core funding for regional tourism bureaus.

The Value of Associations to Regional Economies

Membership bodies significantly boost regional economies through conferences and events, far beyond mere financial injections. These gatherings serve as catalysts for economic, social, and educational development, leaving a lasting positive impact on host regions. Our partnership with Hamilton and Waikato Tourism has been pivotal in elevating the region's profile, leading to a succession of business opportunities and securing the association community's business in an unparalleled manner.

Strategic Partnership with Hamilton and Waikato Tourism

Our collaboration with HWT has proven instrumental in enhancing the visibility and attractiveness of the Hamilton and Waikato region to the association sector. Together, we've positioned the region as a top destination for conferences and events, generating direct economic benefits and solidifying industry relationships. This partnership has facilitated memorable experiences for attendees and created substantial business opportunities, contributing to the region's economic vitality and expansion.

Impact of Funding Cuts

The substantial funding cuts proposed from the six councils places this valuable partnership in jeopardy. Such cuts threaten to dilute HWT's efforts and could inadvertently shift the association community's focus to other regions for their events. The forthcoming decision by our shareholder on whether to continue or dissolve HWT, followed by the board's decisions on operational focuses, presents a concerning outlook for the future of regional tourism and our collective endeavours.

The Critical Nature of Continued Support

The potential downscaling or cessation of HWT's activities would not only be a loss for the Hamilton and Waikato region but also for the wider association community that AuSAE represents. The unique synergy between AuSAE and HWT has been a cornerstone of our mutual success, delivering enhanced professional development opportunities, economic benefits, and community engagement to the region.

Conclusion

The partnership between professional and trade associations and regional tourism organisations, exemplified by AuSAE and Hamilton and Waikato Tourism, is vital for the prosperity of regional economies and the association sector. We advocate for sustaining or enhancing funding for these organisations to ensure the continued success of such partnerships. As AuSAE New Zealand, we urge councils, and stakeholders to recognise the extensive benefits of these collaborations and to act decisively in support of our communities' and regional economies' future.

Urgent Call to Action

In light of these challenges, our collective voice must be heard louder than ever. We must unite to support the sustainability of HWT and similar entities, ensuring their continued invaluable contributions. The potential disappearance of such organisations would not only impact current operations but also diminish the region's future potential for economic and professional development in hosting association events.

RE: Submission on 2024-34 Long Term Plan


We are writing regarding the proposed changes in funding, contained in the draft 2024-34 Long Term Plan (LTP), for your Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO), Hamilton & Waikato Tourism. As a collective of eight RTOs who form the Explore Central North Island (ECNI) marketing alliance and make up a large portion of the North Island, we have significant concerns about the proposed changes.

ECNI is a central North Island collaboration between Destination Hauraki Coromandel, Tourism Bay of Plenty, Visit Ruapehu, Destination Great Lake Taupō, Rotorua NZ, Hamilton & Waikato Tourism, Activate Tairāwhiti, and Hawke's Bay Tourism who come together to market ourselves. We promote the three main touring routes through the central North Island; <u>Pacific Coast Highway</u>, <u>Thermal Explorer Highway</u> and the <u>Volcanic Loop</u>. In addition, we provide a number of specific itineraries through the eight regions of ECNI to assist both domestic and international travellers and industry members, to experience some of New Zealand's beautiful sights and activities. As a collective we host and attend trade training events in NZ and internationally, keeping Travel Buyers up to date with product offerings from central North Island tourism businesses for their clients traveling to NZ. Our collective voice is strong as we continue to drive and increase demand for North Island visitation.

The primary focus for ECNI is achieving growth in the key long haul western markets of North America and UK/Europe. For the year ending July 2023, international visitor expenditure for these key markets exceeded pre-Covid levels at \$209.49million across the ECNI regions. Following a summer season where we have experienced strong growth in the North American market, this figure will have increased significantly, underlining the value of tourism to your local communities and benefit of the ECNI partnership. The following table provides additional detail on the market growth for ECNI.

From both an international and domestic perspective, tourism is a highly competitive sector. At a national level New Zealand must compete strongly to secure a small share of the total international tourism market and once a visitor has decided on New Zealand as their next destination, regions compete fiercely for a visitor's time and money. In a New Zealand context, the larger metropolitan centres and those with an international airport are at a distinct advantage, with much larger marketing budgets and more opportunities to partner with airports and airlines. ECNI pools resource and has been very effective at maintaining market share across the target markets, as detailed in the following graph.



The proposed funding reduction in the draft LTP will jeopardise Hamilton & Waikato Tourism ongoing participation in ECNI. As discussed above, the ECNI partnership allows the 8 regions to compete successfully, as evidenced through market share and visitor expenditure, against the larger gateway regions that have significantly larger budgets. Put simply, each RTO's investment in ECNI delivers excellent value for money as funds and resource allocated is boosted 8 times through the partnership. Any RTO not contributing will cease to be part of the partnership, will no longer appear in itineraries and marketing activity, and understandably lose market share.

It is important to highlight that the proposed reduction in funding will result in a very significant economic contraction, that will require significantly greater investment to reverse once enacted. There are a range of international case studies that demonstrate how even well-known destinations can suffer when they fail to promote themselves. One of the most relevant examples is Colorado, which shut down its travel promotion program in 1993 by cutting the states promotion budget from US\$12 million to zero almost overnight. The consequences were immediately felt as follows:

- Within one year, Colorado slipped from first place to 17th place in the summer resort category.
- By 1997, Colorado's overall share of the U.S. leisure market plummeted by 30%.
- Visitor spending fell dramatically, creating an immediate loss in revenues of US\$1.4 billion, which increased to US\$2.4billion by the late 1990s.
- As a consequence, state and local tax receipts dropped by US\$134 million between 1993 and 1997.
- In 2000, the state opened the Colorado Tourism Office with a US\$5 million annual budget, which increase to US\$19million in 2006 following a demonstrated return on investment of more than 12:1.
- The head of the Colorado Tourism Office in 2011 was quoted "Our lesson to [the state of] Washington is that it's been 18 years since we went dark in 1993, and we still haven't gotten back it the national market share we had."

Any reduction in the modest funding provided to Hamilton & Waikato Tourism will result in a significant economic contraction as competing regions secure market share. Once lost, this is difficult to regain and will require substantial new investment beyond the amount saved in the proposed cuts.

Tourism plays a pivotal role in the economic, social, and cultural fabric of New Zealand. Beyond the iconic landscapes and attractions that draw international visitors, tourism offers an opportunity for local communities to showcase their unique heritage, traditions, and natural wonders. Tourism fosters a sense of pride and identity among locals, encouraging preservation and stewardship of natural and cultural assets. Overall, tourism not only drives economic growth through visitor expenditure and employment but also creates vibrancy and a destination that is a great place to live, work and do business.

I have comments about the Draft Capital Project Listing > Stormwater > Flood Mitigation works item:

The LTP must include provision for improving the management of surface water that has caused frequent flooding, and evacuations in the Te Kowhai Estate subdivision. The flooding and ponding issues were known to both the WRC and WDC for many years, yet the subdivision was still consented with no provision for correcting the issues, and no record of the known flooding was surfaced in LIM reports. This is a disgrace, and must be rectified as soon as possible - this is seriously affecting lives and livelihoods, and quite frankly - the councils have a moral and ethical obligation to correct their error

The most expedient route for re-direction of excess surface water is to redirect it south from the Eastern side of 16 Vic Knight Lane, 16 Vic Knight Lane, 680 a & b Te Kowhai Road; under Te Kowhai Rd and through farm land into the gully to the south of Te Kowhai Rd. This route will have the additional benefit of increasing the water flow through Te Otamanui stream and the wetlands that are currently struggling with insufficient water

Bike Waikato Submission to Waikato District Council 2024/2025 Annual Plan

Kia ora koutou

We acknowledge the economic headwinds Aotearoa New Zealand is facing nationwide and appreciate that councils across the motu are facing some difficult decisions. However in the face of these challenging circumstances, we would like to remind WDC of how enabling more people to ride bikes safely contributes positively to the Community Outcomes specified in the WDC Annual Plan consultation document, specifically:

- Environmental
- Social
- Economic

The environmental harm caused by cars can, and should, be addressed by increasingly encouraging mode-shift - that is, more people switching to environmentally friendly forms of transportation wherever possible. Short trips within small rural communities can often be achieved by bike, but hostile car-centric roading discourages this.

The social benefits of cycling have been well-documented, with more face-to-face interactions with neighbours and members of the community made possible by the slower pace. Also people unable to drive due to age or health can still access their community by bike if safe infrastructure is provided.

As the cost of car ownership continues to increase, cycling is a great way to reduce individuals' spend on transport. This will become increasingly important as the cost of emissions, and therefore fuel will increase in the medium term, due to the Emissions Trading Scheme.

More provisions for cycling also relate to the Strategic Priorities in the Draft Annual Plan:

- Improving Connectivity
- Supporting Sustainable Growth

Providing a range of transport options for people to get around their communities will only enhance connectivity and remove barriers and disconnection, especially those unable to drive. Regarding growth, careful planning must take place in any new development to ensure cycling is a legitimate, safe transport option for new residents. This will ensure sustainability in the long-term and help negate car dependency and therefore climate emissions.

As you might expect, we support any cycleway and walking enhancements in the Annual Plan, such as :

- FN DIW District wide footpaths walking and cycling improve
- FN NGA Waingaro Road Bridge walking and cycling
- FP (District wide footpath cycleway improvement programme)



We support any upgrade of the Harrisville Road / George Street / Dominion Road intersection that enables and improves pedestrian and bike access. For example a wide and comfortable shared walking and cycling path connecting the Dominion road shops with the rest of Tuakau via George street would be sensible.

We note there are no planned changes to the cycleway improvements budget (roughly \$1 million per year) since the 2021/2031 LTP. Funding for sustainable transport should be boosted over time to accelerate mode-shift and meet the Community Outcomes and Strategic Priorities outlined above. In a climate crisis and cost-of-living crisis, continuing with the status-quo funding model of cars-first is unsustainable for the environment but also for individuals.

We implore Waikato District Council to make brave decisions to not only sustain funding levels for cycling and walking infrastructure, but increase them over time so that everyone in the Waikato District can have safe, healthy and sustainable transport options to get around their communities.

Executive Summary

Mark Morgan as CE of Waikato Regional Airport Limited (WRAL), writes this submission on behalf of the WRAL Board of Directors. WRAL is the sole shareholder of Hamilton Waikato Tourism (HWT). As a fully owned subsidiary of WRAL, the WRAL Board have appointed an independent HWT Board of Directors to govern the organisation in accordance with the Group Statement of Intent having regard for the expectations of the funding councils and industry partners.

Our submission intends to reinforce the importance of the organisation to promote tourism to the region and to indicate the risks associated with a proposed reduction in funding and our strong belief that funding for the organisation should be retained as status quo.

Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) is the official tourism organisation for the Waikato region. The organisation's role is to attract domestic and international visitors and increase length of stay and expenditure through effective destination marketing, development, and management activity. HWT promotes Hamilton and the Waikato as a preferred destination for domestic and international business, events and leisure travelers and provides leadership in regional product and event development, investment, and sector capability. As passionate ambassadors of the region, HWT aims to ensure visitors enjoy a wide variety of experiences and places throughout the mighty Waikato, in turn contributing to economic, social, environmental, and cultural benefits for the community.

Waikato District Council (WDC) LTP indicates a 50% reduction in funding to HWT. Any reduction in funding will directly impact service delivery and effective outcomes. However, a proposed reduction as large as 50% will result in a significant review as to the viability of the organisation. Reduction in funding directly impacts on the services provided to the visitor sector. Less resources = less services. Less services will equal less visitors. Less visitors equals less visitors spend. This will impact communities and tourism operators across the mighty Waikato.

In the 12 months ended October 2023 visitors spent \$1.9 billion in our region; of this just **over \$266m is in Waikato District** alone. This equates to **\$728,767 of new money** being spent in the district each day. A portion of this revenue is directly attributable to the activities and co-ordination by HWT and this will now be at risk should the RTO be required to significantly restructure its resources and therefore dilute its service delivery model.

While we acknowledge the council finances need addressing and 'tough decisions' need to be made, our submission to Waikato District Council urges reconsideration of funding allocation to Hamilton & Waikato Tourism. The Waikato Regional Airport Limited (WRAL) Board considers the current proposed 50% reduction in funding to be detrimental to regional economic development and growth aspirations of the district.

Background

- 1. WRAL opposes the proposed 50% reduction in HWTs funding and requests this be reviewed and returned to the level outlined in the current Service Level Agreement.
- 2. Tourism Waikato was disestablished in 2006. This resulted in a significant decline in domestic and international visitor expenditure, a drop in overnight stays, lack of national and international tourism profile and destination marketing. Appendix 1 outlines the impacts of the RTO being disbanded in 2006 and established in 2011 in relation to International Visitors.
- 3. Waikato Regional Airport Limited funded and provided tourism services in 2009/2010 in order to secure Pacific Blue flights into Hamilton.
- 4. Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) was formally re-established July 2011 as a wholly owned subsidiary of Waikato Regional Airport Limited (WRAL).
- 5. HWT is a Limited Liability company, with its own board of directors who are responsible to the WRAL Board.
- 6. We acknowledge the economic climate is tough and councils need to make savings in operating expenses. We have therefore avoided requesting additional or increased funding. However, a 50% reduction is a step too far as a reduction of funding to this level will require the WRAL Board to assess the viability of the organisation and its ability to provide a credible and effective Regional Tourism Organisation.
- 7. WRAL currently provides financial assistance for HWT by way of a reduction in the commercial rent for its offices and cost savings for shared services at an approximate value of \$90k, however that financial support has always been capped noting that WRAL is not a core funder of the organisation. Additionally, WRAL and its other subsidiary Jet Park Hamilton Airport Hotel are industry funding partners of HWT, procuring over \$20,000 of HWT services on full commercial rates.

Risk of reduced funding

- 8. If/when international flights return to Hamilton Airport, a well-resourced RTO is needed to support any business case to secure international flights. The current proposed funding means the RTO would not be sufficiently resourced to assist with the marketing and promotion of international flights during these times and will impact the credibility of the region's response to Airline enquiry and therefore put any business case at risk.
- 9. Although reluctant to take such drastic actions, as WRAL is HWTs shareholder, the WRAL board will make the ultimate decision on whether the organisations capability and expected work outputs is viable to continue or whether HWT will need to be disbanded entirely. The current collective proposed funding reductions across the six funding councils is -41%. Any reduction in base level funding will result in less services that can be reasonably provided, however, the core viability of the organisation is seriously at risk at this proposed level.
- 10. WRAL has future considerations for the expansion of the Airport Hotel, currently trading as JetPark Hotel. In order for the potential expansion to be viable, a functioning RTO is required to promote not only the property but the attractiveness of the region for leisure, conferencing and corporate travel. WRAL would be mindful of any significant investment in the hotel without a functioning RTO.

Conclusion

- 11. For every dollar invested into tourism in the region, there is a significant return, funding of the RTO should be considered as an investment by WDC and not an expense line to be reduced. At a time when the district needs to encourage and support economic development, this proposal would seek to constrain or remove an organisation that promotes, supports, and drives initiatives to increase tourism receipts and fulfils a role as an economic enabler.
- 12. Reduced funding will at best result in a reduced and restructured organisation which will flow onto the services provided, with the corresponding reduction in effective outcomes.

Recommendation

- 14. That Waikato District Council continues its partnership with Hamilton & Waikato Tourism in collaboration with other Waikato based councils;
- 15. We strongly urge Waikato District Council elected members to reconsider funding of Hamilton & Waikato Tourism.
- 16. That Waikato District Council commits investment to Hamilton & Waikato Tourism to the same level as currently invested (\$150,00) with annual CPI increases in the Long-Term Plan 2025-35.



The document continually refers to services that can be reduced, but I note that more than 20% of the rates we go to funds the staff. This cost is disproportionate and should be reduced before any further reduction of services are investigated. Further to this, the removal of a key metric around the availability of the councillors is wholly unacceptable.

The appointing of a strategic advisor to focus specifically on one cultural group would be considered a racist move in any other sector of the community, and as such I strongly object to this and would like the position revoked.

The debt level we are about to reach is unsustainable and unacceptable, and rather than follow central governments lead of getting further into debt, the local council needs to reduce the debt. This starts by living within ones means.

When projects, such as the walkways renewal project, experience delays contractors need to be held to account rather than simply allowed to charge more. This indicates a lack of accountability within the council that allows projects to be completed to a poor standard.

I fully support the removal of the metric "5% reduction per annum"

Overall the document is written at a high level, with very little specifics. It feels as though local council is trying to pull the wool over our eyes with a wordy piece of work that has no real content. This is, like much of what is happening, unacceptable. Do better.





Other charges include building consent (paid by the owner before purchasing the house), corporate and council leadership, road maintenance (which addresses ongoing potholes), rubbish disposal (we pay for plastic bags and stickers), and animal control (costs for dogs/cats licenses are borne by their owners).

Our allocation of rates payment should be what we currently use not for "increased demand" or "new users" then on top of the blanket charge we have to pay for every litre that comes to our property. Is this fair, we entrust the council to get it right as we have no choice on our supplier for these services, are you allocating the right money to the right place?

Waikato District Council Long Term Plan Submission

24 April, 2024

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input into the Waikato District Long Term Plan.

As the major provider of sport and recreation facilities and services in Waikato District, we greatly appreciate the positive outcomes Council investment provides for a wide range of sports codes, demographics, cultures, ages and abilities. We also acknowledge the challenge Council faces with balancing the various competing demands such as growth, transport, climate change and water quality in the context of the current economic climate.

Council investment into the play, active recreation and sport sector makes an enormous contribution to the overall health and wellbeing of people in the Waikato District. Sport NZ and Sport Waikato have been working with the play, active recreation and sport sector to develop a co-ordinated and collaborative approach for future sport and recreation facility provision. This provides Council with a high-level strategic view of infrastructure needs for the region and the evaluation criteria to prioritise investment and ultimately make better decisions.

Waikato District Council has been a partner and important contributor in the development of the Waikato Regional Active Spaces Plan, a regional strategy for active recreation and sport facilities provision. The Strategy is an important reference point, it identifies priority needs and facility developments for Waikato

District and the other districts in the region, providing a blueprint to meet future needs rather than wants.

Summary

 First, Thank you: Sport NZ acknowledges and thanks Council for its significant contribution to play, active recreation and sport. Thanks also for the part that it plays in the strong partnership that has long existed between Sport Waikato and WDC, as evidenced by the extensive list of projects, programmes and quality opportunities that have been developed over the years.

Sport NZ **supports** the following themes proposed in the plan/proposal:

- Sport NZ acknowledges and thanks Council for its significant contribution to play, active recreation and sport through the ownership and maintenance of 229ha of sport and recreation areas for active communities, 60 playgrounds for tamariki to enjoy, three aquatic centres and halls for recreation and sport activity.
- Sport NZ acknowledges across the parks and reserves portfolio there are cost escalations across several core areas in the 2024/25 financial year and to reduce the impact of these cost escalations, the Council has implemented cost-saving measures where possible. At the same time Council is proposing to increase investment in some key areas, to ensure the community continues to have leisure options and good facilities to support community connection. Sport NZ supports this proposed additional investment into future-proofing district-wide sports field infrastructure with better surface maintenance, drainage, and lighting. This will increase the quality, capacity and use of these facilities and enable greater participation and increased physical activity levels for tamariki, rangatahi and whānau.
- Sport NZ also acknowledges the ongoing investment in maintenance and renewal of existing leisure assets. When there is limited ability to fund new or significantly redevelop facilities it is important to maintain and renew existing assets to enable continuity and quality of service and keep facilities fit-for purpose to meet the community's needs.

Local government is uniquely placed to support play, active recreation, and sport

Local government has a unique and critical role in the play, active recreation, and sport ecosystem, providing vital community assets that are part of the fabric of our communities along with grants and opportunities that support local communities to participate in play, active recreation, and sport.

It is clear that prioritising investment in facilities, infrastructure, resources, and opportunities to encourage participation in play, active recreation, and sport can support the wellbeing of communities and the achievement of a broad range of local government priorities and outcomes. There is clear evidence about the value of play, active recreation and sport in supporting the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of our communities.

Provision of play, active recreation, and sport facilities, infrastructure, resources, and opportunities is important to a large proportion of the population. In 2022:

• 73% of the adult population and 92% of young people (aged 5-17yrs) participated each week in play, active recreation, and sport

- 79% of adults and 63% of young people would like to be doing more play, active recreation and sport

• High deprivation, Asian and Pasifika population groups are significantly less likely to participate.¹

Research into New Zealanders' beliefs around the value of sport and active recreation in 2017 found a broad base of support for sport and active recreation and a belief in its value to New Zealand and New Zealanders. The value of sport and active recreation is seen to lie in the contributions it makes to individuals, families, communities, and the country as a whole.²

The value of investment in play, active recreation, and sport is a cost-effective investment towards local government wellbeing outcomes

International and domestic evidence clearly demonstrates that play, sport, and active recreation generate significant value for society across multiple wellbeing domains and outcomes, many of which are specifically relevant to the outcomes sought by local government:

• Recently published research from a Social Return on Investment³ study found that for every \$1 spent on play, active recreation, and sport, there is a social return of \$2.12 to New Zealand. This means that for every dollar invested in play, active recreation, and sport, the social return is more than doubled. This is a conservative figure and the actual return, especially for those currently missing out on opportunities to be active, is likely to be higher.⁴

- In 2019 participation in play, active recreation, and sport generated \$3.32 billion return in subjective wellbeing (life satisfaction and happiness) within New Zealand. $^{\rm 5}$

Play, active recreation and sport contribute to social, economic, environment and cultural wellbeing in the following ways:

- Social wellbeing:
 - Development of social skills
 - Strengthened social networks
 - Bringing communities together and increasing a sense of belonging

Improving pride and reducing antisocial behaviours in communities

Economic wellbeing:

- Economic value generated for local communities and businesses
 Employment of New Zealanders in the play, active recreation, and sport sector
- Productivity gains as a result of physical activity
- Savings for communities as a result of the volunteer workforce
- Economic impact of major events

Environmental wellbeing:

- o Creation of pro-environmental attitudes and behaviours
- Creation of more environmentally friendly urban environments
- Reduced emissions from active transport

Improved mental wellbeing from being active in natural environments

Cultural wellbeing:

• Strengthened cultural ties from participation in play, active recreation, and sport

• Increased wellbeing from participating in culturally relevant physical activity.

I congratulate Council for their decision on the 26th of February 2024 to :"endorse the Waikato District Council's Housing Strategy pending word changes on the strategy and action plan". Access to affordable housing is a critical distress point in many of our communities and in my view Council is right to adopt a leadership role in enabling and facilitating the delivery by others of more affordable housing options in the district. I would hope the strategy is adopted when in returns with amendments to Council in the near future.

With that in mind, I am concerned however not to see this explicitly reflected in the draft work programme line budget; whilst the commitment for the coming year is largely in staff time, I would hope in the adoption of the Housing Strategy that this becomes one of the priorities of Council and as such needs to be part of someone(s) job and expected performance outcomes, not something to do if there is spare time (spoiler alert - there never is). Dedicated resourcing will be required to have any chance of the intended outcomes to be achieved.

So a line item with money for resource allocation under "Organisational Support" or "Sustainable community" is not only appropriate -it is necessary to give effect to the Housing Strategy. Further as part of the FutureProof Development Strategy, WDC has adopted affordable housing targets (based on your own already adopted HBA) for 2025 and subsequent years which requires significant focus and deliberate action (and therefore resource).

A reasonable challenge from Councillors might be: fine, but where does that money come from? In response, I wonder given the significant size of the roading component of the draft programme already, why "PP DIW land acqusition - roading improvement \$550K" and "PP DIW Ongoing Road legalisations small acquisitions - costs \$250K" sit in the Sustainable Community section rather than Roading? But if that is the appropriate place (given outcomes are to benefit community outcomes) then significant scrutiny should be applied to minimise costs in order to free up additional funds I am advocating for in this submission.

I also challenge Council in dismissing the Housing Strategy action point of acquiring land for affordable housing purposes due to the fiscally constrained times yet setting aside a total of 800K in these two PP DIW items for roading improvements ON TOP OF of the already significant nearly \$42m roading budget: is the work programme as proposed in step with strategy?

Regional Tourism New Zealand (RTNZ) welcomes the opportunity to comment on the Enhanced Annual Plan for 2024-2025 for Waikato District Council.

RTNZ is the peak body for the Regional Tourism Organisations (RTOs) across New Zealand of which Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) is a member. RTOs are each the representative of their Local Governments' (LG) investment in tourism in respect to their community. 90% of funding to RTOs comes from LG with \$40 million invested across 30 RTOs that make up the network.

Tourism is a significant contributor to economic and social wellbeing.

- In 2019, prior to COVID-19 New Zealand's tourism industry generated \$41b of visitor expenditure, contributed 10% of GDP and employed 340,000 people. It was the second largest export sector behind diary. With borders once again open and people travelling, New Zealand's tourism sector has rebounded strongly, and visitation is 80% back to pre-COVID levels. By 2025 both visitation and expenditure are predicted to exceed 2019 levels.
- 2. The tourism industry creates value, employment, prosperity and vibrancy to New Zealand's cities, regions, and communities. \$115m per day in 'additional' spend is generated by people moving around and visiting various places and communities across the country. Visitor spending flows far and wide, well beyond the visitor attraction, activity, accommodation, café/restaurant retail, gas stations and supermarkets as demonstrated in the diagram below.

3. Visitor expenditure in the Waikato region is \$1.9b, the fifth largest in New Zealand. Commercial guest nights are 1.4m per annum. Visitor expenditure in the Waikato District is \$266m with 218,800 commercial guest nights. Tourism is a significant contributor to the District.


RTOs play a significant role within the destination and tourism system.

- 4. RTOs play a crucial role in the tourism system by serving as key facilitators and coordinators of tourism activities within their respective regions. When tourism grows, communities' benefit. However, for communities to capture and optimise benefits, the RTO's functions are enormously important.
- 5. HWT is the one organisation that has oversight of how the destination functions as a system and to bring together multiple stakeholders/actors. They are the glue that connects destinations and businesses to potential visitors so that businesses can prosper, jobs can be created, and communities can thrive.
- 6. Businesses are key to the economic health and vibrancy of a city, town, and region. Tourism businesses bring significant cashflow and investment to a region through attracting both international and domestic visitors. HWT works very closely with tourism businesses, bringing private sector investment to further leverage council's investment, and in doing so, creating greater impact.
- Many of these businesses are still recovering from the effects of closed borders during COVID-19. HWT provides valuable support and capability building to enable local businesses to grow, adapt and become more resilient to changing environments so that they and their communities can thrive.

Destination promotion is a public good for the benefit and wellbeing of all.

- 8. Destination promotion and stewardship is an important investment that no district and/or region can afford not to make without damaging the future economic and social well-being of communities. Due to collective benefits that extend beyond individual businesses or organisations, tourism promotion is considered a public good that requires collaboration and support from governments, communities, and stakeholders to maximize its positive impact.
- **9.** Effective tourism promotion enhances a destination's image and reputation nationally and globally. A positive perception of a place not only attracts more visitors, but also leads to attracting more residents, enhancing business opportunities and more investment, therefore contributing to the long-term growth and prosperity for residents. These potential flow on benefits all start with a visit.

10. New Zealand's RTOs' international promotional work is conducted alongside Tourism New Zealand (TNZ) so that regions can attract their share of these higher spending visitors. Competition for international visitors is strong, and HWT's promotion is important to secure the regions share. TNZ also relies on HWT on the 'ground' to support their efforts. If HWT is unable to do this, TNZ efforts are likely to 'by-pass' the region.

Developing a sustainable tourism industry which contributes to the quality of life of residents.

- 11. Over the past five years all regions have developed a Destination Management Plan (DMP). The DMPs provide the blueprint for the sustainable growth of tourism across New Zealand's regions. RTNZ acknowledges the exceptionally good work done by HWT in the development of the region's DMP. There was strong collaboration across the region which reflects the aspirations of the region's communities for what they want from tourism in the future.
- 12. The destinations eco-system is complex with many interrelated and interdependent parts that need to work in together to ensure tourism benefit communities. The Waikato region's DMP is a demonstration of the importance of stewardship, and HWT performs a leadership, coordination, and facilitation role so that tourism actors can come together and collaborate and continue to grow sustainably.
- 13. Through the development of the DMP, HWT has developed a contract with the community. This has involved multiple parties across the destination so that the region can optimise opportunities visitors provide as well as adapt and respond to change and challenges. It is important that the DMP is supported, and the regional community's goals and aspirations are honoured and delivered upon.

Local government has been a critical partner in New Zealand's tourism success.

14. Tourism takes place in local communities and provides jobs, regional economic opportunities, and vibrancy, and local governments across NZ play a key role in supporting /enabling the tourism system. This includes managing and providing local tourism experiences through place-making,

events and community facilities, amenities and services which are a key part of the visitors experience within the destination. The RTO supports these visitor assets and collaborates closely with council teams to optimise the value and return that they create for ratepayers through out-of-town visitation.

15. A key action in both Tourism Industry Aotearoa's Tourism Strategy (TIA), and RTNZ's Project Tōnui (whitepaper on the future role, structure, and funding of regional tourism/RTOs) is to address the persistent and lack of funding for the tourism sector, particularly at regional level. Project Tonui specifically identifies the considerable risk, over reliant RTO/TLA funding model. RTNZ sees this as systemic issue to be addressed with the highest priority and is working alongside other industry leaders to advance this urgent matter. Local government will be a key partner in the determined solution. However, this will take time and therefore RTNZ strongly recommends that Waikato District Council retain its level of commitment whilst a workable long-term solution is agreed and implemented.

RTNZ recognises the substantial financial challenges facing local governments across New Zealand to meet the needs of their communities.

- 16. RTNZ acknowledges that the significant financial challenges facing councils at a time when there needs to be ongoing investment to maintain and enhance community amenities and services, place making, and mixed-use infrastructure used by both locals and visitors. We appreciate the challenges of the required investment in water infrastructure for all councils under the new government, and the impact that this is having on other facets of councils' business.
- 17. The Waikato region is one of the more complex regions in New Zealand due to the number of TLAs within the RTO's catchment. RTNZ commends Waikato District Council's support of HWT since its re- establishment in 2011 (after Tourism Waikato was disbanded in 2006) and demonstrates a successful collaboration model over the past 13 years where each partner councils' investment and commitment is shared and therefore leveraged. HWT's 2023/24 funding from its six council partners (\$1,343,943) is on the lower end in comparison to neighbouring regions with fewer contributing councils. Tourism Bay of Plenty (\$2,2640,000) Destination Great Lake Taupo (\$2,093,000).
- 18. Waikato District Council is proposing a reduction of \$ 75,000 to HWT. This decrease in funding will have significant impact on HWT's ability to continue to perform its role and functions effectively. It will also affect their ability to secure tourism operator investment because of their reduced level of activity and impact. If this occurs it will lead to a contraction of promotion and stewardship activities, the region being less competitive, resulting in a loss of market share to other regions over time. This will have a direct impact on businesses, jobs and and the overall economic and social prosperity of the district.
- 19. Funding of HWT should be seen as an investment and not a cost. HWT's funding from the region's combined local governments for the year 2023/24 was \$1,343,934. For every dollar invested collectively by the region's funding councils returns \$1,390. This is a substantive return on investment. For every rate payer dollar Waikato District Council makes in HWT it

returns \$1,773. This too is a substantive return on investment and one that should not be jeopardised as New Zealand's economy faces strong headwinds.

- **20.** HWT also has one of the largest contributions from its tourism industry across the RTO network, which is testament to the professionalism and performance of the organisation. Due to the nature of the sector being mainly SMEs, businesses cannot be expected to pick up any shortfall that may arise because of reduced LG funding for the RTO.
- 21. Waikato District Council's decision around funding also has a direct association to HWT's funding from its other partner councils. Tourism Waikato was disbanded in 2006 due to the region's local governments reducing and/or with drawing funding to the RTO. It wasn't until 2011 that the RTO was re-established, culminating in a strong and committed partnership with local government across the region and support from the tourism industry.
- 22. It has taken 13 years of hard work and dedication from a professional and talented HWT team to rebuild the region's proposition, reputation, and position as New Zealand's fifth largest tourism region. Any reduction in funding would be a major step backward and could be the start of a downward spiral that results in the Waikato region once again ceasing to have a RTO as a worst-case scenario, or an underpowered organisation that struggles to add real value to its communities and the tourism industry.

Conclusion

RTOs across New Zealand rely on partnership funding from local government to support their activities. It is critical that Councils remain strong partners of RTOs across New Zealand.

Waikato District Council needs to remain committed to supporting HWT so that they can successfully partner with the tourism industry, so that tourism continues to contribute value and benefits to Waikato communities.

RTNZ recommends that Waikato District Council's investment in HWT is retained at the current level. This will ensure that progress made up over the past 13 years is maintained to enable compounding/optimal results. Retaining the same level of support will continue to pay dividends economically and socially to the people of Waikato District.

RTNZ suggests that consideration is given to exploring new funding streams across the region's LG group including options to increase HWT's funding to keep pace with inflation and operational cost increases. This will provide certainty to the RTO and support the sustainable growth and development of the district and region's tourism sector over the longer term.

RTNZ is grateful for the opportunity to provide this submission.

- Renewals for Nga Main Office \$1,632,246
- Fleet Replacement New Vehicles cost \$808,437

Over \$3m is being spent on Munro Rd to provide for 360 dwellings -

- Munro Road 355 Bridge upgrade to two lane bridge \$2,000,000
- Pokeno Road Corridor Bridge to Munro Road intersect \$750,000
- Pokeno Road/Munro Road RAB \$500,000

Comparing that road with Opotoru Rd, Raglan, which will provide for 500+ dwellings at Rangitahi, it seems to be a nice to have, rather than essential project.

The same can be said for Wainui Bridge traffic signals trial \$200,000.

And also Tuakau Structure Plan doesn't mention upgrading Harrisville Road, yet \$4.5m is planned to be spent on it, largely it seems for HPMVs, which have alternative routes.

Another \$550,000 is to be spent on Land acquisition - Roading improvements. Why? Where? There is no breakdown of District Wide parks and reserves \$7,262,524, which is about â..." of the total capital spending. Why? Where?

\$6m has just been spent on Raglan wharf, yet Wharf And Jetty Renewals are to cost \$468,339. Why?

Only \$946,659 (2.27%) of the Roading capital budget is to be spent on footpaths/Bus Shelters/Rail Facilities, including \$0.5m on park and ride at Huntly, which would be better spent improving cycle access to the station, yet about 5% of ratepayers don't have cars and many more would like to support the Climate Response & Resilience Policy - Support a reduction in district emissions by 25% by 2030.

It would create more chaos in terms of finance in the long run in my opinion.

It was unreasonable for the road to be opened and then closed for 'improvements' only a few months later, and what's worse was they remained closed/under construction for years. In the interests of safety and connecting to our local communities we request consideration of an extension of the footpath/ cycle network in Matangi - initially along Tauwhare Road from Matangi Village to Tauwhare Pa. * Do not cut any library funding

* Cut costs on landscaping by replacing all council owned berms (and other land that is not utilised yet requires maintenance) with self-sustaining, native ecosystems. This can be accomplished with basic permaculture techniques using natives. Once established, these ecosystems will mitigate the need for weeding, spraying, replanting, and mowing. This will also reduce the council's carbon footprint. The resulting attraction of native bird and insect life will also make the city more attractive. Partner with local environmental and permaculture organisations and local iwi who can provide knowledge to install the ecosystems.

* Ensure any new parks, gardened roundabouts, or other planted infrastructure built are as low maintenance as possible by planting self-sustaining, native ecosystems (as point above). * Increase the fine for environmental offences and broaden the scope of what is considered an environmental offence. For instance, the water quality of the Waikato River is terrible due to nitrate contamination of ground water due to dairying ("pastoral farmingâ€⊡). Thus the dairy industry (Fonterra, not the farmers) should pay for the damage they have caused and what it takes to reverse it. The fine should be addressed to the dairy companies like Fonterra and not the individual farmers, as Fonterra is the driver pushing farmers to produce higher yields and the one profiting off of the pollution of our waterways that is a consequence of those yields. Fonterra should be instructed to fund the installation of riparian buffers for the farmers.

* Install solar panels, wind turbines or other forms of renewable energy on or it council buildings and on council land. This will reduce the council's energy bill and carbon footprint, and any excess energy can be sold back to the grid. There are a number of innovations that use small turbines to generate energy e.g. between lanes of traffic or within down pipes (powered by running water). * Enable households and businesses to easily capture their own drinking water. Remove or re-

write any council rules that inhibit the easy installation of water capture systems. Grant rate rebates for those that capture their own drinking water. This could be supported by partnering with water capture companies and water filtration companies. This will also reduce the amount of storm water accessing the drains, alleviating strain on our water system.

* Enable households and businesses to capture their own energy e.g. solar, wind, or gas from composted food scraps. Remove or re-write any council rules that inhibit the easy installation of energy capture systems. Grant rate rebates for those that capture their own energy. This could be supported by partnering with a variety of energy capture companies.

* Require all new developments to capture some of their own energy and water.

* Implement low-cost green infrastructure solutions such as rain gardens, bioswales, and permeable pavement to manage stormwater runoff, improve water quality and recharge groundwater systems. This will alleviate strain on the water system by diverting most stormwater runoff away from the drains, instead utilising it to irrigate council berms, council parks, or community gardens. These projects can also enhance walkability. Encourage new developments to implement these solutions by offering rate rebates and information/resources/company contacts for implementation.

* Create fines for how much water enters drains to encourage households to capture their own water and recycle their grey water.

* Allow residents to plant their berms with any plant, not just grass. Encourage the planting of native self-sufficient ecosystems that reduce resident maintenance and help soak up storm water, preventing the storm water from adding additional strain to council pipes.

* Encourage new developments to seperate their grey water and black water so that only the black water goes into the sewage system and the grey water is filtered on site and used as irrigation on site. Using permaculture, the grey water can be further filtered by plants on the property. Consideration will need to be given to mitigate harsh chemicals getting into the irrigation system, either through adequate initial filtration or encouraging residents to switch to low toxicity alternatives (e.g.through partnering with Eco Store or similar).

 This submission is a collaboration between Community Waikato, Creative Waikato, Go Eco, The Waikato Wellbeing Project, Seed Waikato and HMS Trust. It represents the shared vision and aspirations of those of us working to build the capacity, capability and well-being of our local landscape. It includes a holistic approach to building a thriving community

Shaping the future of Waikato District

- There are clear strategic alignments between the work of the community, creative, environment and youth sectors, across both soft and hard infrastructure, to Waikato district's vision of liveable, thriving and connected communities, the 4 community outcomes and 6 strategic priorities. Most significantly, "celebrating who we are" "having well-connected communities", "Our environmental health underpins the health of our People" and "we support local prosperity", while fairly simple elaborations on the basic purpose of local government, are important wellbeing signposts for the council to follow in its strategy, planning and resource allocation.
- Youth, arts, culture, creativity, Maaori, social services, disability and ethnic communities can and should make significant contributions to ' liveable, thriving and connected communities". Understanding how our green spaces and biodiversity create healthy communities is critical to underpin good decision making. Shaping a future for the Waikato district needs to be collective, co-designed, and through the numerous lenses of the beneficiaries of the district, present and future.
- A fair and reasonable democratic process is supported by accessible and equal communication pathways and opportunities to influence the decision-makers. Some communities, for example ethnic communities, face additional barriers and relying on traditional feedback methods such as the submission process, does not facilitate engagement from these communities. Strategies should be co-designed with the community they target, especially communities that have traditionally had a limited or absent voice from council, such as our young people.

Valuing communities

- While the community makes a significant contribution to these areas through investment, in-kind support, volunteer time, and creative passion, it is essential that the Council maintains and increases investment into this sector as a core provision of service to our growing community.
- Our future now depends on how we allocate resources, ensuring the needs and well-being of people and nature are central to our budgetary decisions.
- As a district sandwiched between New Zealand's biggest and fastest growing cities, it is vital the Waikato district grows well this means valuing and investing in art and creativity, culture, community services, our greenspaces and biodiversity, venues, creative spaces and events, development programmes, and opportunities to weave cultural storytelling, placemaking and playful creative expression throughout partnership with the community, and within core council business.
- Community granting makes an important contribution to supporting for-purpose organisations, sustaining community services, local venues, and investing in our whenua. This partnership between council and community is directly connected to cultural and community wellbeing outcomes for the council.

Impact on social and cultural wellbeing

Beyond economic measures, the impacts of the non-profit community on social and cultural wellbeing is also significant.

- The community and social service sector encompass a broad range of initiatives that offer invaluable support and foster connections within diverse populations. Beyond just alleviating poverty and social isolation, these services bring a plethora of benefits to the community. They promote inclusivity, empower individuals to overcome challenges, and enhance overall well-being. Additionally, they contribute to the development of stronger social bonds, cultivate a sense of belonging, and foster a culture of empathy and compassion.
- In-depth Waikato-focussed research from 2022 highlighted regular access and perceived access to arts, culture and creativity is a significant driver of individual wellbeing. This contributes to better mental health outcomes, and shows measurable connection to social cohesion, community connection, civic pride, and sense of identity.
- Investment in the whenua is critical. Community access to open and accessible greenspaces, even in an ostensibly rural environment, can have profound effects on well-being, promoting physical health, mental clarity, emotional resilience, and social connection.
- Climate-resilient towns and settlements require systemic approaches that address both the physical and social dimensions of resilience. This includes investing in green infrastructure like parks and urban forests, as well as social infrastructure such as community centres and cultural hubs which promote social cohesion and empowerment. By incorporating the voices and perspectives of diverse communities into the budgeting process, we can ensure that our investments reflect the needs and priorities of all residents

Investing in people

- In this current cost of living crisis, a careful and well considered fiscal approach to local government funding and services is supported. At the same time, the Council needs to keep front of mind its responsibility and duty to its people. The Council's vision of "working together as a district to build liveable, thriving and connected communities" is functionally appropriate, but lacks appeal to the human spirit. It is a council purpose statement of the here and now, but as a vision it offers very little for our tamariki and rangatahi to be inspired by. Between now and the next LTP, the Council might like to ask its people what their vision for the future is, in their words, and adopt that. This should be done in terms of their lived experienced, not necessarily from the point of view of the Council.
- At a time of increased need, now is the time to invest in people. Support the people who provide positive outcomes for diverse communities. Art, culture, and creativity sits alongside social services, kai, health, education, environment, and community connection as interwoven components of thriving communities.
- It requires civic investment as a part of ensuring community access. Not investing in our social infrastructure will result in the degradation of our community services, arts, culture and environment at a time of a growing population.
- A thriving and prosperous city will always be a combination of physical assets and infrastructure we can see, and the less tangible social, economic, cultural and environmental foundations which we all rely on for our wellbeing. We urge the council, even in difficult fiscal times, to keep a balanced and people-focused approach to all aspects of wellbeing, as is required by the Local Government Act (2022).

- At a time of increased need, commit to maintaining and increasing community funding to support organisations to continue to deliver positive outcomes.
- Work collaboratively with community providers to lead and implement a joint regional food strategy in collaboration with city and district councils and Waikato Regional Council.
- Engage and fund services from relevant community organisations to co-design civic engagement strategies to enable meaningful and reciprocal access and support for vulnerable communities.

The joint signatures to this submission are well-placed and able to work with Council on these initiatives which will help 'our people thrive'.

As Councilor's you have come up with a goal "To build, Liveable, Thriving, Connected Communities' Do you understand what it really means and how are you as a councilor going to contribute to it? When the CEO and CFO came to you and said we need to increase rates by 13.5%, how did you challenge them?

OK, then what have you put in place to ensure that they don't ask for 15% next year?

You may ask when you have read what I have written below what has this to do with the 2024/25 Annual Plan, well its all about ensuring we have a sustainable council going forward. Double digit rates increases are not sustainable.

In times of crisis like now when we have high inflation, a recession, rapid changes in technology, and lots of geopolitical tension, too many councilors and those in the management team are not taking the time out to think in a fresh bold manner, instead you are all falling victim to incrementalisation or just doing the same old, same old.

You need to ask yourself what do you want WDC to become?

What will it take to get there?

Difficult times present opportunities to go beyond incremental strategy and operational change to reinvent the company and make it fit for the future.

I hear people talk of transformation, I even think I saw WDC looking to appoint a transformation manager.

Long term success requires reinvention across multiple fronts in any company including WDC. What is reinvention you may ask, to me its:

- Breakthrough innovation.
- Increased resilience in face of disruption.
- Enhanced ability to create value for shareholders.
- Creating a culture that influences stakeholders to move the company forward.
- Collaboration with other councils

All councils are making statements about large rates increases. I don't see any talking about ambitious and holistic transformations that require employees throughout the organisation to work in a co-ordinated manner towards a common goal.

If we are going to reinvent the company five actions are crucial:

- Be open about the leadership journey
- Tackle the skills gap

- 1. We would like to talk to our submission to the Draft Annual Plan 2024/2025 when given the opportunity to do so.
- 2. We note the draft plan as it relates to Ngāruawāhia specifically addresses town centre related projects, through things like the library community hub/feasibility study.
- 3. Feasibility for Library/Hub
 - a. Was there any due diligence done before purchasing Waipā Tavern? There was also historical money allocated to fund the library development. Where did this go?
 - b. There has been significant work over the past ten years to undertake feasibility studies and report around the suitability of a multi-purpose hub. At that point it was to include the Arts Centre which Council has now purchased a completely additional site for, which requires considerable investment in itself.
 - c. The Arts Centre provides one of the biggest contributions to our community now and is hugely valued. It is disappointing that this investment in the collective hub has been so delayed and poorly timed that now we have a further additional asset that is requiring huge investment/upkeep, instead of building the purpose built building that was required years ago.
- 4. CCTV Little impact when existing cameras in Ngāruawāhia for example are very difficult to access and police are not even aware they exist. Monitoring plan for high risk areas should be a relatively limited spend with the advent of AI analysis and alerts when issues arise, rather than large capital investment and maintenance for an asset that will simply deteriorate and have little impact/use.
- 5. Footpaths Two large pools. Ngāruawāhia town centre footpaths are in dire need of a water blast and clean up. Economic reports are indicating that public investment is needed to support town rejuvenation. When the most basic of upkeep by Council is not undertaken, that is not going to achieve. The Durham Street footpath continues to be embarrassing. All possible avenues have been attempted to get this resealed including multiple in person meetings, emails, phone calls, health and safety complaints and online requests for service. When there are two funds available for footpath maintenance, it's a huge disappointment that the 16 businesses and all community users, can't get this achieved no matter the number of complaints that are made.
- 6. Beautification Fund We think this should remain and we request that some of this fund be allocated for footpath rejuvenation in the town centre and resurfacing the full footpath along Durham Precinct.
- 7. Mana Whenua and relationships continuing to be built under JMA's will only strengthen our community as a whole. Support ongoing role of Māori Councillors.
- Consenting We support bringing this in house as proposed as long as the skills required are on hand. This requires a focused attempt at employing skilled staff and maintaining them. This should also help with ensuring there is community specific knowledge when processing consents, which is essential.
- 9. Organisational support Data Costs and software. It would be a good time to review these to ensure they are still fit for purpose, prior to investing further. Technology has improved rapidly in the past decade and the services now available are considerably cheaper and effective.
- 10. Development Contributions As long as the ability for Council to negotiate on these is always available, then the proposed changes are fair. Everything should be negotiable based on opportunities and costs.

"We know that our current financial projections are not affordable for many ratepayers and members of the community"

This is correct and every effort to reduce the increase must be made.

I offer the following comments for you re-evaluation:

1. I have gone back to Stats NZ and various other documents and found a discrepancy in the rates collected and rates that should be paid. Why is this? If all ratepayers paid for their services we would not need this discussion. I am not party to the councils collection information but my estimates indicate something may be amiss. My spreadsheet is attached.

2. We live in a time when businesses transacting millions of dollars and involving many people without physical commercial premises and are using the council or public facilities. I question whether they are paying their share. I refer to the software and internet businesses and the service providers. There are the electrical and fibre internet boxes also the cell phone towers and associate services. If companies are using council land and services there should be a contribution to council for rates.

3. In Raglan as a beachside centre, many visitors are not contributing to the rates burden but expect free facilities at the expense of local ratepayers. This is a difficult issue but can a taxpaid contribution be made from Tourism NZ for this?

While not being party to the Rates collection figures, I have the indication that the rates increase burden is being put on genuine residents and the view needs to be widened to include all peoples and businesses that use council facilities.

General:

- We support Waikato District Council's decision to prepare an annual plan rather than a Long Term Plan due to the high level of uncertainty around government reform
- We agree that affordability is a serious issue for Waikato District Council, business and households across our district. A 13.75% rates increase will add to many already financially stretched rural business and households. We do not support this level of increase.
- We submit that before Waikato District Council looks at lowering levels of service they look at being more efficient in everything Waikato District Council undertakes especially big ticket items like roading and parks and reserves maintenance
- We submit that Waikato District Council sticks to its core business such as roading, water services, parks and reserves and ensures that it is conducted in the most efficient way possible
- As a rural community board we agree that regulations imposed by central government, and the number of them, significantly increase the cost of projects. We trust that your newly formed Rural Economic Advisory Panel will advocate for the rural sector regarding this.

Roading

- We submit that with regard to roading WDC must significantly increase their spend on maintenance of water tables and culverts around the entire district. We all understand roading is expensive so it is vital that the roading assets are protected, as well as individual properties from flooding.
- We submit that Waikato District Council needs a robust auditing process for service requests to be sure that they have actually been completed before they are closed. If this does not take place performance measures cannot be measured accurately.
- We also submit that Waikato District Council look into the efficiency of the Alliance until the term of the contract ends. On farm we always try and do a job once, and do it right. While this sounds very simple, it is not what we see at times in our area from the Alliance.

Water, Waste Water and Storm water

- We support Waikato District Council postponing non critical work being completed with regard to water, wastewater and stormwater to protect rate increases however if any of these works affect protecting WDC assets we urge that it be scheduled for as soon as financially possible.
- We support Waikato District Council's targeted rates for water, waste water and stormwater.
- We submit that the cost of loan funding the debt to extend Huntly's network and improve water quality should be funded by the districtwide water targeted rate NOT the general rate as stated on page 17 in the consultation document.

Footpaths, Parks and Reserves, Playgrounds

- In these tough financial times we submit that you consider the cost and necessity of any
 footpaths installed. We support footpaths being installed where road safety is an issue. We
 would like to see the "must do's done, and the nice to do's on a waiting list.
- We submit that with regard to playground renewals Waikato District Council inspects all playgrounds as they fall due for renewal and ensures that only playgrounds which are unsafe are replaced. For a ratepayer's perspective it often appears that perfectly good playgrounds are simply replaced because they are due for renewal when it appears there is still years of life and fun left in them.

Communication

- We support the Waikato District Council's strategic priorities of building community resilience, building relationships, consistent delivery of core services, improving connectivity, supporting sustainable growth, and most importantly improving council's responsiveness. Some of our board members have struggled for some time now to have their phone calls to staff returned while following up issues. This is unacceptable.
- We also submit that when Waikato District Council tells us something will be done, that it must be done, or a good reason is communicated why it could not be done. This issue has caused a considerable amount of Board member's time wasted in chasing up Waikato District Council promises that were not delivered. This actually damages the credibility of both Waikato District Council and our Community Board.
- For our Community Board to be successful we need to be able to communicate with WDC staff. If this can't happen, we as a Board cannot deliver responses, and value, to our community, who pay a targeted rate to have us.

Community Halls and WDC

- We submit that the cost of council owned community halls which require urgent repairs needs to be borne by the community using the asset. We support WDC assisting these communities to get their facilities up to code but it is unclear in the consultation how the proposed "assistance fund" will be repaid, and by who. We believe that any assistance fund for structural repairs need to be repaid by the targeted rate for the building, and not by general rate.
- We support Waikato District Council's decision to dispose of old, condemned or erosion affected buildings as long as they are owned by Waikato District Council.

Draft Enhanced Annual Plan 2024-2034: Submission from Tourism Export Council of New Zealand

On behalf of the Tourism Export Council of New Zealand (TECNZ) we are writing in support of Hamilton Waikato Tourism (HWT) for ongoing funding in the event any proposed funding cuts in the Draft 2024/25 Enhanced Annual Plan are being considered for Hamilton Waikato Tourism.

The Tourism Export Council of New Zealand is the private sector **national tourism organisation** that influences visitor flows in the **international tourism** sector. Our primary members, Inbound Tour Operators (ITOs) act as the commercial conduit with tourism businesses in your community with offshore markets (like Fonterra does). ITOs package up New Zealand tourism suppliers into an itinerary and sell offshore to tour wholesalers and travel agents to make it easier for prospective visitors to New Zealand to 'buy' a New Zealand holiday.

ITOs work very closely with regional tourism organisations like Hamilton Waikato Tourism. ITOs rely on RTOs to keep them updated with new visitor experiences, products and plans so when ITOs go to sell the region offshore they are fully up to date with what businesses can be included from the Waikato District.

Waikato's visitor products and experiences are promoted through the great work the RTO does and also by local visitor experiences in Raglan, Gordonton and Ngāruawāhia. When you think of all the visitors your district sees (particularly international visitors), every business (restaurant, eateries, motels, B&Bs, supermarkets, cafes, petrol stations) has to ask themselves, how does a visitor know to come to our town/s or walk through my front door? Does a café or motel owner go offshore to market their business (café) to international visitors? In most cases, the answer is no.

Visitors find their way to the front door of accommodation providers, cafes, and retail outlets because of the following parties promoting and marketing your district.

- Hamilton Waikato Tourism (RTO) has been investing and promoting the district offshore and domestically
- ITOs have been investing, promoting and packaging up your visitor products and experiences
- Some Waikato businesses may invest in marketing to promote the district

The collective investment by these parties has resulted in the Waikato district having a positive profile in many countries resulting in travel agents putting Waikato on their New Zealand itineraries.

Without having a fully resourced RTO capability in the future who can objectively continue to promote all the **paid** and **free** experiences visitors can do (walks, coastal areas, reserves, cycling, visiting heritage sites, gardens etc.), there is potential for less international visitors to put Waikato on their NZ itineraries.

Tourism operates 'in advance' of when visitors arrive and spend money in the district often marketing twothree years in advance.

HWT is a fully functioning RTO that undertakes marketing activity and destination management in the following areas:

- International marketing (holiday visitors)
- Domestic marketing (leisure)
- Event marketing (events that attract visitors from outside the region)
- Conference and incentive marketing
- The RTO works with airports, transport providers, event managers, Iwi and government agencies like Department of Conservation, NZ Transport Authority, NZ Cycle Trust that help influence improved services and infrastructure for ratepayers as well as for visitors.

If funding is reduced, some marketing activity and engagement with destination management planning will be affected.

- Reduced funding = reduced marketing activity
- Working with travel trade (offshore travel agents and tour wholesalers) takes years to establish
 reputation. Once the relationship the RTO has with offshore travel trade has been severed (if the
 RTO no longer is able to do in-market training with agents) it can take years to rebuild a new
 relationship.
- A dilution of the RTOs message could see less visitors in the future. The RTO is the primary voice in attracting visitors in a competitive market to your local area.
- If there are less visitors there is the potential for job losses within the community

Hamilton Waikato Tourism is highly valued within the New Zealand tourism industry and with offshore trade. Through its exceptional leadership by Nicola Greenwell and the great work that the team does offshore with training agents, and onshore with Inbound Tour Operators, they have built strong, credible, and valued relationships with industry. The HWT team are great ambassadors for your district and region, and they work with pride in representing and promoting Council's visitor services, products, venues and experiences.

We (TECNZ) are mindful that Councils have enormous pressure on budgets as you face many planned and unplanned expenses and costs in order to serve your community well. It is a challenging time economically and that affects some of the services you provide ratepayers.

We hope in the event with your budgeting you can retain the same level of funding for Hamilton Waikato Tourism. We know you will continue to be served well by the HWT team in the future.

WEST WAIKATO COASTAL COMMUNITY CATCHMENT GROUP INC

Background:

The West Waikato Coastal Community Catchment Incorporated Society (WWCC) was formed with visions and goals.

In 2023 a group of farmers, community members and tangata whenua gathered with a desire to improve the environment they lived, worked and played in.

WWCC have developed a 5 -10-year plan with actions and costed them out to achieve their aims. It involves a significant amount of community engagement through Farm Plans, Biodiversity actions and movement to be Carbon Zero by 2050.

Community resilience is at the forefront, with farmer/community wellbeing being addressed through knowledge, communication and recreation.

To achieve their vision WWCC will foster new relationships with other stakeholders. These will be built on mutual trust and respect and will have the desire for West Waikato Coastal Community to be better places at its core.

West Waikato Coastal Community Catchment incorporated was officially formed in March 2023, (NZBN: 9429051221676) West Waikato Coastal Community catchment is an Incorporated Society taking a long-term beneficial approach to facilitating change in their community to promote resilience and avenues to thrive.

We have 3 primary objectives that are interconnected:

- 1. To facilitate positive change in respect to improving the water, soil, air, cultural and community standards that the community has set.
- 2. To ensure that farming fits the landscape and enhances the self-worth of the community.
- 3. To educate and inform the community so the ownership rests rightly with the inhabitants.

Key aims are:

- o Enhancing Community Wellness
- o Understanding our whenua, biodiversity and history
- o Incentivizing a change in mindset and behavior on farm
- Increasing community knowledge and expertise to support growing, planting and maintaining plants/trees in the right place, for the right purpose
- reducing atmospheric greenhouse gas concentrations
- o improving water quality
- o enriching indigenous biodiversity

- o reducing soil loss
- o Introducing new technologies to enable the community to track and measure progress.
- o Build inter community knowledge of the culture and history of the community.
- Build relationships with key stakeholders to build our shared future

WWCC looks to help rural communities and farmers understand their environmental impact and ensures that best practice is promoted in "business as usual' to get positive outcomes. It aims to build knowledge and understanding, source funding, and work alongside farmers to promote sustainable farming practices. In doing this WWCC endeavors to ensure our rural communities can thrive and support future generations to live and farm rurally.

The group is a community-led initiative. Linkages have been made and are developing with the Waikato Regional Council, as well as the Waikato District Council.

The catchment logically includes Port Waikato, Waikaretu and Te Akau communities as these are commonly bound by Marae and community ties. It has at its heart Pukerewa Marae (Tainui, Ngāti Taahinga), Te Akau Marae (Tainui, Ngāti Taahinga) and Weraroa Marae (Tainui Ngāti Taahinga), two schools, two play centres, a fire station and community halls. The population is mainly rural, WWCC has worked from the outset to be all inclusive, forging strong ties with Iwi, who are included in all discussions. The catchment area also falls within the hapu of Ngaati Tamainupoo.

SUBMISSION FROM WWCC

MAINTAINING ROADING

THAT THE MAINTENANCE FOR UNSEALED ROADS IN INCREASED ABOVE THE IMPROVEMENT INCREASE OF \$1.5M

District wide road surface safety improvements increased by \$1.5m

Roading should provide a well designed and fit for purpose transport network that gives people choices how they move around districts.

The roading network in our area is critical to create a strong and resilient network which is a critical factor in ensuring a strong rural economy and a liveable, thriving and connected community. We do not believe that this connected community has fit for purpose roading in order to create a liveable and thriving community.

Currently our roads are not maintained to an acceptable level. Rural people are often remote and there may be only one road exit. Also cellular coverage is weak in some areas. In the event of an emergency it is imperative that all services are available.

The number of pot holes is increasing significantly with a much longer delay in attending to them.

Consistent delivery of core services – delayed and needs to be completed in shorter time periods.

Improved council responsiveness: Currently the use of the ap ANTENNO is an easy way to report a problem but the delay in attending to those reports has extended considerable in the last year.

Emergency Management: We are concerned that in the event of an adverse weather event we will be even more remote and will not be able to attend the emergency centre because of the lack of roading maintenance. The Emergency centre would be the Community Hall at Port Waikato and the Te Akau Waingaro Community Complex as both properties have been identified by MBIE and will receive solar power. This is all wonderful but only if people can get to the centre.

SOLID WASTE

THAT ONCE A MONTH A RECYCLING OPTION IS GIVEN TO RESIDENTS OF TE AKAU AND SURROUNDING AREAS TO DROP OFF THEIR RECYCLING AT A LOCAL COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Currently there are no services available for Waingaro Road north of Waingaro Hot Pools and therefore no remote rural areas have anywhere available to have their recycling taken and dealt with in the correct manner. Currently remote rural residents must drive to Hamilton or Raglan and then pay for their recycling.

SUBMISSION FROM WWCC

MAINTAINING ROADING

THAT THE MAINTENANCE FOR UNSEALED ROADS IN INCREASED ABOVE THE IMPROVEMENT INCREASE OF \$1.5M

District wide road surface safety improvements increased by \$1.5m

Roading should provide a well designed and fit for purpose transport network that gives people choices how they move around districts.

The roading network in our area is critical to create a strong and resilient network which is a critical factor in ensuring a strong rural economy and a liveable, thriving and connected community. We do not believe that this connected community has fit for purpose roading in order to create a liveable and thriving community.

Currently our roads are not maintained to an acceptable level. Rural people are often remote and there may be only one road exit. Also cellular coverage is weak in some areas. In the event of an emergency it is imperative that all services are available. The number of pot holes is increasing significantly with a much longer delay in attending to them.

Consistent delivery of core services – delayed and needs to be completed in shorter time periods.

Improved council responsiveness: Currently the use of the ap ANTENNO is an easy way to report a problem but the delay in attending to those reports has extended considerable in the last year.

Emergency Management: We are concerned that in the event of an adverse weather event we will be even more remote and will not be able to attend the emergency centre because of the lack of roading maintenance. The Emergency centre would be the Community Hall at Port Waikato and the Te Akau Waingaro Community Complex as both properties have been identified by MBIE and will receive solar power. This is all wonderful but only if people can get to the centre.

SOLID WASTE

THAT ONCE A MONTH A RECYCLING OPTION IS GIVEN TO RESIDENTS OF TE AKAU AND SURROUNDING AREAS TO DROP OFF THEIR RECYCLING AT A LOCAL COMMUNITY CENTRE.

Currently there are no services available for Waingaro Road north of Waingaro Hot Pools and therefore no remote rural areas have anywhere available to have their recycling taken and dealt with in the correct manner. Currently remote rural residents must drive to Hamilton or Raglan and then pay for their recycling.

Could it be possible for a recycling pick up to be done once a month in a community area such as Te Akau Waingaro Community Complex and the recycling could be brought to the centre by the residents as a drop off point on the day.

Introduction

- 1. This submission on the Waikato District Council Draft 2024/25 Annual Plan is made on behalf of the Ngāti Hauā lwi Trust.
- Ngāti Hauā descend from the eponymous ancestor Hauā, a direct descendant of Hoturoa, the captain of the Tainui waka. The hapū of Ngāti Hauā are Ngāti Te Oro, Ngāti Werewere, Ngāti Waenganui, Ngāti Te Rangitaupi and Ngāti Rangi Tawhaki. The 2018 Census data estimates 7,275 people affiliate to Ngāti Hauā.
- 3. The Ngāti Hauā rohe spans from Te Aroha, south along the Kaimai Range to Te Weraiti, from Te Weraiti west to Maungatautari then northwest to Te Rapa, from Te Rapa eastward to Mangateparu and then to Te Aroha. Part of the Ngāti Hauā rohe, including two of our marae Te Iti o Hauā and Waimakariri are located within the Waikato District Council boundary.
- 4. The Ngāti Hauā Area of Interest is depicted in the Ngāti Hauā Deed of Settlement and is **attached** as Schedule A.

KEY MATTERS OF CONCERN

MARAE INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS

 In comparing the draft plan with individual Infrastructures Needs Assessments completed for our marae, we note that both Waimakariri and Te Iti o Hauā have a unique mix of drinking water, wastewater and stormwater-related challenges and priority actions. immediate interventions, mid-term upgrades and long-term strategic planning is required in a co-ordinated effort to address these issues. Collectively, these are:

IMMEDIATE INTERVENTIONS

- Water Quality & Contamination Prevention: Implement systematic upgrades to ensure all marae have access to safe, reliable drinking water. For marae with identified potential contamination risks or inadequate drinking water treatment, immediate water testing and installation of appropriate treatment systems, where not already in place. Prioritise marae relying on bore, creek, spring, or dam sources.
- Enhanced Water Storage: Install on-site water storage solutions across all marae to improve water resilience and self-sufficiency. Prioritise marae in remote areas without on-site water storage
- Wastewater System Overhaul: Upgrade or replace on-site wastewater treatment systems for marae with wastewater challenges.
- Flood & Ponding Mitigation: Upgrade basic stormwater infrastructure to address flooding and ponding, especially where they coincide in rural areas with inadequate stormwater infrastructure.

MID-TERM UPGRADES

- Rainwater Harvesting: Establish rainwater harvesting systems to promote water conservation and serve as a backup water supply for gardening and blackwater use. Prioritise marae in rural areas experiencing water shortage and supply issues.
- Stormwater Management Enhancement: Install or improve stormwater management systems, incorporating green infrastructure solutions such as rain gardens or permeable pavements to enhance water absorption and reduce runoff.

THREE WATERS IN THE WAIKATO DISTRICT

1. While the draft plan proposes a \$115.5 million spend on drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater maintenance, upgrades, and operational costs – there appears to be no new projects, investment activity and financial commitment tagged to the Matangi residential area in relation to these services.

The \$115.5 million spend has tagged;

\$65.5 million on wastewater treatment and disposal,

\$32.8 million to treat and supply water, and another

\$17.2 million on stormwater

2. Further still, Waikato District Council has proposed postponement of "non-critical water projects", while a portion of required costs will be met through loan-funding;

"To reduce the rating impact this year, we're proposing to postpone some non-critical water projects until future years. \$27.4 million for drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure development will be loan-funded."

EFFECTS OF THREE WATERS REPEAL

- The effect of the Three Waters repeal legislation means that council assets (and their debt liabilities) now sit squarely with individual councils and their ratepayers until alternative arrangements can be made.
- 2. Such arrangements cannot be made until the Coalition Government passes new legislation for the purpose; to deliver on its replacement 'Local Water Done Well'. This is not expected to be in place until December 2024.
- In addition to these changes, the Waikato district is set to face water services challenges which arise from its current and unique water services arrangement held with Watercare;

"...Watercare has given notice that it will cease its contract with the Council in 2026, and we need a new approach. Following the approval of this Annual Plan, the Council will work on a solution for delivering water services beyond 2026 but want to assure you that your waters services will continue."

- 4. Under current central government policy settings, it is unclear how water services will be provided for across the Waikato District (and in light of the Watercare decision). This uncertainty arises from existing and future debt liabilities, investment shortfalls (including for upgrades and renewals), constrained council balance sheets and an already hamstrung local ratepayer base.
- Until then (and by legislation) councils are still required to develop their Long-Term-Plans or Annual Plans/'Enhanced Annual Plans' where in which they will be required to consult with the public on the state of their Three Waters assets and services; and their challenges.
- 6. Local government constraints on funding tools also means that there appears to be a reliance on Central Government to provide support and until a new funding model is found to address Three Waters infrastructure and services across the district, whānau can expect rates across the Waikato district to rise exponentially over time.
- 7. The current proposal sets out a General Rate Increase of 13.75\$ for the 2024/2025 Financial Year.
- For the Waikato district and as compared against this Enhanced Annual Plan 2024/2025; this includes cost increases to interim charges for properties connecting to the reticulated wastewater network.

"While we have a plan for this financial year, again, we will be having conversations with the government about the affordability issues specifically relating to your water services and infrastructure, and longer-term implications for local communities."

KEY FEEDBACK AREAS IN DRAFT PLAN

1. Reduction in council services

Waikato District Council is seeking feedback on potential areas for reducing existing services delivered by council, including three waters services.

It is unclear how a reduction in three waters services will address challenges faced by marae. This is exacerbated further by the recent Watercare decision raised previously.


2. Feedback on council work program, development contribution, fees & charges for 2024/2025

Submission on funding for Hamilton & Waikato Tourism – Waikato District Council Draft Annual Plan 2024/25

- 1 Air New Zealand welcomes the opportunity to submit on Waikato District Council's Draft Annual Plan 2024/2025. We write in support of maintaining Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (HWT) funding at the current level.
- 1.1 Air New Zealand values HWT's impact on lifting Hamilton & Waikato's reputation as a visitor destination, providing immediate and long-term benefits to the prosperity and vibrancy of Waikato District for both businesses and residents. International and domestic visitors spent \$1.87 billion annually¹ in the Waikato the fifth highest in New Zealand. As the main hub for the region, this spending directly benefitted Hamilton businesses, including accommodation, attractions, transport, and retail.
- 1.2 Given the visitor economy is still suffering from the long-tail of impacts from Covid-19 and the current cost of living crisis, the timing is not right to reduce any further support for HWT as the sector struggles to rebuild and maintain competitiveness in an ever-changing international market. With the gradual return of international travellers from markets such as China and Japan, Tourism New Zealand and Air New Zealand are working harder than ever to ensure that travellers return to New Zealand, while HWT supports us to ensure the choice is Waikato. This, in turn, helps support a growth pipeline of visitors to the district, including Raglan, Zealong Tea Estate, Hampton Downs, Woodlands and all the unique communities of Waikato.

- 1.3 In our view, HWT is one of the most high-performing Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO) in New Zealand who operate with the least funding. The RTO has a pivotal role to play in the further recovery of Waikato District's visitor economy, social and cultural wellbeing. It targets promotion and marketing effort efficiently and effectively by partnering with other regions, Air New Zealand and Tourism New Zealand. The reduced funding will mean that Hamilton and Waikato will not be represented in key offshore events and campaigns.
- 1.4 The approach taken by HWT, and the expertise of its staff, gives Air New Zealand a high degree of confidence to regularly partner with HWT and invest in tourism promotion activity for the region. This includes:
 - (a) Air NZ retail marketing campaigns promoting travel to Waikato District, and the wider Waikato region, in all our international markets.

5 Involvement with Council

Our partnership with Territorial Authorities is crucial for support and communication. This collaboration aids in guiding productions through protocols and processes efficiently. Our upcoming website launch in April 2024 will further enhance this collaboration. Ideally, linking Waikato Screen NZ's website with Territorial Authorities will streamline enquiries and support the filmmaking process. This connection will also enable us to generate economic impact reports, providing insights into how each production benefits our communities. Progress on the location directory involves sharing images of unique locations with councils and NZFC to attract productions. Engaging with council staff aims to improve support for film logistics, permitting, traffic management and advancing our goal of becoming a more 'film-friendly' region.

6 Key achievements in the past year

Significant achievements have been made in bringing filming into the Waikato.

Notably and publicly, the Netflix production Beyond Goodbye was filmed in Raglan. The Waikato hosted a crew of 130 that resided in both Raglan and Hamilton.

Estimated economic spend included:

- 50 crew stayed 7 days in Hamilton (2 rest-days) (\$50,500)
- Estimated Rest Day spend (\$15,000)
- 80-person accommodation in the Raglan and surrounding area (\$120,000)

- Parking unit base sites x 3 rented from Raglan Club, Raglan Rugby Club and the Kokore (on iwi land) & multiple personal driveways (\$20,000)
- Local security company hired to employ security approx. (\$20,000)
- Approx 90 locals employed, including extras, production assistants (\$30,000), beach drivers and security (as above)
- Donations made to surf lifesaving (\$2,000)
- Catering and craft services purchased locally (\$30,000)
- Koha was provided for powhiri and lunch from Poihakena Marae (\$5,000)
- Crew per diems spent locally (\$16,000)
- Estimated total \$324,500

The importance of having a film office.

A film office facilitates crucial connections for productions, including business engagement, council contacts, traffic management and securing unique locations. These connections lead to economic opportunities for local businesses, employment, and cultural engagement, ultimately enhancing the region's appeal for filming. Our dedication and connections have created greater a direct impact on the economy and culture. Introduction

1. Waikato Regional Council (WRC) appreciates the opportunity to make a submission on Waikato District Council's 2024-2034 draft Annual Plan.

Regional connections and opportunities for synergies

1. WRC would like to acknowledge the close and collegial working relationship shared between our two councils. Significant growth pressures in the Future Proof subregion, and a changing climate, are necessitating greater collaboration in how we allocate our resources to optimise the wellbeing of our communities. As we respond to these challenges and changes, we look forward to exploring further opportunities for synergies to improve outcomes for our region.

2. Through our 2024-2034 Long Term Plan, WRC has made a commitment to investing in the future of spatial planning for the region. We encourage Waikato District Council to consider making resources available to collaborate on this important work, which will lead us to a strategic approach to planning and ensure that development is sustainable, balanced and meets the needs of our communities.

Waikato Biodiversity Accord

3. Waikato Regional Council is progressing a Waikato Biodiversity Accord and regional biodiversity strategy to respond to the need to address biodiversity loss in the region. These are goals in the council's Strategic Direction. The regional biodiversity strategy is also a statutory requirement under the National Policy Statement for Indigenous Biodiversity.

4. The Waikato Biodiversity Accord is the first step in developing the strategy. It is intended to be a high-level agreement between regional council, iwi, territorial authorities, Department of Conservation, Ministry for Primary Industries, and QEII National Trust.

 Signing the Waikato Biodiversity Accord signals a commitment to work together to develop and implement a regional biodiversity strategy. The strategy will set out a vision for landscape-scale restoration of biodiversity and it will contain actions to enhance and restore biodiversity in the region but at this stage we don't yet know what those actions will be. Developing a strategy together includes having discussions about the costs and constraints surrounding those actions.
 We note that regional council staff were involved in the Waikato District Council's preparation of the Taiao in the Waikato district biodiversity strategy, adopted in 2023. This has provided an excellent opportunity to share information on the biodiversity of the district and the region and to align the biodiversity priorities of both councils.

7. WRC would like a commitment from territorial authorities and other partners to devote some staff time over the next couple of years to help develop the regional biodiversity strategy. It may involve attendance at workshops/hui, providing ideas and options and/or reviewing draft content for the strategy. However, this will be tailored to the stakeholder and their capacity to engage. 8. Agreed actions can then be costed as part of the engagement process and brought into the next long term/annual plan rounds beginning in 2027. This will be an important step to implement the strategy. 9. Once the strategy is finalised, the Accord will be the basis for facilitating regular communications and meetings between the signatory parties to monitor and demonstrate progress with the strategy actions.

10. To date, the council has held two workshops to develop the content of the Accord. Senior planning staff from Waikato District Council have participated in these workshops. A draft Accord has been prepared and this will be finalised by June 2024 following further feedback. The accord will then be ready for signing by the Accord parties.

Q1 Do you have any comments on our draft work programme for 2024/25? (Our Draft Capital Works Programme)

Current levels of service cannot be met by the income generated solely by the number of rate payers. Properties currently having exemption from rates should be re-examined. Exemption from taxes should be sufficient; as everyone uses council roads, lights etc. Many rate payers contribute to items/amenities that they do not use or have.

Government input needs to be higher especially for unfunded mandates. Basic infra-structure has been Council's core business which government has eroded by imposing high levels of social wellbeing as more important.

This wellbeing is only achievable if core infra-structure is in place.

Water, Wastewater & Storm-water key focus. All need greater government contribution or the introduction of alternative methods of revenue raising.

Due consideration is required for in-fill housing and storm-water impact; composting toilets [especially parks & reserves as they have in Australia].

When costs outweigh rating income all other amenities need to be prioritised; delayed or provided at more affordable levels.

At present the user's perspective of levels of service far exceed what the council can provide. Council should not be responsible for providing everything that their rate payers desire.

Strategic priorities [p.10 in booklet] are not given an order of priority, why? Neither are the 'areas' clear as to what it is council are focusing on and for whom.

Core services and council responsiveness should be priority for investment. Connectivity & sustainable growth next with the last very low on essential funding list until economic circumstances change.

Governance [p.11 in booklet] mentions a new community board for Port Waikato. Why is this not a community committee? When the Tamahere Community Committee was formed we were told that council did not want any more boards, what has changed? Is funding from a targeted rate for all boards.

Does council want existing committees to now become boards? Also mentioned is a strategic advisor for Maaori. Why is this necessary when council has an excellent existing methodology of dealing with all such matters?

Fees & Charges [p.19 in booklet] mentions 'user pays' versus 'general rate'. The balance often seems awry and public transport seems to fall into a grey area. This will become important to rate payers if Regional Council takes over all revenue gathering.

Introduction

- 1. Hamilton City Council welcomes the opportunity to make a submission to Waikato District Council's 2024/25 Draft Annual Plan (Consultation Document).
- 2. Hamilton City Council supports the direction of Waikato District Council's 2024/25 Draft Annual Plan, recognising the significant financial constraints that are impacting local government across the country and the ongoing uncertainty regarding new waters legislation.
- **3.** Along with many other councils throughout New Zealand, Hamilton City Council is facing significant rates rises across the forthcoming years to continue to provide existing levels of service, without considering additional investment to keep pace with projected growth.
- 4. As these affordability issues are impacting all of local government, ongoing collaboration between our two councils, looking at further opportunities for shared services and efficiencies, and innovative solutions for three waters will become increasingly more important.
- 5. We look forward to continuing to work closely through our governance and staff relationships as we navigate the challenges ahead.

Collaborative Investment Priorities

- 6. Through Future Proof, a number of sub-regional priorities have been identified and agreed to by the partners, including strategic infrastructure projects such as the Southern Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Pukete Wastewater Treatment Plant, and other wastewater upgrades.
- 7. We look forward to continuing discussions in line with the Detailed Business Case on the funding models for how Waikato communities connect to these facilities in the future.

Three Waters

- **8.** We recognise that Watercare has given notice that it will cease its contract with Waikato District Council in 2026, which requires a new approach to delivering waters services.
- **9.** We note that Waikato District Council and Hamilton City Council have commenced due diligence, and we look forward to working together as we jointly explore water delivery options.
- It is likely we will need to seek external advice and resource that both our councils will need to address as we move at pace to meet the Government's requirement for a Water Delivery Plan by 30 June 2025.

Opportunities for Operational Efficiencies

- **11.** Noting the significant funding challenges that local government is facing, Hamilton City Council seeks to continue to work closely with neighbouring councils on opportunities for shared services that may provide cost savings for ratepayers.
- **12.** We have a number of successful cross-boundary arrangements in place for existing services, and we look forward to future discussions on these and other collaborative opportunities.

SUBMISSION TO WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCIL DRAFT 2024/25 ANNUAL PLAN

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Waikato Federated Farmers (WFF) welcomes the opportunity to submit to Waikato District Council (WDC) on its *Draft 2024/25 Annual Plan*.
- 1.2 WFF submits on Annual Plans (**APs**) and Long-term Plans (**LTPs**) throughout New Zealand and make constructive proposals whenever the opportunity is provided.
- 1.3 WFF also submit on central government policies that affect local government revenue and spending, with the aim of ensuring that local government has the appropriate resources to carry out their functions.
- 1.4 WFF base our arguments on the considerable cost of rates to farm businesses, in terms of the value and relative accessibility of farmers to ratepayer funded services, the rates levels on farms compared to other residents and businesses, and the failure of property value to reflect the incomes of farmers and their relative ability to pay.
- 1.5 WFF's feedback represents the views ~440 farming members and rate payers from the Waikato District. We gently remind Waikato District Council of this so that our members' views, expressed here, are weighed appropriately.
- 1.6 Federated Farmers is focused on the transparency of rate setting, rates equity and both the overall and relative cost of local government on rural ratepayers.
- 1.7 WFF is conscious that there may be significant 'consultation fatigue' out in the community, following the 18 months' worth of significant central government proposals.
- 1.8 Our members do not want their busy silence to be misconstrued as disinterest in the proposed changes. Given the challenging regulatory and economic environment we are currently in, we acknowledge this may result in a low response rate to the consultation process.
- 1.9 We acknowledge any submissions from individual members of Federated Farmers.
- 1.10 WFF requests the opportunity to discuss this submission with the Council during the hearing process.

2. SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC finds further cost savings to lower the proposed rate increase of 13.75% for the 2024/2025 year, and focus on helping ratepayers make it through current financial difficulties due to inflation.
- 2.2 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should review all its proposed capital projects to ensure they are appropriate, prioritised and timed to maximise their benefits and costs.

- 2.3 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC focuses on the "must haves", key core essentials not the "should haves" or "nice to haves" in this proposed 2024/2025 annual plan.

- 2.7 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC stop budgeting for new walking and cycling connections.
- 2.8 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC continues to resource an in-house enterprise project management office to oversee the delivery of capital roading projects and to include maintenance and renewals.
- 2.9 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC does not adopt Waikato Regional Council's public transport funding proposal.
- 2.10 Recommendation: WFF recommends that the proposed general rate subsidy of the Huntly water upgrades is not adopted as proposed.
- 2.11 Recommendation: WFF recommends that water and wastewater services continue to be a targeted rate charged as a past-the-gate cost for this annual year and into the future.

- 2.19 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC adopt the proposed reduced charge for overweight permits, and the reduced penalty for non-notification of corridor maintenance.
- 2.20 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC adopt the proposed maximum fee increases for motor rallies road usage.
- 2.21 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should provide a discount for working dog registration fees for subsequent dogs which are additional to the first working dog.
- 2.22 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC introduces a flat fee to provide a discount for teams of 10 working dogs.
- 2.23 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should include a rates remission policy to provide relief from the UAGC and targeted rates for non-contiguous land which is farmed as a single entity.
- 2.24 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC includes a remission of rates for properties that have been affected by 'natural disasters', which includes 'declared droughts' and any 'large scale adverse event'.

3. GENERAL COMMENTS

General Rates

- 3.1 Waikato Federated Farmers would like to commend WDC on the preparation and presentation of the Annual Plan 2024/25 Consultation Document.
- 3.2 WFF is also aware of government demands and economic pressures that have created serious affordability issues. We commend WDC's approach to making cost savings and focusing on keeping services ticking over.
- 3.3 WFF urges caution with continuing to complete pre-planned projects in the 2024/25 year when WDC indicated it was pausing and waiting upon further certainty with government legislation and Waka Kotahi funding.
- 3.4 WFF advises that some areas of the primary sector are facing difficult economic times, with farm profit forecasted to decrease an estimated 31 per cent for 2023-24, following a 32 per cent decline

in the previous season. Additionally, many households across the district are facing significant financial pressure as inflation increases the cost of living.

- 3.5 WFF requests that WDC find further cost savings to lower the proposed rate increase of 13.75% for the 2024/2025 year, and must focus on helping ratepayers make it through current financial difficulties.
- 3.6 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC finds further cost savings to lower the proposed rate increase of 13.75% for the 2024/2025 year, and focus on helping ratepayers make it through current financial difficulties due to inflation.

Approach to Debt:

- 3.7 WFF realises that increased government regulation, growth in the district and the current economic conditions are causing affordability issues for WDC and all national councils.
- 3.8 WFF is concerned with the proposed high increase of debt by WDC. While WFF understands that this is still within WDCs debt cap, a proposed 50% increase in the level of debt within a single financial year seems unsustainable.
- 3.9 WFF strongly urges WDC to review all its proposed capital projects to ensure they are appropriate, prioritised and timed to maximise their benefits and costs
- 3.10 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should review all its proposed capital projects to ensure they are appropriate, prioritised and timed to maximise their benefits and costs.
- 3.11 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC focuses on the "must haves", key core essentials not the "should haves" or "nice to haves" in this proposed 2024/2025 annual plan.

Uniform Annual General Charge

- 3.12 WFF strongly believes that WDC should fully utilise the UAGC mechanism at 30% of the total rates income, to provide equity for all ratepayers.
- 3.13 Low UAGCs are often employed *"to reduce the extremes of rates paid for the highest and lowest valued properties"*. This shifts a large often unsustainable portion of rates onto rural properties. The majority of Council expenditure benefits the whole district, this should be reflected in the base level of rates contributed by all ratepayers.
- 3.14 WFF does not accept the simplistic assumption that a property's value correlates to income or ability to pay. Central government has better information through the income tax system and is best placed to respond through its social support mechanisms. The Government's Rates Rebate Scheme is targeted specifically to provide rates relief to low-income ratepayers. We would support council to promote this scheme and actively encourage ratepayers to apply.

- 3.15 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should fully utilise the UAGC mechanism at 30% of the total rates income, to provide equity between ratepayers.
- 3.16 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC actively promotes the rates rebates scheme and actively encourages ratepayers to apply.

4. COMMENTS ON KEY ISSUES:

Roading Network:

- 4.1 WDC commends the WDC on introducing an in-house enterprise project management office to support the delivery of capital roading projects. This will ensure greater accountability and transparency with contract providers and their delivery.
- 4.2 The district's local roads are the lifeline of the farming community. They are the predominant benefit farmers receive from the council's service provisions. By our calculations, roads cost our farming families thousands of dollars each year in rates.
- 4.3 While we appreciate the challenges of inflation in maintenance and renewal costs, the present condition of many rural roads is inexcusable given the money received from rural ratepayers.
- 4.4 In fact, we could be more supportive of rate increases overall if we could trust that the council would focus that increased revenue on core infrastructure needs. Spending on community hubs, cycle trails, footpaths that are not for safety reasons, and feel-good initiatives, are not affordable at this time when core essentials are lacking in improvement.
- 4.5 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC continue with the current level of renewals of local roading as an absolute minimum level of service this annual year and into the future, as local roads are the lifeline for the farm community, district at large, and its economy.
- 4.6 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC stop budgeting for new walking and cycling connections.
- 4.7 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC continues to resource an in-house enterprise project management office to oversee the delivery of capital roading projects and to include maintenance and renewals.

Public Transport Funding Proposal:

- 4.8 WFF strongly disagrees with the proposed Public Transport funding proposal by Waikato Regional Council. WFF strongly agrees with continuing the charge of a general capped rate per property.
- 4.9 The rural community is relatively self-sufficient and should not be charged more for a service they are not likely to use.

4.10 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC does not adopt Waikato Regional Council's public transport funding proposal.

General Rates Subsidy of Water and Wastewater Costs:

- 4.11 Most farmers are not on the council drinking network and are not connected to the councilprovided wastewater services. We privately pay for these services through rural drinking water supply schemes charged at cost, small on-farm schemes, and septic tanks.
- 4.12 WFF is concerned that the proposed general rate subsidy of urban water, as indicated on page 17 with Huntly improvements, means that farmers will be reducing the cost for households connected to council networks, in addition to paying for their own services.
- 4.13 Recommendation: WFF recommends that the proposed general rate subsidy of the Huntly water upgrades is not adopted as proposed.
- 4.14 Recommendation: WFF recommends that water and wastewater services continue to be a targeted rate charged to ratepayers as a past-the-gate cost for this annual year and into the future.

5. COMMENTS ON FROM THE REMAINDER OF THE CONSULTATION DOCUMENT:

This section of the submission comments on the issues raised throughout the remainder of the consultation document.

- 5.1 WFF supports WDC's proposal to increase funding for the CCTV installation partnership, and strongly supports district-wide distribution of CCTV's to assist the rural communities with crime and damage, particularly to roading from "boy racers" and their associated crowds.
- 5.2 WFF requests that WDC only budget for the removal and disposal of Waikato District Council owned old, condemned or erosion-affected buildings.
- 5.3 WFF supports in part WDC's proposal to reduce funding to Hamilton Waikato Tourism, but requests that WDC consider removing this funding in its entirety.
- 5.4 WFF supports WDC's proposal to remove all the funding it provides to Te Waka.
- 5.5 WFF supports WDC's proposal to continue funding the Rural Economic Advisory Panel, community boards and other community committees.
- 5.6 WFF supports WDC's proposal for the inclusion of additional key performance indicators for response times for service requests and timeframes.

- 5.7 WFF supports WDC's proposal to continue working with communities to plan and respond to climate change, coastal erosion, and increased flooding from severe weather events.
- 5.8 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC only budget for the removal and disposal of Waikato District Council-owned old, condemned or erosion-affected buildings.
- 5.9 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC remove all funding to Hamilton Waikato Tourism.
- 5.10 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC remove all funding it provides to Te Waka.
- 5.11 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC continues funding existing budgets for the Rural Economic Advisory Panel, community boards, and other community committees.
- 5.12 Recommendation: WFF recommends the inclusion of additional key performance indicators for response times for service requests and timeframes.
- 5.13 Recommendation: WFF recommends WDC continues working with communities to plan and respond to climate change, coastal erosion and increased flooding from severe weather events.

Development Contribution Charges

- 5.14 WFF understands that the purpose of the development contribution provisions in the Local Government 2002 *"is for territorial authorities to recover from developers a fair, equitable and proportionate portion of the total cost of capital expenditure necessary to service growth over the long term".*
- 5.15 WFF strongly disagrees with the proposed Development Charges holding and/or decreasing for 2024/25 annual year when ratepayers are expected to accept a proposed rate increase for the year.
- 5.16 WFF would like to ask the council why it used the LTP 2021-31 development contributions to calculate the comparative increases/decreases to the proposed charges, rather than the charges from the 2023/24 annual plan which would have allowed for a more transparent and accurate result for the proposed changes.
- 5.17 Recommendations: WFF recommends that the Development Charges proposed in the annual plan for 2024/25 incorporate inflation and be reflective of the increased levels of service and infrastructure required for new developments.

6. COMMENTS ON SCHEDULE OF FEES AND CHARGES

This section of the submission comments on the issues in the Schedule of Fees and Charges document.

6.1 WFF commends WDC on adopting a user pay system ethos in its rating models.

Roading:

- 6.2 WFF supports the reduced charge for overweight permits, and the reduced penalty for nonnotification of corridor maintenance.
- 6.3 WFF supports the proposed increase to the maximum fee for motor rallies.

Dog Fees

- 6.4 WFF are pleased to see that fees for rural and working dogs are less than general dogs. However, the \$54 fee per working dog is still too expensive once you consider that many farmers need multiple dogs on a property.
- 6.5 WFF suggests that a lower fee structure could be introduced for subsequent rural dogs which are additional to the first working dog. There are 20 other Councils that have this reduced fee structure.
- 6.6 WFF believes that a flat fee for teams of 10 working dogs should be introduced. On rural properties teams of multiple dogs are often needed for farm productivity and high dog registration fees can create a financial barrier for many dog owners.
- 6.7 WFF asks the Council what percentage of animal control costs originate from rural dogs, compared to urban dogs. Farmers value and manage dogs well, with their dogs well-trained and contained on the property.
- 6.8 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC adopt the proposed reduced charge for overweight permits, and the reduced penalty for non-notification of corridor maintenance.
- 6.9 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC adopt the proposed maximum fee increases for motor rallies road usage.
- 6.10 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should provide a discount for working dog registration fees for subsequent dogs which are additional to the first working dog.
- 6.11 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC introduces a flat fee to provide a discount for teams of 10 working dogs.

7. COMMENTS ON THE RATES REMISSION POLICY CONSULTATION DOCUMENT:

This section of the submission comments on the issues related in the Rates Remission Policy Document:

Existing Rates remissions

7.1 WFF commends WDC on the inclusion of rates remissions for land protected for Land Protected for Historical or Cultural Conservation Purposes or Land Protected for Natural Conservation Purposes Policy.

Policy on Remission of Uniform Charges and Targeted Rates on Non-Contiguous Rating Units

7.2 WFF suggests that WDC should include a rates remission policy for non-contiguous rating units farmed as a single entity, to ensure relief from the UAGC and targeted rates, similar to South Waikato District Council.

Rates remission for natural disasters, declared droughts and large scale adverse events

- 7.3 WFF would like to suggest that WDC include a 'Rates remission for natural disasters, declared droughts and large-scale adverse events' which would provide relief to properties affected by natural disasters. This would offer a mechanism to be utilised by central government, council and affected ratepayers should any of these events occur.
- 7.4 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC should include a rates remission policy to provide relief from the UAGC and targeted rates for non-contiguous land which is farmed as a single entity.
- 7.5 Recommendation: WFF recommends that WDC includes a remission of rates for properties that have been affected by 'natural disasters', which includes 'declared droughts' and any 'large scale adverse event'.

Submission by: Creative Waikato

This submission is made in response to Waikato District Council's Enhanced Annual Plan 2024-25.

- 1. Council's activities
 - Creative Waikato would firstly like to thank Waikato District Council for the work it does. We appreciate that it is complicated and challenging having to balance so many competing priorities. We acknowledge the time and energy that goes into these processes.
 - Creative Waikato supports Waikato District Council's Vision *'Liveable, Thriving* and Connected Communities | He noohanga aahuru, he iwi whai ora, he hapori tuuhono tahi'
 - Creative Waikato also supports Council's community outcomes and strategic priorities and has aligned outcomes with focus areas in the Waikato Arts Navigator our regional arts strategy see point 10.
 - In addition to this submission, Creative Waikato has also provided an LTP Councillor briefing and updated high-level infrastructure plan for your consideration. We outline these briefly in this submission.
 - Creative Waikato is keen to ensure Council consults and engages with Creative Waikato as a key strategic partner that focuses on capability building in the arts, culture and creative ecosystem of Waikato.

2. Summary of Feedback in connection to Art, Culture and Creativity

Creative Waikato has identified the following opportunities for Council to consider when finalising the 2024/2025 Enhanced Annual Plan:

Council's Draft Capital Works programme 2024/25

Services, projects and activities

Governance

• Creative Waikato acknowledges that since the 2021-31 Long Term Plan, Council has established an additional Community Board for Port Waikato and the surrounding area. Creative Waikato has connected with members of the 'Art at the Port' group in previous years, and it is wonderful that it has kept active since being established in 2008.

Increased investment for ongoing work with Waikato Tainui and Mana Whenua

- Creative Waikato supports increases in investment planned for ongoing work with Waikato Tainui and Mana Whenua as part of the Council's Joint Management Agreement commitments and alignment with Te Tiriti o Waitangi's principles for a land history and investigation.
- Creative Waikato also acknowledges that since the 2021-31 Long Term Plan, there has been the introduction of a strategic advisor to focus specifically on Maaori strategies and hapuu and iwi management plans in areas where resources are scarce. This new role ensures meaningful support for the District's Maaori communities.

- Aligning this kaupapa is essential when considering regional strategic activation of arts, culture and creativity.
- Waikato District Council's approach aligns with Creative Waikato's regional arts strategy, the 'Waikato Arts Navigator', which provides principles to ensure a Te Ao Maaori lens is provided through the range of activities taking place, particularly in spaces and venues.
- As Council would acknowledge, an integrative approach requires consistent and sustained effort, with open and continual communication to move in the right direction, and the results will be hugely rewarding for all.

Additional resources for Council's community halls portfolio

- Creative Waikato supports additional resources to manage Council's community halls portfolio.
- Community halls provide places for social interaction and connection. They are the social hubs of communities.
- Creative Waikato acknowledges that there has been no change for fees and charges for halls, as well as open spaces for the 2024/25 year.

Capital expenditure changes for 2024/25

<u>Greenslade Road playground and upgrade of the Buckland Road sports field and</u> <u>playground</u>

- Creative Waikato supports the prioritisation of playgrounds.
- Including art within playgrounds i.e., incorporating local history or other elements that represent the community, not only provides an interactive and engaging experience for users, but also provides opportunities to tell local stories.

A feasibility study for the Ngaaruawaahia Library to explore a new community hub

- Creative Waikato supports a feasibility study to explore a new community hub.
- Community hubs are a logical and most effective way of investing and delivering robust community facilities and services.
- Often hubs are centred around libraries. They are a key vehicle through which Councils can support the social, cultural, economic, and environmental wellbeing of their diverse communities. It's important to consider community spaces as well as involving artists in the design of the hub itself to reflect the uniqueness of the Ngaaruawaahia community.

3. Economic development, grants and donations

Hamilton Waikato Tourism

• Creative Waikato asks council to reconsider the proposed funding reduction for Hamilton Waikato Tourism, in recognition of the contribution towards the sustainability of creative organisations who deliver events and tourism outcomes, as well as contributions to national audience engagement for local creative activity.



4. Draft development contributions charges

- Creative Waikato supports development contributions for community facilities, as these are important social hubs for people and groups to gather, share and join in activities.
- Community facilities are also important for artists and creatives to gather, make work and connect with their community.

5. Draft Fees and charges schedule

• Creative Waikato acknowledges that Waikato District Council has removed some fees (DVDs borrowed from libraries) and kept fees the same for community facilities (community halls and meeting rooms) as well as open spaces for the 2024-25 year (as stated above).

6. Waikato District Council's 'Heritage Day'

- Creative Waikato acknowledges Waikato District held its first Heritage Day, on Saturday, 20th April this year. It is important to celebrate the stories and history of local communities. Creative Waikato also acknowledges that Waikato District Council has a Heritage Strategy, which sets out important roles and responsibilities of respective parties.
- Creative Waikato also acknowledges that this strategy makes provision for cultural heritage, which recognises the importance of the Kiingitanga movement.

7. Strategic initiatives

Creative Waikato has led key strategic initiatives which have contributed to long-term impact in the areas of arts, culture and creativity in the Waikato Region. These initiatives include:

- Waikato Arts Navigator 2023 A shared framework, including a vision and strategy, for supporting and strengthening our arts and culture in the region. It guides planning and decision making.
- **Performing Arts Strategy 2023** A strategy informed by the performing arts sector which builds on the strengths of local performing arts activity and connects with the new Waikato Regional Theatre.
- Waikato Creative Infrastructure Plan 2024 A high-level update on the Waikato Creative Infrastructure report originally prepared in 2014.
- Wellbeing and Arts, Culture and Creativity in the Waikato 2022 Social impact reports that assess the impact of arts, culture and creativity on the people of the Waikato region.

Additional Strategic Outcomes: Maintaining relationships with Creative New Zealand, Ministry of Culture and Heritage, NZ Music Commission, Regional Arts Network Aotearoa, and Te Ora Auaha to support positive outcomes through funding and support for Waikato artists.



8. Creative Waikato mahi in the Waikato District

In addition to the above strategic initiatives, Creative Waikato has provided significant capability building support in the Waikato district, which has included a range of targeted offerings. Examples of the programmes we have provided are:

- **Elevate** A funded e-learning programme to provide creatives with resources and tools to build sustainable creative careers
- **Creativity Every Day** A first-of-its-kind innovative programme designed to bring creativity into daily routine at work or at home. Delivered to many businesses and organisations.
- ArtReach A community-focused creative development workshop series. Presented in an e-learning video format to ensure accessibility, used as an example of good practice nationally. Workshops include: Governance, Strategic Planning, Evaluation, Impact and Insights and more.
- Things to do A community guide to creative events in the Waikato region.
- **Kotahitanga** A movement and campaign to combat racism and bring the community together through the accessible power of creativity.
- **Creative Acts of Kindness** A project which commissioned local artists to celebrate kindness using their arts practice.
- Whiria te Tāngata is the first programme of its kind in Aotearoa that served to champion positive community connection and wellbeing by weaving communities together through creative practice as well as modelling the national call for the artist wage. More on this specific programme below.

Creative Waikato has also undertaken work with Waikato District Council and their communities. Some examples are below:

Engagement with Waikato district - some examples

- Developed a Waikato District profile of arts activity for the District.
- Facilitated workshops with the 'Art Huntly' group to develop Huntly Arts' Strategy Plan.
- Sasha McGaughran, Huntly resident, selected as 1 of 10 participants of the first artist-in-residency programme, 'Whiria te Tāngata' (Weave the People Together), which ran for 12 months. Initial results indicate that this programme has been a huge success. Key high-level findings include:
 - *Whiria te Tāngata* (WTT)¹ effectively delivered on its impact goals, building more connected, cohesive and culturally-rich communities.
 - WTT supported mental wellness outside the mental health system.
 - WTT respondents reported more positive satisfaction with life.
 - Change occurring where it mattered most for artists' wellbeing.
 - Waikato is calling for "more of the same" of WTT: Whole-person programmes which are accessible during financial hardship.
- Providing advice and support to groups such as Toi Ako Te Kauwhata, Huntly Friendship House and Onewhero Society of Performing Arts.

- Participated in the inaugural 'North Waikato Community Day Event' where we connected with local groups, schools and providers to discuss what we do.
- Creative Waikato's Kaiwhakahaere i nga Mahi Toi/Regional Māori Arts Developer - Kereama Clarke, currently sits on the **Waikato District Council Maaori Advisory Committee**.
- Kereama has worked with many individuals and groups involved in the Toi Maaori space.
 - Work with **Te Whare Toi o Ngaaruawaahia (NGĀ Art)** in making initial connections with groups such as Son of Zion, Pohakena Reid, Katchafire and House of Shem regarding potential for working with this organisation. As these artists have left the country, the work with this arts centre is ongoing.
 - Support and advice provided for the owner of **Hākarimata Boutique** (Nu), who sells local products, and **Hākarimata Brotique**, which sells clothing and wares for Tāne (males).
 - **Regular waananga** with Warren McGrath and Gannin Ormsby about growing Toi Maaori and providing for succession planning to enable continued growth.
 - There has been a lot of mahi undertaken for the **Rangiriri Pa Development.**
 - Kereama helped to plan and run celebrations festivals for the 160th year commemorations, and Creative Waikato supported the costs of running these events. Kereama is involved in ongoing conversations relating to this development.
 - Ongoing discussions regarding 'River Riders' (ebikes/scooters) being connected with a cultural trail with Les Tuteao (walking tours) and Hamilton Gardens.

It is important that Waikato District Council continue to support mahi in the Toi Maaori space. It is only through collective efforts that initiatives can be achieved.

9. Embedding Arts, Culture and Creativity

Waikato District Council plays a pivotal role in the wider ecosystem² in supporting arts, culture and creativity to thrive. To achieve the broadest possible impact, it is essential to view the contribution of arts, culture and creativity as part of a system which affects all facets of society. This system-based approach acknowledges cross-sector opportunities to enable effective outcomes and deliver better public services. This ecosystem approach is fundamental to the Waikato Arts Navigator - our regional arts strategy.

11. Arts, culture and creativity connect across Council department areas

An LTP Councillor briefing document has been provided as part of this submission.

- While this document is cognisant of the current financial situation and social environment, the aim is to present a range of possibilities that may extend current thinking, and explore cross department/sector/locale opportunities for collaborative outcomes.
- The attached briefing document outlines concrete examples of the many and diverse ways that arts, culture and creativity connect across departments within Council.

12. Importance of soft infrastructure - people and services

In addition to the LTP Councillor Briefing document, Creative Waikato has also provided an updated Infrastructure Plan which is an initial high-level scan of hard and soft infrastructure in the Waikato. This plan builds on an initial report that was developed in 2014.


A previous lack of data, insight, and sustainable investment have shaped potential issues for the ongoing sustainability of our essential soft infrastructure.

- Soft infrastructure is associated with the development of human and social capital integral to community-building and the promotion of 'high quality' living³. It is the mahi and expertise required to activate hard infrastructure. Forms of soft infrastructure include programmes and facilitators in libraries, museums and other community resources.
- Whilst hard infrastructure (facilities, venues etc) is important, it is the people (soft infrastructure) that are most important. Supporting those people and services which activate hard infrastructure contributes to thriving communities.

13. Investing in communities and arts, culture and creativity

The collective toll of Covid-19, climate change and the cost of living crisis on our communities has been immense. We encourage Council to prioritise investment in community and to proactively include arts, culture and creativity to support living, thriving and connected communities. From a creative ecosystem perspective it is important to consider:

<u>11.a - The Role of Council</u>

- It is Council's role to enable and support creative infrastructure.
- Cultural wellbeing, alongside social wellbeing, are legislated delivery outcomes for local government, and are worthy of prioritised value and sustained investment.
- Arts, culture, creativity and ngaa toi Maaori can make significant contributions to a 'vibrant, passionate and progressive' district if they are supported. The community already makes a significant contribution to these areas through investment, in-kind support, volunteer time, and creative passion, it is essential that the council maintains and increases investment into this sector otherwise they risk losing it.



<u>11.b - Economic considerations</u>

- The creative sector is one of the fastest growing sectors for economic development in Aotearoa, with the potential for international export alongside local activation. Community activity creates essential learning and development pathways for creative professionals.
- Artistic activity is a contributor to positive tourism outcomes.
- Engagement in creative activity in and around the workplace makes measurable contributions to productivity, innovation, and mental health.
- Toi Maaori is a significant asset in Aotearoa, and is a contributor to international interest in tourism, and connection to place. Waikato District Council has the potential to build on the support provided to ngaa toi Maaori, and to enhance the skilled practitioners based in this district to highlight this opportunity for growth and development.

11.c - Wellbeing and Impact

- Impact is not only measured in terms of financial return and asset utilisation, but also wellbeing, and the ways in which these experiences contribute to things like community cohesion, connection to place and land and self.
- Arts activity, like public art, events, concerts and theatrical performances contribute to civic, amenity and cultural value, which has implications for changing perceptions about the city, and supporting future growth.
- Beyond economic measures, the impacts of the creative community on social and cultural wellbeing are also significant. In-depth Waikato-focussed research from 2022 showed that regular access and perceived access to arts, culture and creativity is a significant driver of individual wellbeing. This can contribute to better mental health outcomes, but also shows measurable connection to social cohesion, community connection, civic pride, and sense of identity.

At a time of increased need, now is the time to invest in people. Support the people who provide positive outcomes for diverse communities. Art, culture, and creativity sits alongside social services, kai, health, education, environment, and community connection as interwoven components of thriving communities. These things require civic investment as a part of ensuring community access. This forms part of the public good component of local government.

14. Creative Capability Development

- Creative Waikato wishes to build on its support and service delivery in the Waikato District. However, this requires adequate partnership investment to enable us to do this.
- Services include capability building, strategic advice, research, insights, stakeholder engagement, community support and development.
- Creative Waikato request the formation of a strategic relationship with Waikato District Council in the same way as it has a relationship with Sport Waikato.



15. Specific Recommendations:

We request investment of \$30K per annum, with contribution to:

- a. Development of an 'Arts Action Plan' linked to the Waikato Arts Navigator Strategy, to provide a high-level strategy for how Council can integrate arts, culture and creativity into what they do
- b. Investment to deliver
 - i. Cultural wellbeing outcomes
 - ii. Regional arts strategic activation
 - iii. Creative capability building in local communities
 - iv. Contribution to local and regional research and insights (including the Creative Infrastructure Plan).
- c. A high-level proposal and scope can be provided if required.
- In addition, Creative Waikato would like to include 'arts, culture and creativity' as an activity, which has a performance measure(s) and target for 2024-25 to ensure this can be measured alongside other key work streams. Creative Waikato can work with Council staff to devise an appropriate measure.

Creative Waikato formally thank Waikato District Council for the opportunity to make this submission.

Arts, culture, creativity and ngaa toi Maaori helps to build resilient and diverse communities and improve our quality of life.

> Great art and culture inspires learning, boosts our economy, enhances wellbeing, builds regional and national reputation, and more. The role of arts, culture, creativity and ngaa toi Maaori has powerful potential in enabling councils with tools that enable them to think differently and provide unique solutions to complex issues.

Arts, culture and creativity and ngaa toi Maaori can also be used as ideal problem-solving tools to help us with major and ongoing challenges, aiding recovery and building resilience.

Arts and culture do not sit in isolation, and are woven through all facets of thriving societies. Collaborating with, and taking the leadership of Maaori is key to creating thriving communities. The embedding of arts, culture and creativity in all elements of government influence will add value and increase opportunity. When arts and creativity is strong and visible, communities are strong and visible.

It is important for government, industry and sector leaders to see artists as a more embedded component within the rest of society. This encourages the creation of a collaborative space where the value of artists in society can be better recognised and utilised. A diverse but interconnected ecosystem of arts infrastructure (both hard and soft) would provide clear pathways for artists and community members at any stage of the journey.

The local context

It is hard to ignore societal, regional and local contexts when considering the role and impact of the decisions and investments made by local governments.

While this document is cognisant of the current financial situation and social environment, the aim is to present a range of possibilities that may extend current thinking, and explore cross department/sector/locale opportunities for collaborative outcomes. Creative Waikato's intention is to support local councils to embrace imaginative and innovative possibilities for alternative ways of working that can lead to better outcomes, through positive community engagement and alongside sensible investment that considers the impact of our actions on future generations.

Importance of local government

The rate of change over the past few decades with shifting demographics, urbanisation and climate change has and will have a significant impact on the landscape of local government.

The role councils play in delivering outcomes for communities and our society into the future will become critical moving forward.¹ There is an increasing need for councils (both governance and staff) to engage with communities and encourage community participation in decision-making, and to consider the needs of people currently living in communities and those who will live there in the future.

Understanding the creative ecosystem


To achieve the broadest possible impact, it is beneficial to view the contribution of arts, culture and creativity as part of a system across all facets of local government activity.

This system-based approach acknowledges cross-sector opportunities to enable effective outcomes and deliver better public services. This ecosystem approach is fundamental to our regional arts strategy.²

We present this briefing by examining a range of discrete but interconnected elements which can be combined to create more significant impacts than the individual parts. We believe this approach, in partnership with sector-informed localised delivery, can enable greater outcomes and efficiencies, to better enable robust change in local communities.

Here we present a systems map that highlights opportunities for positive local government influence when working with local and regional partners. This provides a high-level scope for change, with an indication of intersections, and connections into other government systems and structures.

Arts, culture and creativity is an essential contributor to public infrastructure. It is a core component of vibrant, growing communities, and is a public good. It is an enabler and indicator of a thriving society.

> Arts, culture and creativity is best understood not as discrete or siloed activity, but as something which is essential and intrinsic to all aspects of public life. A crosssector approach will be of best benefit for achieving the goals of this government and the people it serves.

The following sections explore some high-level themes that can be implemented throughout the indicated system areas included in the ecosystem map. These elements are presented with a brief discussion of the key opportunities for positive impact and innovative change. These are matched with local government departments and example initiatives that could be supported through localised investment and activation.

Health and Wellbeing

Creativity is essential to community and individual wellbeing, and can be deployed in health treatments and settings.

There is a wealth of global evidence that reinforces the opportunity to shape better long-term outcomes through the inclusion of arts and creativity as a component of health treatment and recovery plans — this includes mental health.

Creative Wellbeing is a facet of holistic wellbeing, which embraces Maaori understandings of Hauora, as expressed in Te Whare Tapa Whā model.³ It can be a lens through which to address physical, mental and emotional, family and social and spiritual wellbeing, as well as the need to connect with the whenua.⁴

'On average, Waikato residents who self-report having a high level of engagement with arts, culture and creativity have higher wellbeing than those who have little or no engagement. For all Waikato residents, engagement with arts, culture and creativity has a positive relationship with overall wellbeing. The more often they attend, create or participate in artistic and cultural events, the higher their wellbeing is likely to be. This holds true regardless of engagement level or relationship with the creative sector.⁷⁵

In Waikato, those who report being highly engaged with arts, culture and creativity have 5% higher overall wellbeing as compared to those with little or no engagement.⁶

Research has shown that recreational arts can support mental wellbeing. 'Those who engaged in 100 or more hours/year of arts engagement (i.e. two or more hours/week) reported significantly better mental well-being than other levels of engagement.'⁷

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Support the activation of diverse art, culture and creativity in local spaces to support community access. This can be through both investment, and in supporting community use of space.

Share stories through council comms channels of local creative activity to support growing audiences and engagement.

Invest in locally-based creative spaces to support access and engagement.

Explore community-based artist-inresidence initiatives to encourage positive community outcomes through creative activity (see <u>Whiria Te Tāngata</u> as an example).¹⁰

Liveability

Liveability is an important concern in planning for population growth and housing intensification. It is key that our towns and cities contain accessible spaces where communities can connect, and that public spaces are welcoming to ensure that they are fully utilised.

'Placemaking' is a

powerful governmental tool for engaging communities in the planning, design and management of their shared public assets.

Placemaking shows people just how powerful their collective vision can be. It helps them to re-imagine everyday spaces, and to see anew the potential of parks, city centres, neighbourhoods, streets, markets and public buildings.¹¹ Given that arts and culture increase connection to community and place, the creative sector and their interests should be represented in placemaking discussions.

Arts, culture and creativity provide useful skills and spaces for the creation, development and expression of local identity and stories. These generate a sense of identity and community pride, as well as contributing to communities being a vibrant and safe place to live.¹² There is a growing public agreement for support for the arts. Agreement with local councils giving money to support the arts has grown significantly from 2017–2020. In Waikato, this has increased 13%.¹³

'Around six in ten Waikato residents feel the arts are important in creating a vibrant place to live, and in their community's future. They also want their community to be recognised as a place that supports the arts. [...]Fifty seven percent also feel that the arts benefit communities by contributing to resilience and wellbeing while 50% feel their community would be a poorer place without the arts.⁷¹⁴

'Being highly engaged with arts, culture and creativity means that residents are also more likely to have stronger connections to community and to land and place¹⁵

Activate public spaces with arts-based play activities, and the creation of playable spaces that tell stories.

Utilise public art (murals, sculpture, light) to support the creation of safer spaces for all people.¹⁷

Embed artistic expression and cultural narratives in large-scale infrastructure projects to create unique regional identities.

Work with community partners to support the provision of accessible creative spaces and local storytelling.

Advocate to the central government for the development of a Provincial Arts Fund (similar to the Provincial Growth Fund) to support improved community liveability outcomes.¹⁸

Explore and articulate the contribution made by arts activity, festivals and public art to the value of space, place and community in strategies, reports, and public communications. 66%

believe that major arts facilities are important to create a vibrant place to live¹⁶

Community Cohesion and Identity

Community cohesion and identity is key to collective wellbeing and a safe and productive society. Participation in community organisations and arts, culture and creative activities positively contributes to community connection.

In these times, community cohesion is an important protective factor in the face of rapid change, polarisation, and disasters. In particular, social inclusion is a powerful determinant of wellbeing.¹⁹

'Over the next 30 years, Aotearoa New Zealand's population of seniors will grow from around 850,000 (17 percent of the population) to around 1.5 million (24 percent of the population). And it is not only growing numerically, but also structurally.'²⁰Artistic, cultural and creative activities can be a powerful way to bring senior and isolated people together, and support wellbeing. Long-term loneliness has been proven to negatively affect physical and mental wellbeing outcomes.²¹ Worldwide, it is estimated that 25% of older people are isolated.²²

The arts improve intergenerational relationships and connection to family and friends. "The arts act as a catalyst for bridging, bonding and linking social capital—it provides opportunities for engagement that reduce social isolation, encourages community cohesion, mutual support, improved intergenerational relationships and connection to family and friends."²³

In Waikato, attending artistic, cultural and creative events or activities results in connections with diverse people.²⁶ "Residents who attend or

create artistic, cultural or creative events or activities at least once a month report feeling more connected to culture and community, to land and place, and self... [They] feel that they have more opportunities to meet people who are different from them."

61% of New Zealanders agree that "the arts contributes to the resilience and wellbeing of their community."²⁷

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Support community groups who provide accessible group activities through increased investment and/or provision of space or other useful services. Currently, these are often run by passionate and long-serving volunteers, and burnout is a major factor.

Invest in infrastructure including shared and multi-use community spaces, and support their long-term maintenance.

Invest in community-driven expressions of arts and culture through grass-roots festivals, touring performances, and work that connects professional practitioners into remote communities. One option to achieve this is through match-funding the Creative NZ Creative Communities Scheme funding into your local community.

Recognise and support the many arts and culture organisations who serve senior and marginalised communities.

Support the development of local capability building to strengthen and support community organisations and activities.

Culture and Heritage

The valuing of culture and heritage is key to a thriving community. When we honour our heritage, we are able to chart a hopeful and ambitious tomorrow.

> Maintained or managed cultural (historic) heritage plays an important part in our culture by preserving the past, documenting local and community history, and providing evidence of cultural heritage decision-making.²⁸ The Waikato region is home to many key heritage sites, taonga and histories. Investment in our culture and heritage is investment in our culture and our future. Cultural wellbeing is a key social impact outcome of activity enabled by the arts, culture and creative sector.²⁹

Where possible, invest in maintaining built heritage and recognising sites of significance to both tangata whenua and tangata tiriti.

Engage the knowledge and insights from local experts, mana whenua, and other national support like the team at the Ministry of Culture and Heritage.

Support and invest in multi-cultural activities that celebrate the diversity of communities living in Waikato.

Economic Development

The arts, culture and creative ecosystem makes positive contributions to the prosperity of the region, and the country.

> As well as generating income for people working in the arts, the creative sector creates tourism opportunities, supports innovation and collaboration, and can be engaged to promote towns and the region.

There is an exciting opportunity for this region to really champion our ngaa toi Maaori as a key component of our economic offering.

A thriving creative sector also contributes to hospitality industries, information economies and digital export. Supporting districts to develop strong arts, culture and creative presentations can become growth opportunities in the emerging 'experience economy'.³² An emergent experience economy in local communities has the potential to transform opportunities as tourism flourishes both from national and international engagement.

The number of people employed in the arts is growing. Nationally, there are more than 117,517 people whose primary employment is in the arts and creativity.³³ In Waikato, 7109 people are employed in the arts.³⁴

New Zealand's arts and creative sector contributes \$16.3 billion to New Zealand's GDP.³⁵

of creative professionals in the waikato region participating in the gig economy find it difficult to secure loans for things like mortgages.³⁶

The creative sector includes many different kinds of work, including: visual arts, architecture, advertising, design, fashion, games, media, music, performing arts, photography, publishing, screen, and software.³⁷

There are 35,955 businesses in the arts and creative sector.³⁸ There are 6,974 creatives employed in the Waikato region.³⁹

Nationally, the Arts Sector has 11,641 self-employed workers – accounting for 42% of the sector's workforce and more than double the total NZ self-employment rate (16.2%).⁴⁰

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Maintain and increase Investment in local events, public creative activities and organisations that will encourage tourism and local spending.

Engage artists and creatives in the design of civic spaces and new developments, in order to contribute to a unique sense of place, increased liveability, and attract and retain residents.

Support arts and creativity training programmes that support people to move into the industry and develop workforce pathways (for example Creative Waikato's ELEVATE programme).⁴¹

Tourism

People travel for unique cultural experiences—this is true around the world. In the Waikato region, Maaori culture contributes significantly to tourism and both national and international reputation.

> So, the expression of local culture and shaping of interesting spaces has real potential for local and global tourism. Local events and festivals can share unique components of regional life.

In addition, the designation of cities as UNESCO cities of culture can contribute to local identity and economies, raise civic pride, and promote international collaboration and cooperation.

Creative tourism can help to combat challenges of seasonality and sustainability for the tourism sector.⁴² Creative activation of city spaces within the framework of UNESCO's city of culture can contribute to economic recovery, additional investment, and boost in tourism.⁴³

Creative tourism can support employment and retention of creative professionals in regional towns and city centres.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Include creative place-based storytelling in highly-frequented spaces like airports. Work with mana whenua to create powerful narratives and works. (For example, see the Hamilton Airport⁴⁴ and New Plymouth Airport).45

Invest and enable a 'City of Culture' programme in regional Aotearoa.46

Support the development of Regional Maaori Cultural Tourism initiatives through seed funding and development (See collaboratively funded projects like 'Footprints of Kupe'.)47

Integrate creative expressions of te ao Maaori in all development-led by Maaori organisations to share the unique stories of this space. Follow Maaori leadership and cultural frameworks in developing tourism initiatives.48

Invest in unique experience-based tourism that combines creativity, tech and hospitality to create immersive artistic experiences that drive global interest (eg. TeamLab-Japan, MeowWolf-USA.⁴⁹ Waikato has the capability to deliver projects like this-also related to the emerging 'experience economy').50

Technology and Innovation

Creativity is key to innovation, and the intersection of arts and technology drives new ideas. Creativity can be found in many facets of modern society, but the arts provides a pure distillation of this process which can be utilised to inspire novel approaches and create new opportunities.

> Art-informed innovation has the potential to be a catalyst for transformation — provided the right conditions are created to enable it.

The arts can also contribute to increased liveability in main centres and satellite towns, increasing attraction and retention of tech leaders and organisations. International research shows that 'lifelong participation in arts and crafts yields significant impacts for innovators and entrepreneurs. Arts and crafts experiences are significantly correlated with producing patentable inventions and Art-informed innovation has the potential to be a catalyst for transformation – provided the right conditions are created to enable it. The arts can also contribute to increased liveability in main centres and satellite towns, increasing attraction and retention of tech leaders and organisations.

A creative society fosters innovation and entrepreneurial risk taking.⁵²

Strengthen engagement with regional arts organisations to support strategic initiatives and enable connections between cross-sector organisations.

Encourage an artist-in-residence or 'Imagination and Creativity Officer' in council departments to inspire divergent outcomes.

Embed creativity in technological organisations, through initiatives such as **Creativity Everyday**.⁵⁴

Environmental Sustainability

Climate change is a complex and urgent challenge, and it is essential that we establish new paradigms, collective understandings, and ways of living. In Aotearoa, we will benefit from acknowledging and working alongside Maaori and embracing their knowledge in this pursuit.

The arts can help bring people together to support a united collective vision for environmental sustainability. In addition, it is key to support engagement with local creativity, and to support local creative spaces so that communities can have access to sustainable creative experiences that support local communities. Human influence is key to halting the climate crisis.⁵⁵ The arts can be employed to influence cultural changes which can prompt urgent action.⁵⁶ Creativity can serve as a useful outlet for anxiety around climate change, and a powerful tool for finding imaginative solutions.⁵⁷ Somatic and physical creative practices can be useful tools for processing ecological grief.⁵⁸

The arts can be used to convey key information to the public and help the public to understand difficult or abstract ideas in affective, impactful ways.⁵⁹

Arts and culture can inspire engagement and action in the fight against climate change. "The arts support the sciences because the arts can reach inside our hearts, not just our minds."⁶⁰

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Work alongside Maaori organisations and value Maaori art forms including, but not limited to: whakairo, waiata, whakatauki, raranga and ta moko, as key expressions of essential identity and knowledge, key to restoring the whenua.

Ensure that communities can have access to sustainable creative experiences that support local communities.

Support regional arts festivals, local tours, community-based creative activations and local venues and creative spaces, in order to reduce greenhouse gas emissions related to touring, including transporting large sets and casts.⁶¹

Integrate and value creativity in scientific processes. Include artists and designers in all developments, opening possibilities including using biomimicry in technological innovations for sustainability.⁶²

Invest in local initiatives to explore sustainable public art as a way of redefining green space and creating opportunities for storytelling and engagement through art-based initiatives.

Arts in the workforce

Arts, culture and creativity is essential to a thriving wider workforce. Creativity is a driver for innovation, is a feature of emerging business research and is a vital skill set for many futurefocussed employers.

> Creativity is embedded in modern technology, it is a way we invent new opportunities, ideas and possibilities. It is also a key tool for sharing stories, solving problems, and expressing ideas.

When creativity is woven into workplaces, employees are happier and more productive. Workplace creativity contributes to employees who are more engaged, which contributes to satisfaction, quality of work, and deliverable outcomes.

Waikato residents who have jobs that require creative thinking or problem solving are more likely to have a higher level of satisfaction with their work.⁶³

Increasingly, organisations are needing to report on Environmental, Social and Governance measures (ESG's) within their work. Arts, Culture and Creativity can contribute to social wellbeing, by enabling cultural wellbeing.

Art activities in the workplace can have notable positive effects on the wellbeing of the staff. The effects exist over a wide range of measures, from brief moments of refreshment to longer-term impact.⁶⁴

And the worlds of creativity in the workplace are being explored by researchers in the field of **business**, **innovation**, wellbeing, education, neuroscience, psychology, leadership, and more. It is also being talked about by business sources like Forbes, Harvard Business Review, Deloitte, McKinsey and Entrepreneur.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

See creativity as part of Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) and Health & Safety (H&S) plans. This will nurture the wellbeing of employees, and generate innovative output for businesses.

Support the development and delivery of creative workplace wellbeing initiatives such as **Creativity Everyday**, which support creative problem solving, innovation and wellbeing.⁶⁵

Support council staff engaging with local creative activities as part of their own wellbeing and personal development.

The following areas are those which relate specifically to the day-to-day work of Council. There are connections between different areas within Council which facilitate a more holistic and integrated approach to issues and problems and more joined-up solutions. These sections are matched with local government departments and example initiatives that could be supported through localised investment and activation.

Please note: This will outline a range of local government department areas connected to our sector, and concludes with a specific arts, culture and creativity focus in summary.

Civic Engagement

In the past three decades Aotearoa has undergone a substantive demographic change. This is evident in the ethnic composition of the population, its age structure, and in the increase of those born outside of New Zealand.⁶⁶

> In the last two decades voter turnout in Aotearoa, as in other industrial democracies, has been declining.⁶⁷ An added complication is that Aotearoa has a large migrant population with varying experiences of politics and government in their countries of origin.

Local government is all about community. Councils make decisions about local activity to ensure a healthy environment, thriving families and businesses, safe spaces for all and a culture that supports every individual's sense of belonging.⁶⁸

By collaborating with local government, artists can facilitate processes that amplify the voices of residents, activate neighbourhood assets, and foster a stronger social fabric, building bridges between city staff and communities.

If we want stronger communities with improved outcomes we need councils to work with local storytellers and trusted voices to enhance our collective civics education and understanding. This means engaging with artists to share information in an engaging and accessible way that can communicate effectively with different communities.

The arts contribute uniquely to the works of civil engagement. Validating people's stories and perspectives, and bringing people together around shared goals. The arts are being more consciously and continuously engaged to achieve civic goals, and make change.⁶⁹

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Engage planners, regulatory and community services and artists to create a participatory art project on a particular issue i.e., getting to know your neighbour.

Commission work on a central theme to communicate with diverse audiences (see Kotahitanga⁷⁰ as a local example).

Community Services and Facilities

Libraries, museums, reserves, and community amenities are defined under the Local Government Act as core services of Council.⁷¹ These are all important services that enable the community to participate and celebrate. These are core facilities that enable opportunities for learning, play and communities coming together.

Arts, culture and creativity can have an integral role in the design of local amenities. By incorporating local history or other elements that represent your community, these amenities can become an asset that is truly unique. They can also enhance public appreciation of arts and connect artists with communities. Working with artists is also a great way to activate community spaces and encourage participation and engagement.

The trend toward the establishment of integrated community hubs⁷² and mixed-use developments, provides opportunities for Councils to ensure maximum benefit for our communities.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Community houses work with local artist(s) to engage migrant communities about their 'sense of belonging'.

Encourage the inclusion of creative spaces (workshops, rehearsal rooms, studios, etc) in other civic developments (buildings, libraries, sports facilities etc).

Support staff in council facilities to support community access to space (activations in libraries, parks, and other council facilities).

Reduce administrative burden on individuals community groups trying to utilise public spaces for creative activity (event permits, space restrictions, busking permits etc).

Proactively address issues in civic bylaws regarding sound levels in public spaces. Take action to create legislative support (District Plan) that protects creative activity in the central city — this includes noise levels in music/performance spaces in connection with new urban residential developments. (see Ōtepoti Live Music Action Plan 2023 for example)⁷³

Maintain and increase investment into community providers of service including theatres, venues, and community houses.

Parks and Reserves

Parks and reserves provide opportunities for people to connect with nature, play and socialise. They also provide space for people to engage in activities that foster community wellbeing.

> Arts and culture connect us with our stories, landscapes and places, and New Zealand's history and heritage.⁷⁴ These spaces serve as a hub for community gatherings and events, and often include amenities such as playgrounds, walking trails, and seats.

Storytelling through signage, interpretation, and art can provide educational opportunities and protect the unique cultural heritage of Hamilton Kirikiriroa.⁷⁶

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Support local artists and practitioners to create a strong sense of cultural identity, by integrating history and Māori, Pasifika and other communities into the design.

Engage with local artists to create environmentally aware light-based artworks that provide opportunities for storytelling alongside positive safety outcomes for communities.

Work with local artists on the design and development of art-informed play environments. For more ideas around this, please contact Creative Waikato for information, including the emerging 'Play with Arts, Culture and Creativity' strategy.

Growth

Arts, culture and creativity can be woven into key hard infrastructure projects, to provide distinct places of interest and increase community ownership.

> Cultural storytelling, and in particular in collaboration with Mana Whenua, can be pivotal in expressing place-specific identities and ideas.

Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) can help to protect infrastructure from damage. Public art can contribute to social cohesion, community care, and connectivity, key elements of CPTED.⁷⁷

Culturally relevant art can increase engagement with public spaces and aid urban revitalisation.⁷⁸

Public Art can contribute to feelings of safety and security, and so support engagement and community care within spaces.⁷⁹ Hard infrastructure provides 'third spaces' which can be activated in support of community wellbeing, and it is people who create activity and connection in these spaces. There is a demand for this activation, as growing communities look for things to do and ways to connect with one another.

In the community space, much of this activity, connection and positive outcomes is enabled by volunteers and community groups, who donate their time, skills and energy to serving their communities.

This is the central and measurable driving force behind the diversity of cultural expression, the quality of creative output, and the continuously growing local, national and international reputation of the creative storytelling of this region.

Investment in people, and investment from people, contributes to the success, sustainability and strength of the creative ecosystem. This, in turn, can make measurable contributions to a thriving community and society.

These ecosystems make ongoing investments into our community, and contribute positively to civic pride, regional reputation, social value, and collective wellbeing. It is vital that there is civic investment and support for the growth and maintenance of all facets of soft infrastructure—with a central focus on people.

Recent Waikato research shows that creative professionals experience significantly lower access to essential resources than those outside of the sector. This includes 8% lower local Employment, 4% less access to affordable housing, and increased anxiety.⁸⁰

Artists in communities provide direct access to creative activities which can have benefits for wellbeing.⁸¹ Investment in this soft infrastructure delivers on the core work of local government.⁸²

Government investment in creativity not only delivers economic benefit.⁸³ Having accessible community art can "range from individual to collective betterment, and from, community to broader positive societal impacts".⁸⁴

Supporting local creatives to deliver local community initiatives supports community wellbeing.⁸⁵

It is key to acknowledge and educate the public about the volunteer labour that enables quality community outcomes.⁸⁶

Hard infrastructure projects can hold space for multiple community uses, and low-cost inclusions can promote use.

Accessibility of creative activity is a key driver of wellbeing, so it is vital to invest in the providers of diverse creative activity to ensure that accessibility is maintained, while recognising the valued contributions made by creative organisations.⁸⁷

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Combine elements of placemaking with civic infrastructure, such as through using light sculptures on public areas, in order to provide safety, community interest and storytelling.

Establish a Creative Ambassador to promote and facilitate connections and opportunities around infrastructure developments.

Prioritise strength-based investment into the soft infrastructure already delivering in your community. Consider implementing multi-year granting, and streamlining reporting requirements.

Work in partnership with creative leaders in your community to activate council spaces, and provide creative communities with spaces and places to make and create.

Explore the development and support of creative hubs in your communities. Examples include: The Incubator (Tauranga), Toi Poneke (Wellington), Te Atamira (Queenstown).

Support the incorporation of creative elements into essential infrastructure in order to create vibrant urban environments. This plays 'an important role in supporting social and economic regeneration'.⁸⁸

Plans, policies and bylaws affect all citizens, including those working in the arts and culture space. There is an opportunity to integrate a holistic approach to these decision making processes which includes and draws on the strengths of the creative ecosystem.

> It is also important to have a strategic vision for how city growth may impact and engage with the creative sector — this includes capacity for events in public spaces, development of CBD residential and required sound level consideration and mitigation, provision and support for street performance/busking, public art development and activation, etc.

Creative Waikato is available to support as a strategic advisory partner, in order to provide sector-informed and evidence-based insight to assist council in these developments. For initial information, see our community-led, regional arts and culture strategy, the Waikato Arts Navigator (WAN).⁸⁹ The WAN, alongside the Waikato Performing Arts strategy have been developed to support collective impact in the wider region, while supporting each council to identify their own priorities and focus areas with their communities.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY FOR 2024-2027

Meet with Creative Waikato to explore how arts, culture and creativity can meaningfully connect with council planning and bylaws.

Adopt the Waikato Arts Navigator as council's arts and culture policy, and then develop a targeted action plan.

Appoint a Creativity Officer or Creative Ambassador with a purpose to support and deliver positive outcomes for the arts, culture and creative community.

Consider how red tape around live performances and public events can be simplified.

Explore engagement with arts, culture and creative providers for social procurement and positive wellbeing outcomes.

Support the delivery and expansion of the Creative Communities Scheme funding.

Arts, Culture, Creativity and Ngaa Toi Maaori

As expressed throughout this briefing, arts, culture, creativity and ngaa toi Maaori can and should be woven through all facets of the core work of local government in the vision and delivery of a productive, thriving and flourishing district and region into the future.

> It is important that in exploring the work of councils supporting all communities to thrive and be connected, we must acknowledge the vital role of our creative ecosystem in being a contributor to that.

Arts, culture and creativity should be activated by all components of local government as an essential contributor to human capital, social cohesion, positive impact and wellbeing.⁹⁰

Local governments can support local activity by advocating to ministries and the central government for increased regional investment in this sector. Arts, culture and creativity are a core public good that provides measurable benefits for the mental and physical health of all New Zealanders.

The creative ecosystem contributes to our innovation, and to our regional storytelling, both to ourselves and to international audiences.

Artists are skilled practitioners whose work should be utilised to help develop innovative pathways for future success.

Develop lasting strategic partnership relationships with Creative Waikato as the regional arts organisation to grow capability, and utilise sector-specific insights and impacts.

Embed the Waikato Arts Navigator as a council strategic document and commit to developing a council-specific Arts Action plan in alignment with your LTP, this briefing advice, and community consultation.

Vibrant and diverse arts, culture and creativity that starts in flax roots community activity and develops through into sustainable creative careers.

Telling our stories and embracing te ao maaori and ngaa toi maaori in all its forms as the unique expression of this country.



Background

This plan presents a 2024 strategic overview of Creative Infrastructure in Waikato. It builds upon the foundation of the previous Waikato Creative Infrastructure Plan prepared for Creative Waikato by The Stafford Group, in August 2014.

> The purpose of this plan was to identify the current facilities available throughout the Waikato, to ascertain any gaps in the facility offering and to determine how to best fill those gaps over the next 30 years. It was the first opportunity for the Waikato region to review current and future creative sector facility needs.



This plan recognised the important role of the creative sector in helping to grow the liveability¹ of the Waikato region and its communities, and provide financial and economic benefit for the region, through driving increased tourism and local resident demand.²

Purpose

The rate of change over the past 10 years has been unprecedented with a global pandemic, climate crises, civil unrest and technological advances.

> There is a need for Aotearoa to have "co-ordinated, connected and cross-sector approaches and policies that align with cohesive objectives which will be essential for our social and economic systems" if we are to thrive.4

Innovative and cohesive approaches to issues require a long-term approach beyond our current moment and population. The Waikato Creative Infrastructure Plan, prepared in 2014, provided useful data and an under-standing of the infrastructure needs

at that time. The purpose of this revised plan is to provide current thinking on the future of creative infrastructure within the Waikato region, and outline potential pathways to get there.

Definitions

Arts

Activities in which individuals and groups engage in the process of making, developing, shaping and sharing objects, images, words, performances, music, or other forms of aesthetic expression to convey emotion, story, ideas or concepts. Artists make art often through the conscious use of skill and creative imagination especially in the and creative imagination especially in the production of aesthetic objects.

Art, or "The Arts" may include specific conventions Art, or "The Art's may include specific conventions of practice and presentation which are guided by structures, expectations and formalised infra-structure. For the purposes of this plan it can include, but is not limited to: visual art, painting, music, theatre, dance, poetry, circus, craft, media, ngá to i Maori, Pasifika arts, cultural arts and practices, fashion, film, design, puppetry, and sculdture. sculpture.

This plan is connected to arts infrastructure like: galleries, museums, theatres, venues, concert halls, libraries, studios, rehearsal rooms, workshops, but can include schools, community halls, pop-up spaces, outfoor amphitheatres, parks, and olvic spaces – along with groups, organisations and collectives – to provide the frameworks for artistic expression and development.

Culture

Culture is made up of the values, beliefs, languages, knowledge, art and wisdom, with which a person or people, individually or collectively, expresses both their humanity and the meaning they give to their life and its course.⁵

Access to culture is a human right and common good. Culture helps us to understand, interpret, and transform reality and can include a rich array of different things, including our shared stories, traditions, identities, beliefs and ideas. It includes our ability to access and understand the stories we inherit – we sit, watch and listen.

For this plan, cultural infrastructure includes: hapū and iwi, cultural organisations, marae, fale, culturallyspecific and culturally-aware spaces, and other cultural or religiously significant spaces.

Creativity

Creativity The ability to turn imagination into action. Creativity is connected to art and culture but also expands beyond those frameworks and can operate with flexibility and freedom. Creativity is a process for innovation, curiosity and play. Engagement with creativity is intrinsically motivated, it has no expected or specified outcome. It is spontaneous, joyful, fun, accessible, challenging, social, repeatable and doesn't require specific engage repeatable, and doesn't require specific space or equipment.

This Plan defines creativity spaces and places as This Plan defines creativity spaces and places as those aligning to arts and outlive infrastructure – but creativity is also able to exist in any private, public and organisational space. It ultimately can occur anywhere and the key requirements are time, space, and encouragement.

Soft Infrastructure

Components of core service delivery related to people. This can include organisations, groups, collectives, and encompasses both the seen and unrecognised contributions made towards measurable growth in our cities and civic spaces.

Soft infrastructure is the services required to maintain the economic, environmental, oultural and social standards of a society, it includes non-physical assets, such as communication, policies, strategies and regulations, the financing of these systems and services, and the future development of training, combility and seconces. capability and resources.

Hard Infrastructure

Hard infrastructure, also known as built infrastructure, is the physical infrastructure of space and place that should provide safe and accessible opportunities to engage in societal activities.

For the purposes of this plan this includes: galleries, museums, theatres, venues, concert halls, libraries, studios, rehearsal rooms, workshops, schools, community halls, pop-up spaces, outdoor amphi-theatres, parks, civic spaces, marae, fale, and other buildings or created environments that serve to provide opportunity for arts, culture and creativity as per the definitions above.

The Plan is the result of a researchbased development process. It combines desktop research and multi-faceted community engagement with the support of our strategic partner network.

> The plan is presented in order to prioritise and guide investment in both hard and soft infrastructure, enhancing access and participation in arts, culture and creativity in the Waikato region.



Arts and Culture Organisations A group, entity, organisation, trust or society who work with a core purpose in the arts, culture and creative ecosystem. This may be for-purpose or for-profit.

Liveability

Liveability is the articulation of provisions that ensure a place is good for living. Liveability is connected to the long-term wellbeing of individuals and communities. It includes the things that make our cities and towns great places to work and live and play. This includes hard infrastructure like buildings and parks, retail, hospitals and schools, as well as the activation of these spaces.

Other important considerations for liveability are environmental quality, safety, cost of living, happiness, social cohesion, friendliness, and community connection.

How to use

This plan is an evolving advisory document redeveloped in 2024 to address future growth and need in consideration of Waikato infrastructure.

> This reference document has been developed to assist our strategic partners and community in both hard and soft infrastructure development, planning, provision and optimisation. Like all high-level plans, this is an initial guide for framing more detailed planning to build from. The Plan is not a replacement for this detailed research and analysis which will be required for future developments (at regional and local levels).

> > Infrastructure Plan is considered in alignment with the Waikato Arts Navigator and the Waikato Performing Arts Strategy

Limitations

The 2024 Plan presents an initial high-level scan of hard and soft infrastructure in the Waikato. This Plan is based on available data at the time of writing, using secondary data and primary data from third parties.

> A high-level plan presents scope and proposed future developments that address community needs. The plan is presented as a regularly-evolving summary and as new information is collated, it will be considered for the next iteration.

The Plan does not replace the need for project-specific planning, analysis and community consultation. Each project needs to consider artform, scope, and community needs. As additional providers and partners undertake or update their existing plans and insights, it is envisaged that this Plan will require updating to remain relevant. The Plan examines issues at a strategic level for the broadest consideration of the arts, culture and creative ecosystem. It recognises that there may be artformspecific needs in different communities and contexts that may require additional insight.

High-Level Considerations

As part of developing and implementing this Plan there is an expected commitment to:

Consider soft infrastructure needs alongside hard infrastructure development

Continue research and impact analysis on arts, culture, and creativity participation and activation in Waikato and how that informs future development

Work with local communities and organisations to understand emerging needs and requirements for increasing access and participation in an equitable and inclusive manner

Continue alignment to regional strategies that inform the background of this plan – Waikato Arts Navigator, Waikato Performing Arts Strategy Work alongside local Iwi to identify current and future needs and aspirations for Māori

Recognise the guiding framework in the Local Government Act to "promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural wellbeing of communities".⁶ The Plan needs to reflect and inform the essential intergenerational impact of both hard and soft infrastructure for arts, culture and creativity on individual and collective wellbeing

Specific limitations noted in the development of the 2024 Plan include:

Sector-wide infrastructure plans do not currently exist on a national or regional level

The complex balance between artform-specific needs and different health and safety requirements is still to be considered

A reliance on existing community infrastructure information from territorial authorities which is currently limited in scope

The impact of COVID-19 on infrastructure sustainability in the region

The impact on funding inadequacies around facility maintenance and gaps in technical provision Limited engagement with Waikato Tainui in this review of this plan, and recognition of the need to engage more widely with the other Iwi of the Waikato region to ensure we are capturing their aspirations, roles and needs regarding spaces, places and facilities for arts, culture, creativity and ngaa toi Maaori

This is the first refresh of the plan since its initial development. It is also the first to consider soft infrastructure alongside hard infrastructure. In a future-focused consideration of sector development it is vital that all facets are considered



Arts as part of our community ecosystem





The Waikato Arts Navigator Strategy (WAN) provides an aspirational vision to see the Waikato region become a place with a vibrant arts and cultural sector that thrives with diverse and transformative creative activity.⁷

This means that there is the ongoing sustainable development of a wide range of artistic and cultural activities.

The WAN is a mechanism to help achieve broader impact. It is a shared language, a way to understand and communicate the value of what we do as a sector, and to find ways to work with one another to enhance the role of arts, culture and creativity in the region.

Five threads

The five threads of the WAN represent key areas of focus that connect across our broader ecosystem. The ultimate objective of the WAN is to empower key enablers, funders and community organisations to make decisions with the following outcomes in mind. This would lead to transformational systemic change for Waikato and its people.



Performing Arts Strategy

The construction of the Waikato Regional Theatre provided the opportunity to build upon the Waikato Arts Navigator, in order to explore the distinct strengths of local performing arts activity.

> The development of the Performing Arts Strategy was an opportunity to meaningfully engage with our diverse communities, and to hear from the people who are already having a great impact on our region, and who also want to see the sector continue to thrive, and help shape the future for this vital ecosystem.



Despite being deeply affected by the covid pandemic, with cancellation of shows, and venues being closed for long periods, the sector showed resilience with its ability to adapt, pivot, and come together to look at pathways forward. Hawing a strategy that considers the bigger picture of the sector and provides a shared vision or focus for future development is an important way to move forward in a positive direction. The performing arts in Waikato has the potential in the next 30 years to build upon its rich and varied history to support sustainable growth in the sector, to engage new audiences, and to tell local stories and create opportunities for new practitioners to share their voice.

The Waikato Performing Arts ecosystem thrives through inspiring communities and communities and creative activity. Drawing from the insights shared by the diverse Waikato community, the pathway for supporting this vision emerged in four strands of focus:



These focus areas provide useful understanding for the future development of this infrastructure plan.

Hard and Soft Infrastructure

A strategic framework with a long-term view point, recognises that transformational change takes time. There are many elements that must coincide to enable such transformation.


> This includes the provision of and support for hard infrastructure (physical assets) and soft infrastructure (people and services), arts activity, regeneration, supporting artists and arts organisations, valuing creativity and creative thinking.

Proactive collaboration and strong advocacy from Councils and other leadership organisations will inevitably empower the broader community to work together towards a common vision.⁸ While hard infrastructure is an important consideration (and formed the basis of earlier iterations of this plan), the 2024 update includes an emphasis on soft infrastructure. A previous lack of data, insight, and sustainable investment have shaped potential issues for the ongoing sustainability of our essential soft infrastructure.

The concept and discussion around soft infrastructure is relatively new? It is regarded as a fundamental component which forms the basis for a functioning economic, political and/or social system. Most specifically, the function of soft infrastructure has been described as:

"[A] facilitator for the implementation and utilisation of hard infrastructure"

It is important to recognise that our cities and towns have both hard and soft infrastructure. Whilst physical buildings and utilities are critical components of urban development, it is the soft infrastructure that enables the smooth integration of technology and provision of services.¹⁰

Core components of soft infrastructure

Soft infrastructure is associated with the development of human and social capital integral to communitybuilding and the promotion of "high quality" living.11

> It is the mahi and expertise required to activate hard infrastructure. Forms of soft infrastructure include programmes and facilitators in libraries, museums and other community resources.

Soft infrastructure encompasses both Sort infrastructure encompasses both the seen and unrecognised contributions made towards measurable growth in our cities and civic spaces. Soft infrastructure in the arts, culture and creative sector is a core part of sustainable growth, civic development and placemaking. This directly connects to vibrant communities and this understanding is supported by and this understanding is supported by a wealth of peer-reviewed local and international evidence that demonstrates this impact.

It is vital to consider issues around growth in the context of living and working in a changing city. Growth of certain kinds

(residential) is interwoven with the function (residential) is intervieween with the function of a city which connects both hard and soft infrastructure (events, concerts, activities). The value and impact of this creative soft infrastructure strengthens the economic potential of the city, thriving and active communities, and attractiveness for invard investment. This framing of soft infrastructure supports the undersoft infrastructure supports the understanding that sustainable growth is not standing that sustainable growth is not just about physical buildings. It must also be about people. People who provide services, activations and community development that deliver core civic outcomes.

Sustainable civic growth, community cohesion, social wellbeing and economic development are all served through strategic investment in both hard and soft creative infrastructure.


This connection is specifically articulated in the Waikato Arts Navigator as a regional arts strategy. It is also supported by recent local evidence through the Creative Waikato and Huber Social Wellbeing Warkato and Huber Social Wellbeing impact study, as well as recent reports by Creative New Zealand on local government and placemaking, and the Review for the Future of Local Government on the focus for community wellbeing.

Investing in hard infrastructure means creating safe, accessible and sustainable creating safe, accessible and sustainable community spaces. Investing in soft infrastructure means supporting the people who breathe life and vitality into spaces and capital assets. It is essential to have both these things. The community benefits of this activities are used to the benefits of this activation provides the rationale and social licence for ongoing

future investment and development that enables continued civic, economic and community growth. It is key that the activation, operational and maintenance requirements of all capital projects is proactively included in long term budgeting and project planning. A place's social and cultural norms, meanings and values are present within their forms of soft infrastructure.¹² Supporting those people who activate hard infrastructure contributes to distinct local expression and social cohesion


The design and delivery of "good quality" places therefore requires the adequate provision of hard and soft forms of infrastructure in order to support the prospect of "high quality" living within them.

It is through the soft infrastructure utilising the space and support of the hard infrastructure that the wider impact occurs.



Waikato Infrastructure Plan

The Waikato Infrastructure Plan prepared in 2014, provided a benchmark in the identification of current and future sector facility needs. However, some of these projects were not realised.



Priority Projects

The table that follows outlines the "Priority Projects" that were recommended. An update on these projects is provided in addition to new projects which were either not considered or realised at the time the initial plan was prepared.

Strengths Analysis

Challenges

Artists, arts groups and venues receive Artists, arts groups and venues receive modest amounts of investment which is disproportionate to the value and effort that is provided. The impact of the pandemic and competition for the leisure dollar makes it increasingly difficult for the arts, culture and creative sector to become self-surtaining. become self-sustaining.

There is an access, participation and Inere is an access, participation and equity balance that creates increasing complexities for community infrastructure. Providers of community infrastructure often need to balance the costs of delivering services against the prices that community members can prices that community members can reasonably expect to pay to use and/or engage in the services. If the core service measure is around access, participation and wellbeing for all people in our communities, then it is essential that civic, philathropic, government and other investment is increased to support. Acteanca's arts and cultural sector remains on an emergency footing following the past three years of pandemic disruption.⁹ In 2020, The Ministry of Culture and Heritage provided some respite through various Arts and Culture COVID Recovery Programmes and these did result in some successful outcomes.⁸ However, due to these programmes being chort-term the Aotearoa's arts and cultural sector programmes being short-term the potential of these initiatives will not be fully realised, nor their long-term effects measured.

The cost of living is also having an adverse The cost of infinite status rations and adverse impact on artists and audiences, with inflation continually rising. This directly impacts provision of service, and impacts the communities, artists, creative and organisations who utilise and engage with local hard infrastructure.

Insights into the situation for our sector include:

The median total income for Creative Professionals is \$37,000. This is comparable to what self-employed New Zealanders earn (\$39,900), but considerably lower than the median income for those earning a wage or salary (\$61,800)

The median income for creative work is \$19,500. This is lower than total income as nearly half of creative professionals also hold down a job outside of the sector to supplement their income Overall, only 18% of creative professionals agree they are fairly compensated for their time, with two thirds indicating that they do not feel fairly compensated

Almost all (94%) creative professionals participating in the gig economy find it difficult to secure loans for things like mortgages, and four in five find it difficult to predict how much money they are going to make, and struggle with the lack of holiday and sick pay¹⁵

Other strategic considerations

Core creative civic infrastructure is often managed and maintained by community trusts; This contributes to increased risks to sustainability. Because these trusts do not have the scale of operational support that might exist if spaces were council managed, capital expenditure and upgrades require extensive and intensive fundraising campaigns, contributing to burnout and the closing of key community spaces. There is a need for sustainable long-term investment from council into the future, in recognition of the public good and community wellbeing that community groups facilitate from these spaces. It is important that this is maintained.

There is a lack of safe and reliable rehearsal space. For the health and safety of performers it is important that there are spaces with appropriate flooring, heating, lighting and accessibility. There is a lack of consistent space in Walkato communities for these purposes. It is worth noting that these design features can be of benefit to other users of these spaces too, including whaanau, disabled communities, our elders, and participants in sport and recreation activities.

Social inequity and deprivation is a strategic reality. There are large components of the Waikato region which include deprived and isolated communities. People in those communities often have lower levels of access to and participation in creative activity. They also have limited access to hard infrastructure. For isolated communities there is often a lack of available infrastructure to provide any opportunity for positive impact.

Post-COVID fiscal cliff. The period of 2020-2023 saw an unprecedented investment in the arts, culture and creative ecosystem from central government. This increase in funding was the largest update in the national arts funding levels in more than a generation. As a result there was increased activation, access and activity. But this funding was fixed until June 2024, Which means many organisations have increased their operation and impact — but there is no ongoing support available. For Waikato, the arts sector Covid Recovery Funding that came into the region via Manatũ Taonga was \$10,519,180.

This figure encompasses Recovery funding only (Creative Spaces, Cultural Installations and Events, Cultural Activators, Innovation Fund, Regeneration Fund and Capability Fund). It excludes emergency relief funding (CSERF, Arts and Culture Event Support Scheme)

Some of this funding is also allocated to other regions as there are multi region projects. The approved amount for projects focused solely on the Waikato region is \$5,106,890.[%]

This will create a challenge for our communities who have grown used to an increase in available support and the positive impacts that has enabled.

Opportunities

Artists, creatives and associated organisations are resourceful groups. They regularly stretch any investment received into creating positive outcomes and serving the liveability of our communities.

> The creative ecosystem is currently one of the largest funders and enablers of creative activity when we acknowledge volunteer hours, in-kind support, and provision of service above and beyond market rates.

While this is a positive contribution, it is vital that enablers, civic partners, and investors acknowledge and value that contribution to ensure that sector burnout is reduced and that artists and creatives can have access to sustainable careers and quality of life. If we want to be an innovative and resourceful region we need to embrace imaginative opportunities to work differently and explore creative opportunities to prioritise originations. investment and support into both hard and soft creative infrastructure, and acknowledge the essential balance between those areas of activity.

The Waikato Arts Navigator provides a useful strategic framework to inform future opportunities that encourage collaborative investment, strategic partnerships, and to explore avenues for embedding creatives into activities beyond the obvious delivery areas. Other opportunities to strengthen the creative infrastructure of the Waikato can include:

Utilising and repurposing council owned spaces to support community activities

Exploring development of creative spaces as part of civic revitalisation

Working with Sport Waikato to embed creative spaces in Sporting infrastructure

Encouraging the provision of empty commercial space for accessible art activity

Investing in public art as a contributor to civic safety

Investing in public creative programming and events to encourage the development and sharing of local stories

Work with creative organisations to limit red tape and regulation when providing creative services and events

Embed provisions that contribute to the protection of arts, culture and creative activity in city centres and civic environments

Recommendations

This 2024 revision of the Creative Infrastructure plan builds upon earlier insights, but presents new high-level opportunities for shaping a Waikato Region that thrives with diverse and transformative creative activity.

> Whilst this plan acknowledges that each different territorial authority will have different requirements, expectations and levels of investment, it is essential for future planning to be established and a prioritisation of the types of infrastructure and service provision that will be required for thriving future communities.

Key recommendations of the 2024 plan are:

Develop an arts action plan in alignment with the Waikato Arts Navigator for each territorial authority (in partnership with Creative Waikato)	1 year

It's about venturing beyond the ordinary, where we embrace our rangatiratanga in the avant-garde of innovation. Because, really, who doesn't crave that cutting-edge?

Arts, culture, and creativity are who we are, how we express ourselves and what we do. When you watch a Marvel movie or a netflix show – that's art. When you listen to the Cure or Roddy Ricch – that's art. If council withdraws support, the arts aren't going to be patiently waiting to resume when support returns – you'll have to rebuild everything from the ground up.

Moreover, Hamilton is a proudly diverse city – cultural activities provide platforms for diverse voices to be heard, promoting inclusivity and understanding. What are we saying to our minority groups if we withdraw support for their cultural activities, but the Christmas parade still goes ahead?

Arts and culture investment is not just an investment in the present; it's an investment in the long-term vitality and resilience of our communities, and not just something fun around the edges.

The Raglan Business Chamber would like to ask you to consider retaining the funding you provide to Waikato Screen NZ Ltd.

Waikato Screen is a not-for-profit, promoting and supporting the screen sector. Primarily they are an economic development agency specific to the screen sector.

We are asking both the Waikato District enhanced annual plan and the Waikato Regional Council LTP to support the work Waikato Screen do, and ask for funding to continue.

The screen sector is worth 3.5 billion to New Zealand and 1.5 Billion to Auckland alone.

Waikato Screen has only been a fully funded May 2023 and it is vital to have the support from both our local council and the Waikato Regional Council for us to continue delivering on our As we start to gain traction in our first year of being a funded agency it is to increase our piece of the screen sector for the Waikato Region.

Waikato Screens role includes:

- Attract and market film production to our region
- Support film productions pre and during filming
- Connect our people to possible opportunities within the production
- Connect the production to business and encourage them to use locally
- Assist with iwi liaison and connect to the appropriate iwi and hapu
- Connect and facilitate with council processes and protocols
- Offer training and career pathways
- Inspire youth into the world of film through workshops and school visits

The Raglan Business Chamber have personally seen the benefits that Waikato Screen provide through supporting the screen/film industry in the Waikato. in 2023 they have supported and facilitated a number of projects:

- 2 x Indie Films Ruapuke, Port Waikato
- 2 x Corporate Commercial Productions Ruapuke, Raglan
- Waka Kotahi Commercial Huntly/Meremere
- Music Video- Raglan
- Major International Feature Film in Huntly (Mayors and WRC Chair attended and 10 youth from local schools including RAS students)

In January 2024 Waikato Screen secured and supported a Japanese Netflix production to film in Raglan.



Waikato Screen ensured that the production company stayed local where they could and brokered some invaluable relationships. There was beautiful engagement from the community and the Japanese crew felt especially welcomed by the beautiful powhiri and marae cooked on the first day.

The Japanese Netflix production in Raglan was conducted and received very well with mutual benefit to production, Raglan businesses, Hamilton City and local people. 50 crew stay in Hamilton for 5 days working and 2 days of down time being tourists in Hamilton. Other economic spend included

- local coffee shops and restaurants
- rented locations, driveways, unit base sites (Raglan Club, Raglan Rugby Club, Kokore on iwi land)
- local security company was contracted for all security
- local background actors, production assistants and beach drivers were employed (100 pax)
- donations made to surf life saving, marae for powhiri and koha for full crew meals provided by the marae.

Post Analysis income calculations

NB. actual figures confidential to the production company but there are industry based calculations Waikato Screen can use.

\$195,000 - Local crew accommodation and per diems for 130 people @ approximately \$300 per day \$5000 - Local vehicle hire and drivers

\$30,000 - Hamilton accommodation for Japanese crew days off, \$15,000 locations \$20,000 parking, \$5,000 donations \$100,000 , local extras and staff **\$370,000 Minimum Spend 5-7 days in Waikato & Hamilton Districts (85% spend in Raglan-Whaingaroa)**

We believe that asking the Waikato District Council for \$28,500 annually as a contribution to supporting the local economy through Waikato SCreen is a valuable addition, that will hold many benefits in the long run. Their focus when facilitating a production is to encourage companies back to the local communities they are filming within, and we can say we know this to be true.

We appreciate your support so Waikato Screen can continue to enrich our communities economically and culturally.

RESPONSE TO THE WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCIL ANNUAL PLAN 2 MAY 2024

INTRODUCTION

- 1. This response is made on behalf of Te Whakakitenga o Waikato Incorporated (formerly known as Waikato-Tainui Te Kauhanganui Incorporated).
- Te Whakakitenga o Waikato Incorporated (Waikato-Tainui) is the representative governing body for the 33 hapuu and 68 marae of Waikato (see Appendix A) and manages the tribal assets for the benefit of over 89,000 registered tribal members. It is also:
 - the trustee of the Waikato Raupatu Lands Trust, the post-settlement governance entity for Waikato-Tainui for the purposes of the Waikato Raupatu Lands Deed of Settlement 1995 and the Waikato Raupatu Claims Settlement Act 1995;
 - (b) the trustee of the Waikato Raupatu River Trust, the post-settlement governance entity for Waikato-Tainui for the purposes of the Waikato-Tainui River Deed of Settlement 2009 and the Waikato Raupatu Claims (Waikato River) Settlement Act 2010;
 - the mandated iwi organisation for Waikato-Tainui for the purposes of the Maaori Fisheries Act 2004; and
 - (d) the iwi aquaculture organisation for Waikato-Tainui for the purposes of the Maaori Commercial Aquaculture Claims Settlement Act 2004.
- Waikato-Tainui provides this response to the Waikato District Council's Annual Draft Plan, on behalf of our marae, hapuu and iwi members.

BACKGROUND TO WAIKATO-TAINUI

- 4. Waikato-Tainui marae are kaitiaki of our environment and regard the holistic integrated management of all elements of the environment (such as flora, fauna, land, air and water) with utmost importance.
- 5. Waikato-Tainui are tangata whenua and exercise mana whakahaere within our rohe (tribal region). Our tribal rohe is bounded by Auckland in the north and Te Rohe Pootae (King Country) in the south and extends from the west coast to the mountain ranges of Hapuakohe and Kaimai in the east. Significant landmarks within the rohe of Waikato include the Waikato and Waipaa Rivers, the sacred mountains of Taupiri, Karioi, Pirongia and Maungatautari, and the west coast harbours of Whaaingaroa

(Raglan), Manukau, Aotea and Kawhia moana, the eastern areas of Tikapa Moana (Firth of Thames), and principally, New Zealand's longest river, Te Awa o Waikato.

- 6. Both through its hapuu and collectively as an iwi, Waikato-Tainui has maintained ahi kaa, continues to exercise mana whakahaere, rangatiratanga and kaitiakitanga, and upholds and exercises Waikato-Tainui tikanga, kawa, maatauranga and reo within the Waikato-Tainui Rohe.
- 7. We acknowledge and affirm the intrinsic relationship Waikato-Tainui holds with our natural environment.
- 8. Waikato-Tainui entered into a Deed of Settlement regarding our Waikato River claim under Te Tiriti o Waitangi in 2008 ("2008 Settlement"). This was followed by the signing of a revised Deed in 2009 and ultimately, enactment of the Waikato-Tainui Raupatu (Waikato River) Settlement Act 2010 ("Settlement Act"). The settlement marked the genesis of the Crown's statutory recognition of Te Mana o te Awa and the establishment of a "co-management" approach between Waikato-Tainui and the Crown regarding matters relating to the Waikato River.
- Waikato-Tainui is deeply concerned about the introduction of the proposed Fast Track Approvals Bill (FTAB) and the impact this legislation may have on development, infrastructure, and environmental protections within the rohe.
- 10. Waikato-Tainui seeks assurance from the Waikato District Council that should the Bill be passed into legislation, WDC will do everything within its power to ensure that:
 - Fast tracking processes do not adversely affect the rights, interests, responsibilities and opportunities of Waikato-Tainui;
 - (b) The co-management and co-governance principles that underpin our Joint Management Agreement, 2008 Settlement and the Settlement Act are recognised and upheld in planning and decision-making; and
 - (c) Our marae, in relation to the matters above, are able to exercise their mana whakahaere on issues relating to the marae.

WAIKATO-TAINUI POSITION

11. Waikato-Tainui reiterates that any long term plan should not undermine but rather strengthen:

- (a) our ability to exercise our mana whakahaere within our rohe, as guaranteed by Te Tiriti o Waitangi and our Te Tiriti o Waitangi Settlements;
- (b) Our rights, interests and responsibilities of our iwi and hapuu through increased engagement and decision-making processes within any new regime.
- (c) recognition and provision to provide for the sustainable health and wellbeing of our taiao / natural environment;
- (d) provisions to recognise and uphold existing Tiriti settlement frameworks and arrangements (in terms of purpose, principles and processes);
- (e) arrangements to provide for and incentivise the active participation of iwi and hapuu from the outset of any infrastructure or development projects that may impinge on their rights (including in pre-application and pre-council approval processes).
- 12. Waikato-Tainui's relationship with, and respect for, our taiao gives rise to the responsibilities to protect the mana and mauri of the environment and exercise mana whakahaere in accordance with our long established tikanga. Mana whakahaere has always included the need to realise our rights, interests, and responsibilities, including in relation to economic and proprietary interests. Waikato-Tainui has rights and interests (including economic and proprietary interests) and responsibilities in respect of wai and whenua. We expect those rights, interests and responsibilities to be recognised and upheld.
- 13. A key driver for Waikato-Tainui is to create opportunities for the iwi and its members, while ensuring the health and sustainability of our taiao and all natural and physical resources. We look to ensure the sustainable economic use of those resources for the benefit of the iwi, including any related opportunities through policy and law reform.

OVERVIEW OF THE WAIKATO-TAINUI POSITION REGARDING THE WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCIL ANNUAL PLAN

14. Waikato-Tainui has a range of rights and interests including, but not limited to:

- (a) The 1995 Waikato Raupatu Lands Settlement (and the Waikato Raupatu Settlement Act 1995), the 2008 Settlement and Settlement Act
- (b) Tikanga and customary law; Common law (including the common law relating to aboriginal title and customary law); and
- (c) The Treaty of Waitangi and its principles.
- 15. Waikato-Tainui seeks to ensure that these rights and interests are recognised and protected with any policy development.
- 16. In 2008, alongside the River Settlement signing, we also entered into the Kiingitanga Accord. Central to this agreement is the mutual commitment of both Waikato-Tainui and the Crown to embark on a new era of co-management, which serves as a cornerstone of the settlement.
- 17. Our settlement aimed to establish a relationship wherein the Crown would honor and collaborate with Waikato-Tainui in good faith, recognizing them as a Treaty partner. As outlined in the Kiingitanga Accord, this entails the Crown engaging with Waikato-Tainui at the outset when formulating legislation or policies, or when making decisions that impact the Waikato River, its waters, or their management
- 18. As mentioned earlier, the Kiingitanga Accord also incorporates the principle of Te Mana o te Awa. This principle acknowledges that the Waikato River possesses its own life force (mauri) and is a singular, indivisible entity. Furthermore, it reflects the profound connection between the Waikato River and the people of Waikato-Tainui.
- 19. This is reinforced through Te Ture Whaimana The Vision and Strategy for the Waikato River. This is the primary direction-setting document for the Waikato-River and any activities affecting the catchment. It prevails over any inconsistent national policy statements and national planning standards as set out under the River Settlement. The objectives of Te Ture Whaimana clearly provide for:
 - The restoration and protection of the health and wellbeing of the Waikato River;

- (b) The recognition that the Waikato River is degraded and should not be required to absorb further degradation as a result of human activities;
- (c) The protection and enhancement of significant sites, fisheries, flora and fauna.

SCOPE AND PURPOSE OF RESPONSE

- 20. There are several points Waikato-Tainui wishes to raise regarding the Waikato District Council's Annual Plan. It is recognised that development of policies and regulations within an Annual or Long Term Plan must be done in accordance with Te Tiriti o Waitangi and Waikato-Tainui settlement legislation. Waikato-Tainui emphasises the importance of direct engagement with iwi and hapuu as co-partners to ensure an equal agreement between both parties.
- 21. Waikato-Tainui principally supports the aim of the Waikato District Council's draft plan to better support communities and improve infrastructure and service provision.

WAIKATO-TAINUI OUTSTANDING AND REMAINING CLAIMS

- 22. Waikato-Tainui have a number of unresolved outstanding (Wai 30) and remaining te Tiriti o Waitangi grievances that are currently being negotiated with the Crown under the Treaty settlement negotiations process. These include (but are not limited to) claims in relation to the West Coast Harbours (Kaawhia, Aotea, Whaaingaroa and Manukau) and Taamaki Makaurau. These claims are comprehensive in nature and extend to matters concerning whenua, the takutai moana, the moana itself, social, cultural and economic issues.
- 23. The claims themselves and the approach to negotiations is underpinned by the principles of mana motuhake, mana whakahaere and te mana o te moana. These principles are reflected in a Takarangi Framework (see Appendix B) and aspire to achieve autonomy, decision making rights, and co-governance/co-management rights to ensure the health and wellbeing of the moana.
- 24. Redress mechanisms in this regard are still being developed and negotiated with the Crown. Waikato-Tainui reserve the right to have discussions with the Waikato District Council once redress is confirmed to ensure that the Annual Plan and upcoming

Long-Term Plan supports the implementation and aspirations of settlement for the iwi.

PARTNERSHIP AND COLLABORATION

- 25. Waikato-Tainui and the Waikato District Council are partners in the mangement and protection of Waikato and Waipa Rivers. Governed by the principles of Te Ture Whaimana, Te Tiriti o Waitangi and conditions stipulated within our Joint Management Agreement (JMA).
- 26. We are aware that the proposed changes by government from a Three Waters system to Local Water Done Well, may create some inconsistencies or raise concerns about the way water is currently managed and protected.
- 27. Waikato-Tainui urges the Waikato District Council to develop a robust engagement system within any policy developed to implement an Annual or Long Term Plan. As effective collaboration with iwi in decision-making processess will be crucial for the sustainable development and management of natural and physical resources within the region.
- 28. Waikato-Tainui also recommends that the Waikato District Council works in collboration with the Waikato Regional Council, and other councils within the rohe to better plan infrastructure and development within a shared area of control. If there are projects or infrastructure that is overlapping, councils may be able to evenly distribute the costs of development. This collaborative effort will ensure there is no double up in the allocation of funding.

CULTURAL HERITAGE PRESERVATION AND RECOGNITION

- 29. Waikato-Tainui takes a deep interest in the development, protection and maintenance of the physical and natural environment within our rohe.
- 30. Waikato-Tainui acknowledges that development and building of infrastructure will be beneficial to the local economy, however concern arises as to whether the Council will sufficiently engage and consult with iwi and hapuu that have asserted customary rights or interests within these areas of development.

- 31. The introduction of the Fast-track Approvals Bill creates additional concerns around the level of enagement and consultation with iwi and hapuu surrounding lands that have unsettled or unprotected rights, as there is no requirement for applicants under this regime to consult with parties unless they have legislated rights in the area listed for approval.
- 32. Waikato-Tainui acknowledges that although we have outstanding claims that are yet to be settled, our right of consultation and engagement with the Waikato District Council remain strong within the scope of our JMA.
- 33. Waikato-Tainui expects early engagement once the Waikato District Council has notification of a project or development that may impede on our existing or unsettled rights and interests.
- 34. Waikato-Tainui is worried that in absence of early engagement, fast tracked planning and development can lead to issues in terms of long-term sustainability. Waikato-Tainui wants to ensure that our future generations do not suffer because of insufficient or rushed planning processes.
- 35. Therefore, Waikato-Tainui seeks to continue to work in partnership with Waikato District Council to achieve the common goal of a thriving and sustainable economy and environment.
- 36. Additionally, to enable equitable opportunities for Maaori development and to preserve, protect and restore our natural environment, Waikato-Tainui seeks inclusion in planning, design and decision-making processes relating to the projects proposed within our area of interest.
- 37. To adequately prioritise the preservation and recognition of Maaori cultural heritage sites, a strong engagement process must be included in the Annual and Long Term Plan to ensure that iwi, hapuu and whaanau rights are protected, maintained, and appropriately acknowledged within the Annual and Long Term Plan.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

 Waikato-Tainui advocates for the integration of sustainable practices and policies into the upcoming Long Term Plan, including initiatives to mitigate climate change, protect biodiversity, and promote eco-friendly infrastructure development. This sentiment is echoed in our Tai Timu, Tai Pari, Tai Ao Environmental Strategy Plan, which we strongly advise Waikato District Council to consult consistently when evaluating any development proposals.

SOCIAL EQUITY AND INCLUSION

39. It is imperative that the Annual and upcoming Long Term Plan addresses existing socio-economic disparities and works towards fostering a more inclusive society. We urge Waikato District Council to prioritise initiatives that promote social equity, affordable housing, accessible healthcare, and educational opportunities for all residents, including Maaori and other marginalised communities.

INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT

- 40. Waikato-Tainui acknowledges that adequate infrastructure is essential for the prosperity and well-being of Waikato residents. We therefore in principle support the Waikato District Council's proposal to improve assets and add to current infrastructure to meet population need.
- However, the proposed overall rates increase in the Annual Draft Plan of 13.75% for 2024/25 is highly concerning.
- 42. Many of our whaanau live in rural areas, with limited access to basic services such as transport, healthcare, education, water infrastructure, libraries, playgrounds etc.
- 43. A general rates increase of 13.75% is unafforable for our vulnerable whaanau, who are not assured improved access to infrastracture or service provision.
- 44. Increasing rates so significantly will have a hugely detrimental impact on our whaanau as wages are not rising to match the rate of inflation or cost of living. If this proposal is to go ahead, Waikato District Council must ensure mechanisms are in place to mitigate any adverse effects stemming from changes in funding.
- 45. Waikato-Tainui seeks to directly engage with Waikato District Council on this matter to look at alternative funding streams for the development and infrastructure proposed within the Annual and Long Term Plan.

46. Additionally, Waikato-Tainui urges that the Waikato District Council allocate sufficient resources towards the development and maintenance of critical infrastructure, including transport networks, water supply systems, and community facilities in under serviced areas, with a particular emphasis on addressing infrastructure gaps in areas with high Maaori population density.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- 47. Waikato-Tainui recognises the importance of economic growth and prosperity for the Waikato region. However, we emphasise the need for sustainable economic development that respects cultural values, promotes local businesses, and creates opportunities for meaningful employment and entrepreneurship, especially for Maaori and other underrepresented groups.
- 48. Waikato-Tainui has developed a Social Procurement Strategy, outlining the needs and aspirations of our Waikato-Tainui whaanau. This data was gathered through various engagements on a range of kaupapa relating to te Taiao, housing, economic development, education, health and wellbeing. Within this strategy, Waikato-Tainui have developed a range of initiatives that target current need. Waikato-Tainui urges the Waikato District Council to work with iwi, hapuu and Maaori businesses to create a collaborative plan, to achieve better outcomes for both Maaori and non-Maaori residing within the Waikato region.
- 49. Increasing opportunity within local economies to engage or receive contracts for development will enable more self-sufficient communities, that are less dependent on local and regional authorities in the long term. Therefore, Waikato-Tainui requires Waikato District Council to develop strong consultative processes within local communities, to ensure that economic development benefits not only local authorities, but the whaanau living within these development areas.

PROJECTS WITHIN ANNUAL PLAN

50. The Annual Plan has provided a list of projects that the Waikato District Council will undertake from 2024 -2025. We note that this is not a comprehensive list and therefore seek regular updates as the list is added to, so that we can adequately engage with the council prior to commencement of any development or infrastructure update.

- 51. From the list provided, Waikato-Tainui urges the Council to prioritise any wastewater or water projects listed, whilst obiding by the principles and objectives outlined in Te Ture Whaimana.
- 52. Waikato-Tainui stresses that water related projects should be treated with urgency as the strain on our current water supply and wastewater network requires eliviation. Any delay in this development will mean that systems and water supplies are subject to undue stress with increasing population need.
- 53. Waikato-Tainui seeks more information on the Huntly Wastewater Treatment Plant upgrade. We see this project as being a priority project within the community and seek inclusion in discussions or decisions made in relation to this project.
- 54. Of the projects listed as being delayed beyond 2024/25, Waikato-Tainui seeks the Waikato District Council's options surrounding solutions and funding for the following projects:
 - a) Pokeno watewater pump station; and
 - b) Te Kauwhata Wastewater Treatment Plant upgrade.
- 55. Of these two projects, Waikato-Tainui requests some clarity around how the WDC plans to restore Lake Waikare. The restoration of this lake is difficult and restricted as discharges from the Te Kauwhata wastewater treatment plant continue to degrade the quality of the wai.
- 56. The Te Kauwhata Wastewater Treatment Plant (TKWWTP), has recently undergone Stage 1 of its upgrade. This upgrade was a response to the Council's failure to meet existing discharge consent conditions.
- 57. Mana whenua have raised concerns regarding discharge sites, especially where they relate to cultural effects. It has been recommended that options for continued discharge to Waikare and Whangamarino should be rejected.
- 58. If discharges from the Te Kauwhata Watewater Treatment Plan continue to be diverted into Lake Waikare, it will be near impossible to fully restore this water body to a healthy and thriving state. We therefore urge the Waikato District Council to note this as a high priority project and to provide some insight into how this project is

going to be dealt with and what other propositions the Council has for discharge sites.

- 59. Additionally, Waikato-Tainui supports future proofing sports fields with better draingage and lighting, particularly in Ngaruawahia, Huntly and Tuakau.
- 60. Our Tainui whaanau use these facilities quite regularly and would like to see improvement in these areas. However, Waikato-Tainui seeks equity in planning processes so that services are provided in areas that are of close proximity to our whaanau.

COST SAVINGS

61. Waikato-Tainui supports the cut in funding to Te Waka, as we have not seen this group provide improved economic development opportunities to our whaanau.

CONCLUSION

- 62. Waikato-Tainui's relationship with, and respect for, our taiao gives rise to the responsibilities to protect the mana and mauri of the environment and exercise mana whakahaere in accordance with our long established tikanga. Mana whakahaere has always included the need to realise our rights, interests, and responsibilities, including in relation to economic and proprietary interests. Waikato-Tainui has rights and interests (including economic and proprietary interests) and responsibilities in respect of wai and whenua. We expect those rights, interests and responsibilities to be recognised and upheld.
- 63. A key driver for Waikato-Tainui is creating opportunities for the iwi and its members, while ensuring the health and sustainability of our taiao and all natural and physical resources. We look to ensure the sustainable economic use of those resources for the benefit of the iwi, including any related opportunities through policy and law reform.
- 64. Waikato-Tainui appreciates the Waikato District Council's commitment to long-term planning and community engagement. We trust that our submission will be considered thoughtfully in the revision of the Annual plan and the development of a Long-Term Plan for the period of 2025-2034. We look forward to continued collaboration towards a prosperous, inclusive, and sustainable future for all residents of Waikato.



Middle Ridge Farms requests the opportunity to speak to this submission during the hearing process.

The intention of the Waikato District Council's proposed Enhanced Annual Plan 2024/25 was too "re-set, investigate and find ways to potentially lower our level of service, find other funding sources, advocate to government and investigate other savings".

Middle Ridge Farms has taken this approach when formulating this submission.

Do you have any comments on our proposed draft works programme for 2024/25:

GENERAL RATE:

Middle Ridge Farms acknowledges that there are affordability issues, government regulations and district growth to address when preparing annual budgets.

Our farming enterprise along with other ratepayers in the district are also affected by government regulations and rising costs with reduced margins.

As a farming practise when times are tough, we focus on doing our core essentials to get us through that period by applying cost cutting measures. All capital projects get delayed if they are not the absolute "must haves" for continuing to supply.

The proposed rate increases of 13.75% will further affect our cost structure and ability to operate during this period. This will also have a great impact on the district at large.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC finds further savings in the annual budget to lower the proposed rate increase of 13.75% to assist all rate payers get through these difficult economic times.

PROPOSED DEBT:

Middle Ridge Farms is concerned with the level of debt proposed. WDC's proposed \$100 million increase, is an 50% increase on WDC's existing debt levels.

WDC is proposing to do this when it's indicated that it is in a "pausing, investigating and re-setting" process. If WDC is in an investigating mode and is unsure of what is coming down the pipeline, prudence should apply to borrowing.

This debt servicing will cost WDC \$5,000,000 in interest (at 5%). WDC's proposed new debt will put more pressure on WDC's ability to fund the core essential services to see us through this "paused" period.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC should review its capital projects list to only include 'core essentials' to reduce the proposed debt increases.

ROADING:

As an rural ratepayer Middle Ridge Farms relies heavily on roading to operate its business, it is a means for survival. The current district roading network has significant issues and is in need of higher levels of renewals, repairs and maintenance.

In particular more attention is required on the road corridor beyond the carriageway. The water tables and trees often cause the premature degradation of the carriageway. Adequate funding of this work needs to be in place.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC continue with the current level of roading renewals as an absolute minimum, in this proposed budget and future budgets. Roading is the core service rural ratepayers receive from WDC, and it is the lifeline for the rural community and district at large.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends WDC has adequate funding for work in the road corridor beside the carriageway is budgeted for.

DRAFT DEVELOPMENT CONTRIBUTION CHARGES:

The existing Draft Development Contribution charges proposed are measured currently against the 2021/2031 LTP figures. The table provided shows movement relative to the 2021/2031LTP. When the proposed DC charges are compared to the current 2023/2024 charges there is an average 15% drop in DC for 2024/2025. The DC should be raised subject to inflation change and take into consideration the rate increase that WDC have imposed historically as well as the new proposed rate. Existing rate payers should not be expected to pay for growth. This also needs to apply to developer agreements. An inflation change rate and rate increase should be included to allow a mechanism to capture the shortfall over time.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that these proposed changes are compared against the current 2023/2024 charges.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that the proposed increase is calculated with the rates increases and inflation rate factored in.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that the DC charge is calculated sufficiently so that the current rate payers are not required to pay more for growth.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that Developer Agreements also have the same rigour applied to them as DCs.

DRAFT FEES AND CHARGES:

Middle Ridge supports the fees and charges being a user pay system. There is a significant amount of capital proposed to be invested in organisational support. We support the increase in charges to pay back the general rate funding of this purchase.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends the fees and charges be increased to make the costs recoverable as user pays.

CURRENT RATING MODEL:

The current funding model is not fit for purpose. There is tension between ratepayers and residents. When residents and ratepayers ask for a higher level of service there is risk that the ratepayers are unable to afford this level of service. Undue pressure is then placed on Council to find middle ground of affordability vs delivery leading to friction and angst amongst all parties.

Council needs to look for other sources of income rather than relying on Ratepayers. While Central Government does provide funding it is always with condition's and rarely enough.

Council needs to look to new strategy's if rate and fees are to be affordable moving into the future. Council needs to find strategic partners to help with the building and financing of infrastructure in our community's.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends WDC lobby's Central Government on different funding models and pushes back when new rules/laws appear that will add cost to delivery of services.

OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS:

Middle Ridge appreciated the submission process and the work WDC has put into; preparing and presenting this proposed Annual Plan for 2024/25

Middle Ridges Farms commends WDC on introducing an in-house enterprise project management office to oversee delivery. This lifts the level of accountability with contractors and recommends it continues.

Middle Ridge Farms commends WDC on the partnership for CCRV installation across the district and recommends it continues particularly in rural areas where boy racers and the like are damaging the roads, intersections and causing a nuisance.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC continue funding existing budgets for the Rural Advisory Panel, community boards and other community committees.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that the representatives on the Economic Rural Advisory Panel and Heritage Forum are selected through a democratic process. And that the panel members are publicly identified like the community boards representatives.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that the key performance indicators for response times for service requests and timeframes are adopted WDC.

Middle Ridge Farms Ltd recommends that WDC stops budgeting for new walking and cycling connections.

Middle Ridge Farms Ltd recommends that WDC does not adopt the Waikato Regional Council's public transport funding proposal.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that general rate payers do not fund the Huntly water upgrades as per proposed 2024/2025 Annual Plan.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC only budgets for the disposal of <u>WDC owned</u> old, condemned or erosion-effect buildings.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC reduces the Waikato Hamilton Tourism funding from \$150,000 down to \$75,000.

Middle Ridge Farms recommends that WDC removes all funding to Te Waka.

Middle Ridge Farms thanks WDC for providing the opportunity to submit to this proposed draft Annual Plan for 2024/25.






