TERMS OF REFERENCE

COUNCIL

Chairperson: Her Worship the Mayor

Deputy Chairperson: Deputy Mayor

Membership: The Mayor and all Councillors

Meeting frequency: Six weekly – or as required

Quorum: Half of the members (including vacancies)

Purpose

1. To provide leadership to, and advocacy on behalf of, the people of the Waikato District.

2. To define and represent the total communities' interests, ensuring ongoing community and economic development, the effective stewardship of existing assets, sustainable management of the environment, and the prudent management of the communities' financial resources.

Terms of Reference

The Council's terms of reference include the following powers which cannot be delegated to committees, subcommittees, officers or any other subordinate decision-making body:

- 1. The power to make a rate.
- 2. The power to make a bylaw.
- 3. The power to borrow money, or purchase or dispose of assets, other than in accordance with the Long-Term Plan.
- 4. The power to adopt a Long-Term Plan, Annual Plan, or Annual Report.
- 5. The power to appoint a Chief Executive.
- 6. The power to adopt policies required to be adopted and consulted on under the Local Government Act 2002 in association with the Long-term Plan or developed for the purpose of the local governance statement, including the Council's Infrastructure Strategy.
- 7. The power to adopt a remuneration and employment policy.
- 8. The power to approve or amend the Council's Standing Orders.
- 9. The power to approve or amend the Code of Conduct for elected members, and consider any recommendations made in relation to a complaint lodged under the Code.
- 10. The power to appoint and discharge:
 - a. members (including chairpersons) of Council committees and subordinate decisionmaking bodies, subject to the Mayor's powers under section 41A Local Government Act 2002; and
 - b. elected member representatives on external organisations.
- 11. The power to establish a joint committee with another local authority or other public body and appoint elected members as representatives on such committees or bodies.

- 12. The power to make the final decision on a recommendation from the Ombudsman where it is proposed that Council not accept the Ombudsman's recommendation.
- 13. The power to approve or change the District Plan, or any part of that Plan, in accordance with the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 14. The power to amend or replace the delegations in Council's Delegations Register (except where expressly permitted in the Delegations Register).

To exercise the following powers and responsibilities of Council, which the Council chooses to retain:

- 1. To approve a proposed policy statement or plan under the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 2. To approve changes to boundaries of the District under the Resource Management Act 1991 or any other legislation.
- 3. In respect of District Plan decisions:
 - a. To appoint independent commissioners to a panel for hearings of a Proposed District Plan;
 - b. To approve the recommendation of hearings commissioners on a proposed plan, plan change or variation (including private plan change); and
 - c. To approve a proposed plan or a change to a district plan under Clause 17, Schedule 1 of the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 4. To adopt governance level strategies, plans and policies which advance Council's vision and strategic goals (e.g. Hamilton to Auckland rail), other than where expressly delegated to a committee.
- 5. To approve Council's recommendation to the Remuneration Authority for the remuneration of elected members.
- 6. To approve the Triennial Agreement.
- 7. To approve resolutions required to be made by a local authority under the Local Electoral Act 2001, including the appointment of an electoral officer and reviewing representation arrangements.
- 8. To approve any changes to the nature and delegations of any Council committees or subordinate-decision making bodies.
- 9. To approve the Local Governance Statement.
- 10. To approve funding requests not allowed for within budgets, in accordance with Significance & Engagement Policy parameters.
- 11. To approve any additional funding decisions required for the Watercare Services contract.
- 12. To approve development agreements as recommended by the Development Agreements Subcommittee where infrastructure is not allowed for within the Long Term Plan.
- 13. To receive six-monthly reports from each Community Board on its activities and projects.

Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

To inform the Council on the status of roading projects in this Long-Term Plan (LTP), key risk, and funding recommendations/requests.

AND

To seek approval from the Council for additional funding for the identified Pookeno projects and River Road/Lake Road Roundabout.

AND

To reduce budgets for projects where surpluses have been identified.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

The Council's Roading Team is currently facing challenges in delivering some projects during the current financial year due to a shortfall in the allocated budget. The shortfall has resulted due to unexpectedly high prices encountered during the tendering process in the market. The increased cost are results of high inflation, changes in material costs, and high demand within the construction industry.

All these projects are either in, or due to commence, the physical construction stage and there is the risk of non-delivery due to insufficient budget. This report provides a comprehensive overview of multiple projects, detailed budget information and additional funding required to deliver these projects in current Financial Year (FY).

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Waikato District Council:

- a. approves the following budget adjustments:
 - i. additional funding for the Pookeno Main Street project of \$1,773,472
 - ii. additional funding for the Pookeno Road/Great South Road Intersection of \$1,817,577
 - iii. additional funding for Munro Road of \$449,496
 - iv. additional funding for River Road/Lake Road Intersection of \$447,532
 - v. to reduce budgets for projects where surpluses have been identified, \$1,699,176.
- b. It should be noted that the net funding impact is \$2,788,901 to be funded by NZTA subsidy \$457,485, additional \$2,099,078 of future development contributions, a reduction in debt of \$16,401, and additional \$248,739 of replacement funding.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

Staff have completed all pre-implementation (investigation and design) for the projects in this report and are entering the delivery phase. We have approached the open market, and our Alliance partner, to obtain pricing for the delivery of these projects. Like previous projects, having undergone the same process this year, we have found that contractor pricing has exceeded our available budgets and we have insufficient budget to successfully deliver the following projects:

- Pookeno Main Street
- Pookeno Road/Great South Road Roundabout
- River/Lake Road Intersection Upgrade
- Munro Road Resilience (Pookeno)

Project estimates are a recurring challenge, with many of our budgets created and submitted for approval during the development of the 2021-24 LTP.

The Pookeno projects have a history of dialogue with the local community with significant consultation carried out over the past 18 months regarding Main Street and the Pookeno Road/Great South Road intersection. Procurement for these two projects has been via the Alliance with works on the Main Street commencing in early January. The Pookeno Road/Great South Road intersection underwent value engineering to bring the initial cost estimate down, though still representing a funding challenge. This project has been put on hold until approval, or otherwise, is provided for additional funding.

For Pookeno Main Street, this was a continuation of the upgrade works that had already been completed and staff had made an assumption of the availability of funding within the budget to continue with the works. The construction for this project has continued and it is acknowledged that full funding is not in place for this project and therefore represents a risk. This risk is minimal due to our Alliance partners delivering this work on our behalf, as opposed to an external contractor.

Munro Road Resilience project includes road works and culvert replacements and coordination with the entrance to the new sports park. This project was tendered on the open market. Whilst the tender price was marginally above the available budget, we required additional funding for Management, Surveillance and Quality Assurance (MSQA) and contingency. This project is on hold.

River Road/Lake Road intersection upgrade includes construction of a roundabout, that required land purchase and service location as part of the project. Preliminary works commenced late in 2023 and the project is currently on hold awaiting final resource consent and additional funding.

Discussion and AnalysisTaataritanga Me Ngaa Tohutohu

1) Request for additional funding of the identified Pookeno projects and River Road and Lake Road Roundabout

a) Pookeno Main Street Project (Great South Road)

Great South Road identified as Pookeno Main Street in the Public Realm, extends from Shelby Street up to the intersection of Pookeno Road and Great South Road. It involves upgrading Great South Road to include pedestrian upgrades, raised safety platform, landscaping and beautification. The project is divided into three sections. First section stretches from Shelby Street to Wellington Street. The second section stretches from Wellington Street to Marlborough Street and the third section stretches from Marlborough Street to the intersection of Pookeno Road and Great South Road.

The second section from the Wellington Street to Marlborough Street is being delivered within the current FY budget and other two sections are programmed to be delivered in 2024-2034 LTP. Wellington Street to Marlborough Street is being delivered in parts. Wellington Street between the shops and truck stop has been delivered last FY and now works are underway for remaining part. As noted, there are budget issues to be resolved. The 2024 budget for the project is \$256,528 and we require an additional \$1,773,472 to deliver the project.

60% of this shortfall is related to growth and therefore has a corresponding impact on Development Contributions collected for the Pookeno Structure Plan.

b) Pookeno Main Street and Great South Road Roundabout

A new roundabout is set to be constructed at the intersection of Pookeno Road and Great South Road as part of intersection upgrade. The design of the project is complete, and we are now ready to enter the construction stage. The project faced an initial delay due to

budgetary constraints prompting a review of its design. Following the design review, the estimated cost still exceeded the allocated budget by approximately \$1,817,577. Consequently, a temporary halt has been placed on the project pending further funding approval. It should be noted that the entire project may not be completed within the current financial year and the remainder of the project will be delivered in two consecutive FYs.

60% of this shortfall is related to growth and therefore has a corresponding impact on Development Contributions collected for the Pookeno Structure Plan.

c) Munro Road Project

The project was tendered in December 2023. A combination of the tender price and the required project contingency and MSQA for the project has resulted in additional budget of \$449,496 required for completion. Staff have discussed this shortfall with our Principal Investment Advisor at Waka Kotahi, and they have indicated that they will fund the project for the additional \$449,496 at 51% if we have the available local share.

d) River Road and Lake Road Roundabout Project

The River and Lake Road Roundabout project, which is being delivered by the Alliance, has an estimated total cost of \$1,973,410, including contingency, to deliver the physical works. The project aims to be completed by late June. The project attracts 51% subsidy from Waka Kotahi.

The cost to date encompasses design expenses, land purchase and various completed tasks such as the relocation of existing services, removal of trees and vegetation, and fence installation at private properties. All drainage work has been successfully completed. As noted earlier, staff are awaiting final resource consent, which is imminent, however acknowledge that we have a funding shortfall of \$447,532.

Staff have discussed this shortfall with our Principal Investment Advisor at Waka Kotahi, and they have indicated that they will fund the project for the additional \$447,532 at 51% if we have the available local share.

2) To reduce/reallocate budgets for projects where surpluses have been identified.

Pookeno market square development

The Pookeno Market Square Development project was originally intended to be spent to develop a "Market Square" around the intersection of Market Road and Great South Road. During recent planning work, including the development of the Pookeno Public Realm Concept plan, the concept of a Market Square has been superseded with a more holistic development of the Main Street. The project now involves urbanization of the Great South Road as Main Street, along with urbanization of the side roads leading to Great South Road (Main Street). The remaining budget will be used to design and upgrade the Market Street in future LTPs. Reducing project budgets where surpluses are identified can partially offset the additional local share requested from the Council.

Helenslee/Pookeno Signals

This project has been successfully delivered with traffic signals installed on site. After completion of the project there are some works identified by the safety audit which needs to be carried out. Notably, there is a surplus budget of \$100,000.

Helenslee Road Pookeno Structure Plan

This project has been delivered, it involved upgrading the intersection of Helenslee Road and Pookeno Road. The budget surplus of this project is \$15,163.

Bankier Road Safety network Improvements Project:

The project involved installation of the Rural Intersection Activated Warning Signs (RIAWS) at the intersection of the Boyd Road and Dawson Road to improve the safety of the intersection. The sign lights up if there is vehicle in the side road enabling the reduction of the speed of the vehicle in Bankier Road reducing the risk of head on collisions of the vehicles. The project was delivered in the last FY. The project surplus is\$290,749.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

Option 1 Approve the staff recommendation, which includes approving the additional funding of the identified Pookeno Projects, and River Road and Lake Road Roundabout, and reducing the budgets for projects where surpluses have been identified.

Option 2 To not approve the staff recommendation to fund the shortfalls identified. For Pookeno specifically there is significant reputational risk with the non-delivery of these projects which have been the subject of much public debate and have been identified in the structure plan over a number of years.

Staff recommend Option 1

5.2 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

Table 1 summarises the shortfall as explained in Section 5 of this report. In the case of Munro Road and the River/Lake Roundabout the additional local share is offset by the 51% subsidy that we can attract from Waka Kotahi. Table 2 shows the funding adjustments required for each project split across subsidy, growth, LOS and renewal. The growth component will have the biggest impact as it relates to development contributions captured and a recalculation based on the increase in costs for these projects. The Pookeno Structure Plan reserve will be utilised to fund the additional growth component, internal loans fund the Level of Service component, and the Roading Replacement Fund will fund the additional Renewal component required.

Table 3 summarises the local share returned where surpluses have been identified. Table 4 shows the funding adjustments by project split across growth, LOS and renewal.
