Public Forum
Agenda Item 5.1

• River Terraces Burglaries – There had been a number of car break-ins and car thefts. Residents were putting in security systems and contacting Police but nothing happens. Something had to be done due to the cost to residents.

Organisations need to do better to help young offenders. Wintec would be receptive to helping the young people. It was believed that people were accessing the River Terraces via the river walk to commit crime. Barely a fortnight goes by without an incident.

Local youth groups had been active with helping troubled young people, but there were still some that had fallen between the cracks. The local constable had been attempting to address thefts, but police were understaffed.

There was also a local community patrol, but they only patrol once a week, typically in the weekend and it was noted that they were desperate for more volunteers. Contacts were available for neighbourhood support who could provide a lot of resources for local groups.

 Gang problems – Concern was raised regarding gang paraphanalia flags on display on the Great South Road, as well as tagging on the Horotiu Bridge. Members noted that the flags were present to commerate a fatality. Suggested that Horotiu Bridge could be painted to distract people from tagging the bridge. Suggested that the Community Board members may contact the whanau regarding the flags after the unveiling to honour the individual who passed.

Community Led Development Workplan Presentation Agenda Item 6.1

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and the following discussion was held.

- The Community Led Development team were looking at ways to further progress community aspirations.
- Community Led Development takes in community voices and views, and empowers the community, with community led initiatives.
- The Community Led Development team helps groups lead their own projects. They
 can help with training and upskilling, connecting groups with other agencies, brokering
 conversations between groups and Council, navigating Health & Safety and
 understanding funding mechanisms.
- There will be a new funding position to help communities gain funding for aspirational projects.
- The Community Led Development team will offer community workshop and initiatives to help groups build their skills.
- Two new Economic Development Advisor roles had begun working for Council, to work on big projects, as well as social enterprise.
- There will be twelve (12) workshops on governance and funding skills. These will be held via Zoom.
- Council had partnered up with Community Waikato for these workshops to assist with project and trust development.
- The Community Board can help promote the workshop programme, and inform the Community Led Development team regarding new aspirations identified.
- Workshops will begin at the end of March 2022. Those who could attend the
 workshops would be individuals and established or new community groups.
 Workshops want to capture as many people as possible who want to have an input in
 their community.
- Noted that collaboration and collective work was important, with getting groups working together on collective projects.

ACTION: Community Led Development Team to forward details of coming workshop to the Ngaruawahia Community Board for promotion on their Facebook page and circulation to member of the community.

<u>Discretionary Fund Report to 21 January 2022</u> Agenda Item 6.2

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and the following discussion was held.

 Belgravia Pools Subsidy – Belgravia advised they had received the previous years subsidies, but funds had not been spent from the discretionary fund. The 2021-2022 subsidy will be paid at the end of March 2022.

ACTION: Finance Team to confirm that the previous Belgralvia pools subsidies had been spent from the Ngaruwahia discretionary fund.

Ngaruawahia Security Cameras Project (Discussed as 6.1) Agenda Item 6.3

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and following discussion was held.

- The Board thoroughly workshopped the project and were happy with the result.
- Installation & Power to the site It is included in the quote. Cornerstone Security did
 not have the authority for the installation of power to the pole. The proposal covers
 installation of the cameras and connectivity to the police surveillance technology.
- Seven sites identified were existing cameras that needed upgrading, with the additionof two more cameras (Section 8 & 9), which included the corner of River Rd and Great South Rd. The cameras would only collect plate numbers. Other areas identified as future sites of interest include Waingaro Rd.
- The current system was in complete disrepair and almost useless to the Police.
- River Rd & Great South Rd camera The camera would face toward Ngaruawahia township.
- Board were keen to contribute \$45,000 from their discretionary fund, and then get additional funding for additional cameras.
- Cornerstone Security did not see any inflation for the costs of the project.
- Would the system have the capacity for additional cameras? Yes, the system would be able to extended out to 60 cameras, so future proofing is guaranteed.
- Safer Communities Blueprint may be able to contribute towards the shortfall of funds.

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- Ngaruawahia Police were supportive of the project.
- Projected cost for an additional camera, on top of the current proposal would be roughly \$15,000.

ACTION: Community Led Development team to discuss using the Safer Community Blueprint to contribute the Security Camera Project.

Works, Actions & Issues Report: Status of Items January 2022 Agenda Item 6.4

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and discussion was held.

- Ngaruawahia Pool Sign Cr Patterson had been working with Mr Searle and Belgravia regarding what was previously discussed regarding the signs. There were certain restrictions for where the sign could be located. The aim was to get the sign erected before the end of the swimming season.
- Building Upgrades Kennel club roof has been replaced. Question why the Kennel Club couldn't remain at The Point Reserve? Noted that there could be a possible problem with the current Reserve Management Plan. It was important to understand the reason why the Kennel Club could not move to The Point Reserve. If they want an event at The Point, they could apply through Council's events teams.

ACTION: Management Plan to be emailed to the board members on the reasons why the Kennel Club cannot move to The Point.

- Pedestrian Refuges Work had been completed on the Waingaro Rd pedestrian refuge.
- Dog Pound Suggested that the pound may move to Hopu Hopu, near the current Wastewater Treatment Plant. The Hopu Hopu Taniwha project had been taken into account for the consideration of the Hopu Hopu site. The site had not been locked in but it is an option and was outside the special Hopuhopu zone within the proposed district plan.

 Paterson Park – The shared court needs to changed back to Netball Courts from Tennis Courts at the first weekend of March 2022. However the first tournament had been cancelled for the year.

ACTION: Staff to organise that the shared court at Paterson Park be changed back to Netball courts at the appropriate time.

Old Pony Club – The location was not seen as a viable place for the Kennel Club due
to frequent flooding. No explanation had been provided regarding why horses were
present there and why the hay was cut.

ACTION: The Reserve Planner to provide a further explanation regarding reserve management plan.

Second Quarter Service Request Report to December 31 2021 Agenda Item 6.5

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and discussion was held.

 Service Request Process - Was there a concrete answer regarding when requests were notified as completed? Was it when the request was sent to the contractor or when the problem has been resolved? Waikato District Alliance and Citycare now notify when a request is completed, not when they receive the request.

Chairperson's Report Agenda Item 6.6

The report was received [NCB2202/02 refers] and discussion was held.

- Submitted a written submission on behalf of the Community Board on the Speed Limit Bylaw and Dog Control Bylaw. The Dog Control submission noted that Jesmond St and Great South Road should be an onleash area, rather than a prohibited area. For the Speed Limit Bylaw submission, the submission opposed the proposed lowering of the speed limit along Great South Road.
- Roller Doors Board to work with the Economic Development Advisor regarding the removal of the doors for painting. Possibility raised that the doors could be removed completely rather than painting them.
- Kiwi Rail Safety Day Will they do their school safety programme? The programme
 was put off due to COVID as Kiwirail could not get into the schools. This would be
 rescheduled. There were ideas to deter people jumping off the rail bridge including
 laying down asphalt and sealing on the railway sleepers that get very hot during
 summer.

Councillors' Report Agenda Item 6.7

Crs Gibb and Patterson gave verbal reports on current Council issues as follows:

- Cr Patterson Solid Food Waste Review There was a big move from the Central Government regarding reducing waste going to landfill. Council was consulting with the Raglan community to continue the food waste service. Council was encouraging the community to continue the service but there would be a targeted rate. Food waste collection was being rolled out in many districts around the country. Council had discussed with local Marae regarding solid waste and composting. Important that Central Government provide support and direction for Council to move forward with plans for solid waste collections.
- Cr Gibb First day back in the office, with Easter Trading Policy Hearing. Predominately the debate focussed on Raglan, with small businesses needing support. The policy review occurs every five years. The surrounding councils (Hamilton, Waipa, Auckland) default to closing on Easter Sunday. There were also workshops on Treasury Risk Management, Local Alcohol Policy & Raglan Food Waste.

Members provided a verbal report on the following issues:

 Ngaruawahia currently had six (6) active cases of COVID.

Ngaruawahia Office Reclad

Project ongoing – this will be multi-year project.

Architects Chow Hill have been commissioned to develop designs to adapt, re-use, and partially re-develop and have provided the first preliminary draft designs. These are currently being reviewed.

Bundled Hall works

Comprising of Ngaruawahia, Raglan, and Tuakau Hall seismic assessment, seismic strengthening, refurbishments, and flooring works.

GDC Consultants have completed seismic site investigation for the Ngaruawahia, Raglan and Tuakau Halls. The report for Ngaruawahia Hall has been received and is being reviewed. Raglan and Tuakau Memorial Hall reports are due this week.

Quotes for flooring repairs and specific refurbishments for each hall are being sought.
