REPORTS

Public Forum
Agenda Item 5

The following items were discussed at the Public Forum:

Kim Wood - Citycare

Ms Wood was introducing herself to the Community Boards across the district as she had now moved to Citycare and wanted to grow the relationship with boards and the community with a view to developing community initiatives.

Members queried if the red silverbeet around town was edible – it was noted they were edible but not recommended due to the carbon monoxide soot on plants from traffic. Citycare were looking to see if they could be utilised by Hamilton Zoo as feed, Board Members raised Hope Rising Trust for their horses.

ACTION: Citycare to investigate whether the plants were suitable as feed for Hope Rising Trust, Hamilton Zoo or local pig farmers.

Members queried the standard for assessment of Netball courts at Taupiri – the surface is very slippery and games are starting to be played.

ACTION: Staff to ensure service request is submitted to have netball courts cleaned.

Concern was raised regarding Ngaruawahia footpaths, assessment required to ensure they are accessible.

ACTION: Staff to advise of latest assessment in regard to accessibility/condition of footpaths in Ngaruawahia.

Board queried the reserve classification of Te Mana o Te Rangi Reserve – it was noted that this was an internal conversation with staff to review classifications of reserves.

ACTION: Staff to advise of the possible reclassification for Te Mana o Te Rangi Reserve.

Ms Wood advised that they were interested in additional programmes in school, currently assisting Huntly College with planting projects that they design and Citycare assist with plantings.

ACTION: Ms Firth on Ngaruawahia High School Board and will raise with the Board and principal.

Ms Wood advised that they could not support community gardens with funding or material, however they would have time and knowledge that could be shared.

The Board requested Citycare touch base with Turangawaewae to assist with the beautification of the grounds and marae entrance as in August there would be an increase in visitors for the Koroneihana commemoration.

ACTION: Citycare to contact Turangawaewae as to whether they could assist with beautification of the marae entrance.

<u>Councillor Pamela Storey – Waikato Regional Council</u>

Councillor Storey provided an update on recent plans and policies for the Waikato Regional Council (WRC) recently:

- Endorsed draft Regional Coastal Plan which establishes rules around activities in the coastal areas. Currently under consultation with lwi – would be notified around February 2023.
- Biosecurity Strategy sits alongside the Regional Pest Management Plan. WRC did not include Canadian Geese in recent review as they were required to provide five (5) years of strategy funding to enable them to put any initiatives into the plan they currently do not have the funding available for this and have focussed on weeds that are already widespread with a negative impact on the environment.
- WRC taking wholistic approach to infrastructure strategy utilising leading edge framework, that enables challenging conversations with the community in regard to climate change. Affordability is a key issue for climate change remedies.
- Three Waters has a large impact on Regional Councils' freshwater approach already in stream. Community workshops being held at present – next one is 21 June in Tuakau.

<u>Discretionary Fund Report to 30 May 2022</u> Agenda Item 6.1

The report was received [NCB2206/02 refers] and the following discussion was held:

- Concern that the Hope Rising Farm Trust funds had been paid twice however it was noted that one showed as a credit from the Te Mana o Te Rangi Reserve commitment as agreed by the Board.
- The Board were advised that the CCTV project deposit was scheduled for payment on Tuesday, 15 June and work was scheduled to start on 11 July. Still issues with finding a power source for the River Road camera – discussions being undertaken with WEL networks.
- Board queried the funding to come from Community Led Development team for the camera on Waingaro Road, near the bridge.

ACTION: CLD team to confirm commitment provided by them to the CCTV project and where these cameras would be located.

ACTION: CME team to arrange media release as this is a large amount of funding being led by the Community Board.

<u>Laura Millward – Manager, Te Whare Toi o Ngaaruawaahia</u> [Tabled Attachment 6.1.2 – updated application]

Ms Millward, Manager Te Whare Toi o Ngaaruawaahia was in attendance to answer questions and tabled an updated application form (attached to these minutes). The following additional points were raised:

- Marketing and print for the exhibition was being funded via Matariki ki Waikato
- A number of events held over the week, with the market on the weekend.
- People would be able to create their own candles as a memorial for their loved ones, this was one of the activities that would increase whanau participation.
- There would be waiata sessions and the organisers would be working with Creative Waikato on the various sessions being held.
- The market day would have food stalls and entertainment, with a view to creating Matariki/locally influenced photoboard stops along the way to pull visitors into the space.
- The Board noted Ngaruawahia was known for their Matariki celebrations and were keen to continue supporting the events.

Resolved: (Cr Patterson/Ms Rice)

THAT the Ngaruawahia Community Board:

- a. approves an allocation from their Discretionary Fund to Te Whare Toi o Ngaaruawaahia;
- b. for the amount of \$3,130 (excl GST);
- c. towards the cost of the Matariki Festival.

Works, Actions & Issues Report: Status of Items June 2022 Agenda Item 6.2

The report was received [NCB2206/02 refers] and discussion was held.

- Perry Bridge Lighting quote approved just awaiting contractor confirmation of original quote.
- Paterson Park one court only running with one junior court, yet there used to be two sets of junior hoops/nets.

ACTION: Staff to investigate where second set of junior hoops/nets are and advise if they have been disposed of whether they would be replaced.

 Road name list – Cr Patterson and Chairperson met with the developer and agreed that for the Hakarimata Road development one road would be from the board list and the other from the developer. It was noted that LINZ required anything with 5 or more houses to have a road name.

ACTION: Cr Patterson to forward the emails regarding road naming to the Board.

- It was noted that Council could not control the number of legislative changes occurring but we could control relationships with developers to ensure sufficient green spaces are provided for our communities.
- Council have regular monthly meetings with developers where possible to ensure we develop efficiencies and work in the most appropriate way for our communities.

- It was noted that Ngaruawahia had become the preferred place for papakainga development.
- Regent Street narrower footpath installed with redevelopment, it was noted that the Board should log an service request as these works are occurring or any issues they find in the community.
- Concern was raised with the state of both the footpath and road outside of Turangawaewae marae, particularly in light of the upcoming number of manuhiri that will attend the Koroneihana events in August. Cr Patterson had been advised that no works were programmed in this area.

ACTION: Staff to advise whether there was a budget to utilise considering the health and safety issues caused by the footpaths and roadway being in such poor condition.

 An update was provided on what was occurring with the demolition of the Waipa Tavern. Council had issued a notice to have remediation work completed within five (5) days and would undertake the necessary actions themselves and recoup from owners if not done. The intent was to secure the site and reopen the footpath to allow pedestrians safe access along a busy carriageway.

ACTION: Board requested a reduction in the speed limit in this area (to 30km/hr) to reduce the risk to pedestrians until the full footpath area could be reopened.

- Paterson Park it was believed the next lot of lighting would be for the netball courts
 Cr Patterson to confirm via email.
- Changing sheds at Paterson park can we have a timing for this work?

ACTION: Board to be advised of timing for each of the projects in Paterson Park.

 Negotiation to be undertaken for Paterson Park changing sheds to be upgraded/replaced. Staff advised they would need to be in the LTP and reprioritised through the Blueprint process.

ACTION: Staff to advise of the Blueprint priorities and discuss with the Board and ascertain where the Paterson Park Changing Sheds were in the current LTP.

Resolved: (Ms Morgan/Cr Patterson)

That the Ngaruawahia Community Board requests the Paterson Park changing sheds be reprioritised for Blueprint funding.

- Recommended the Community Board hold a workshop and advise Democracy Team what date this would be held so they could assist the Board in this process.
- It was noted that the Charter was currently based on legislative requirements and the Board may consider providing feedback on possible delegations, other than discretionary funding.

Chairperson's Report Agenda Item 6.4

The Chair gave a verbal report and answered questions of the Board:

 Election – candidate information briefings have been scheduled for Pokeno, Hopuhopu, Tamahere and an online livestream event, Council would not be holding anymore that what was stated but did encourage the Board to hold meet the candidate evenings once nominations had closed.

ACTION: Communications Team to email candidate information briefing poster to boards to place on their Facebook pages.

- Chairperson drove around the Community Board area with Cr Patterson looking at catchpits that required maintenance and identifying other issues that would be logged as service requests.
- Met with Waikato District Alliance team regarding footpath issues and 10 year programme not working. Raised the issue of overgrowth from people's gardens/lawns etc. also.

Councillors' Report Agenda Item 6.5

Crs Gibb and Patterson provided a verbal overview on current Council issues:

- Thanked the Community Board members for undertaking daffodil planting in the rain.
- Reconnection week held for staff last week and Councillors were also happy to reconnect in person this month.
- Council has new waiata in line with ward review both Councillors and Community Board would like to be sent words and tune.
- A number of policy renewals and submissions being undertaken at present.
- Conversations with developers and staff on building relationships.
- Regional Connections Committee public transport working on negative emissions.
- Cemeteries bylaw workshop updating policy and bylaw for consultation to communities.

Community Board Members' Report Agenda Item 6.6

Members provided a verbal report on the following issues:

- Ms Rice advised the Dingle Foundation had a new group of students to work with.
 Next workshop would be held on 5 July.
- Ms Morgan acknowledged service providers in the community as there was still a need for their support, along with volunteers assisting whanau following COVID.
- Mr Ayers noted the need for footpath and road repairs outside of Turangawaewae and enjoyed doing the work with schools and kindergartens in regard to Daffodil Day plantings.
- Ms Firth noted that the catchpits along River Road had large dips, since some roadworks had been carried out and would lodge a service request.

Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

To inform the Ngāruawāhia Community Board of the Ngāruawāhia, Taupiri, & Hopuhopu Structure Plan review and the development of a Ngāruawāhia Town Centre Plan project and progress to date. This report will also highlight the proposed next steps (process) as part of early engagement.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

Waikato District Council has completed a gap analysis of the existing 2017 Structure Plan, which identifies where additional work is needed to better plan for and address the growth and development for these communities over the next 30 years.

Waikato District Council is going to engage with the communities over the coming months to hear what the communities see as the opportunities and issues facing the township/village and what could be done to address or action them as the township/village grows. To date Waikato District Council has engaged with a Marae representative from Taupiri and is expecting to meet with additional Marae representatives from Taupiri, Ngāruawāhia, & Hopuhopu before the end of July.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Ngāruawāhia Community Board:

- a. receives the Ngāruawāhia, Taupiri, & Hopuhopu Structure Plan / Ngāruawāhia Town Centre Plan Update; and
- b. nominate one Community Board representative to sit on the project Reference Group; and
- c. considers how they can help play a role in advocating for public participation in upcoming engagements.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

Waikato District Council has completed a gap analysis of the existing 2017 Structure Plan and identified where additional work (updates of technical reports) needs to be done to provide a comprehensive Structure Plan that caters for the growth and development of these communities over the next 30 years. It has been identified that a Town Centre Plan will be informed by the Structure Plan to ensure consistency and a shared vision for the wider community is achieved, whilst drilling down to the detail needed to revitalise the town centre.


- February 2022 to June 2022: Gap analysis and commencement of background reports
- July 2022 to August 2022: Early consultation with Maraes and Community Boards

Next stepsAhu whakamua

During the coming months, the Waikato District Council Strategic Planning team will be engaging with the relevant Marae's and Community Boards. Part of this engagement will be the establishment of a Project Reference Group consisting of one representative from each of the following; Waikato Tainui, Waikato Tainui (Hopuhopu Development) Tūrangawaewae Marae, Taupiri Marae, Taupiri Community Board, Ngāruawāhia Community Board and both of the Local Ward Councillors. The reference group will be a sounding board for material prior to public engagements. The wider community consultation/engagement piece will consist of:

- an opportunities and issues community survey,
- followed up by an opportunities and issues community workshop,
- a community feedback session with options or actions to address opportunities and issues raised.

In parallel, the Structure Plan and Town Centre plan work will be progressed. An indicative timeline is outline in the diagram below.



Gap Analysis of the 2017 Ngāruawāhia& Surrounds Structure Plan

- The existing structure plan document was completed in 2017 and accompanying technical inputs from as early as 2014.
- This is a review of the technical inputs/existing information to see if they're still fit for purpose; Market assessment, Transportation, Urban design, Archaeology, Heritage, Geotech, Ground contamination, 3 Waters, Landscapes, Open spaces, & Community facilities.
- The Gap analysis will help inform the new structure plan.
 - Existing 2017 structure plan spatial area: Ngāruawāhia, Taupiri, Hopuhopu, Horotiu, Glen Massey, & Te Kowhai.
 - Proposed structure plan spatial area: Ngāruawāhia, Taupiri, & Hopuhopu.
- Various technical updates will also inform components of the Ngāruawāhia Town Centre Plan (Transport, Urban design, Market, Open Spaces, & Community facilities).

Key Changes within the townships - Population

Ngāruawāhia:


- Population originally predicted to grow to approximately 5600 by 2040.
- Population is currently 8760 and expected to grow to approximately 9800 by 2040 (UoW High projection).

Taupiri:

- Population originally predicted to grow to approximately 640 by 2040
- Population is currently 719 and expected to grow to approximately 1080 by 2040 (UoW High projection).

Hopuhopu:

Approximately 135, expected to grow to 270 over the next 4-5 years.





Key Changes within the townships - Zoning & Growth cells

(Waikato 2070)

Ngāruawāhia:


- New residential Growth cells (Greenfield) North (to Starr Road),
 North East (River Road), & South (Saulbrey & Rangimarie Road).
 - All of these growth cells have been zoned (through the PDP) to match Waikato 2070.
- New medium density zoning in the town centre to enable redevelopment.

Taupiri:

- New residential growth cell (Greenfield) South (to Kainui Road),
 - This growth cell has been partially zoned (through the PDP) to match Waikato 2070.
- New industrial growth cells (Greenfield) South/ South east (Kainui and Kerie Road)
 - These growth cells have been identified as FUZ (through the PDP) to align Waikato 2070

Hopuhopu:

 Zoned (Precinct) as per Waikato Tainui's submission, and will be developed over the next 5 years and is aligned with the growth cell.

1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To seek feedback from Community Boards on the Elected Member Policies that will be reviewed by the Policy & Regulatory Committee in September 2022.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

The following policies are due for review and will be forwarded to the Policy & Regulatory Committee for consideration on 1 August 2022. Council held a workshop on 18 July to provide feedback/direction on changes to the following policies:

- 1. Elected Members Reimbursement Policy (Attachment 1); and
- 2. Conference & Seminars Policy (Attachment 2).

The Elected Members Reimbursement Policy covers travel and reimbursement of costs in line with the Remuneration Authority Determinations. It is noted that Council may provide IT and Communication allowances for community board members but to date they have not done so. The increase in zoom meetings over COVID-19 lockdowns and traffic light systems has reduced again and will cease if the Epidemic Preparedness Notice expires in September as indicated by the Government.

Earlier this year Councillors considered the attendance to the LGNZ conference and a request from two community board members to also attend, the Conference & Seminars Policy is clear that the Mayor and Deputy Mayor would usually attend the conference and be delegates for the AGM. In addition to this the Mayor appoints two other Councillors to attend the conference as a training and networking opportunity.

Community board members can apply to attend the community board conference, for which the programme is more geared towards community boards. However, this has not been written into the policy previously and there should be more clarity for community board members on how the apply to attend these conferences and where the costs would come from.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

THAT the Community Board provides feedback on the proposed policies for consideration by the Policy & Regulatory Committee in September 2022.

4. Next steps Ahu whakamua

The Policy & Regulatory will consider the feedback from Community Boards at it's September 2022 meeting and determine whether any further changes based on that feedback will be made to the two policies.

I Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this policy is to ensure reimbursements to elected members occurs in a fair and accountable manner.

2 Application

- 2.1 This policy applies to:
 - a. all elected members of the Waikato District Council (Council); and
 - b. where specified in the Policy, members of the Community Boards.

3 Significance

3.1 This Policy is not considered significant in terms of the Significance and Engagement Policy.

4 Policy statements

Salaries

- 4.1 Salaries will be paid to elected members of Council in accordance with the remuneration pool and rules determined by the Remuneration Authority.
- 4.2 The remuneration pool determined by the Remuneration Authority will be split in accordance with a Council resolution.
- 4.3 Those Councillors sitting on statutory hearings (as defined by the Remuneration Authority) are to be paid the maximum allowable hourly rate but no additional rate is payable to the Chairperson.
- 4.4 The Council will not pay separate meeting allowances to elected members.

Vehicle Mileage Allowance

- 4.5 A vehicle mileage allowance for travel can be claimed by Councillors and Community Board members where:
 - a. The Councillor or Community Board member is not otherwise provided with the use of a vehicle by Council.



- b. The travel is in a private vehicle on Council business and by the most direct route that is reasonable in the circumstances.
- c. In the case of Community Boards, the mileage is only for Community Board meetings or where members have been invited to attend a Council meeting or workshop up to an annual limit of 3000km.
- 4.6 The payment will be at the rate prescribed by the Remuneration Authority or the Inland Revenue Department, whichever is lower.
- 4.7 The payment would only be made to Councillors in line with meetings as outlined below:
 - Council meetings.
 - b. Council workshops.
 - c. Council committee meetings to which they have been appointed by resolution of Council.
 - d. Any committee meeting where that Committee resolved to give the elected member(s) voting and speaking rights.
 - e. Any committee that an elected member who is not an appointed member of that committee but needs to attend because of an issue that is specific to that elected member's ward is being discussed and where in the opinion of the Chair of the committee, the Councillor's attendance would add value to the item being discussed.
 - f. Outside committees or organisations that the elected member has been appointed to by resolution of Council.
 - g. Attendance at a conference or seminar or on Council business where the elected member(s) has been authorised to attend by resolution of Council.
 - h. Any meeting that an elected member is requested to attend by the Mayor or the Chief Executive such as roadside meetings or meetings with individual ratepayers.
 - i. Any inspection or visit that an elected member is required to undertake at the request of the Mayor or by resolution of committee. This clause is intended to cover inspections arising from emergency work or planned familiarisation trips in conjunction with Council projects.
- 4.8 Councillors or Community Board members must be in attendance at meetings for at least 60% of the time taken to conduct the business of the meeting to be eligible for the payment of vehicle mileage unless determined otherwise by the Mayor.
- 4.9 All claims for vehicle mileage on Council business be submitted in writing and signed by the claimant.
- 4.10 Any disputed claims for vehicle mileage shall be referred to the Mayor whose decision shall be final.

Communication Allowance

4.11 Council authorises the payment of a communication allowance where the equipment of service is privately owned or funded by Councillors to cover the cost of one or more of the following:



- a) Mobile telephone
- b) Computer, tablet or ancillary equipment
- c) Internet connection
- 4.12 The payment will be at the maximum level prescribed by the Remuneration Authority for that year with payment to be made on an instalment basis through each scheduled pay run. The sum of the instalments is not to exceed the maximum prescribed.
- 4.13 An allowance will not be paid where Council provides the equipment or service including but not limited to:
 - a) A mobile telephone
 - b) A computer, tablet and ancillary equipment, or
 - c) An internet connection

Miscellaneous

- 4.14 The Mayor and Councillors may incur some incidental meal costs. These expenses are to be in line with expenditure limits specified in Council's policy on Conferences and Seminars Attendance and Payment of Expenses (including Local Government New Zealand Conferences).
- 4.15 Any expenses other than travelling expenses will be approved by the Chief Executive with a copy of the receipt and evidence that it is a genuine out-of-pocket expense for the conducting of Council business.

Applications for reimbursement

- 4.16 All applications for reimbursements in line with this Policy will be signed off by the Council Support Team. Any exceptions to this policy will be referred to the Chief Executive for approval in consultation with the Mayor. Expense claims for the Mayor are to be signed off by the Chief Executive and Deputy Mayor.
- 4.17 The reimbursement of miscellaneous expenses must be approved by the Chief Executive.

5 Policy review

5.1 This policy shall be reviewed at three yearly intervals following local government elections or as otherwise required by the Chief Executive.

Council will meet the cost of meals and drinks whilst on Council business up to a cost of \$65 per head, per meal. [Refer WDC1105/05/1/5, WDC1012/05/1/6]

This expenditure limit will be reviewed and updated on an annual basis. [Refer WDC0903/08/1/1/1] Accommodation will be arranged taking into consideration proximity to the venue, cost, health, security and safety issues.

Council will not reimburse expenditure from mini-bars.
