

Supporting the South

The project is part of a longer term transport network being investigated and delivered to support growth in south Auckland. The improvements will provide better choices for the 120,000 people who will make the area home in the next 30 years.

Through the Government's New Zealand Upgrade Programme, Waka Kotahi and KiwiRail will begin construction of \$2.395 billion of transport improvements for south Auckland within the next three years. As well as Papakura to Drury South, this includes Mill Road, Papakura to Pukekohe rail electrification and new rail stations for Drury.



KEY PROJECT BENEFITS

- Supports growth and liveability of surrounding communities by increasing access to employment, markets, services and amenities.
- Provides an additional traffic lane in each direction, interchange improvements and opportunities for dedicated public transport services.
- Provides walking and cycling alternatives for communities adjacent to the Southern Motorway.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS



To improve local water quality, stormwater will be treated using vegetated swales where space allows, providing natural treatment for runoff.

The use of the extra lanes as potential managed special vehicle lanes will be investigated to prioritise vehicle types, e.g. freight, high-occupancy.



Supports the growth of communities by improving access and journey time reliability, along and across the motorway.



Work is underway with utility companies to identify and understand their current infrastructure, so fibre optic cables, gas and water pipes and other services can be designed around and avoided during construction.



Walking and cycling 'spine' connects communities along the route with places of work, education and leisure.



Safety and network management is improved with an upgraded motorway alignment and through technologies such as variable speed limits, ramp signalling, and incident and congestion detection capability.



Mana Whenua are recognised as Treaty of Waitangi partners on this project. This partnership is actioned through the Southern Iwi Integration Group.



Bridges at Otūwairoa (Slippery Creek) and Ngakoroa will be raised to provide resilience for climate change and those at the Drury interchange and a proposed new interchange south of Drury will be designed to allow for 100 year flood predictions.

SH1 Papakura to Drury South project start of works



The first stage of the SH1 Papakura to Drury South project will begin construction on 6 April following the award of a contract to widen the Southern Motorway between Papakura to Drury.

Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency has announced Fulton Hogan as its construction contractor.

The first stage of construction covers works within the existing motorway boundaries from the north side of Papakura interchange to the south side of the Drury motorway service centre (approximate area shown in photo above).

Key features of this first stage include:

- An additional third lane in each direction and wide shoulders for future bus services
- The replacement of the Park Estate Road overbridge
- A new noise wall on the eastern side of the motorway between Papakura Interchange and Park Estate Road
- The upgrade of three culverts crossing under the motorway between Papakura Interchange and Park Estate Road
- Treatment of all stormwater coming off the motorway (as currently there is none).

Additional works to follow in the next stage once consented also include:

- A walking and cycling pathway along the western side of the motorway
- Interchange improvements at Papakura (a new southbound on-ramp) and Drury (to allow for railway electrification and additional rail lines)
- The replacement of the Bremner Road overbridge.

Together these works will extend the improvements north of Papakura delivered by the Southern Corridor Improvements project.

Early works about to get underway include:

- Roadside vegetation clearance
- Motorway resurfacing (at night during closures).

Following the motorway resurfacing, traffic lanes in both directions will be shifted left to open up a works area down the centre of the motorway. Initially work will occur down the middle of the motorway at night and on the sides (including Park Estate Road) during the day.

The motorway speed limit will be reduced to 80 km/h for safety reasons, and two traffic lanes in each direction will be maintained throughout construction on the project.

The replacement of the Park Estate Road overbridge will be carefully staged to maintain access for those living, working or worshipping on the western side. A single lane and footpath will be maintained for access throughout construction.







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		g. Has it been vested to WDC?		 Funding and Partnerships Update: Pokeno Development Foundation was established in October 2020 for community-led fundraising, with a strong interest in a skatepark as an initial project. There is great potential for Council to support fundraising efforts for a skatepark, rather than Council itself raising these funds for external sources due to Auckland-based funder criteria. Even with a community-led approach, many community funders would expect a Council LTP funding contribution to be made towards the project. LTP Update: The LTP is reaching a critical period with key draft LTP components due for discussion with Councillors throughout February and early March. Ben Burnand has taken on the role of LTP Project Manager until the end of June 2021. A number of briefings and workshops will be scheduled throughout February with the dates and times of public workshops published on Council's website. There is funding in the current draft LTP that corresponds to the resolutions for items 6.1 and 6.2 from the July meeting. However, the draft LTP budget will be under review by Councillors throughout February and March prior to forming a draft position that is ready for consultation.

LTP Update March: A number of workshops have taken place with Councillors since February. A Consult Document is being developed and the topics considered for consultation will be approve Council on 6 April. Parks – Munro Road Sports Park

Phase II Earthworks - Old Stream Infill and Earthworks

Construction of the new stream alignment has been completed under Phase I Earthworks. Planning underway for engagement of Geotechnical, Engineering Design and MSQA services along with further sequencing of future works. Phase 2 earthworks is planned to commence Monday, 4 October 2021.

Cemeteries – Whangarata Cemetery Development

Earthworks is 90% complete with the water services installed, tested, and connected to the main supply.

Accessway construction has commenced with aggregate being placed over subgrade. Subsoil drains have been placed along edge of accessway alignment and further subsoil drains within the proposed location of the burial plots are to commence.

Minor delays due to recent wet weather with the earthworks contractor targeting the week of the 19 April for completion of their work.

Waikato District Alliance are to come in and complete the pavement and kerbing scheduled from the end of April.

Programme of Works

The broad programme is as follows:

- Upgrade of Pokeno Road from Great South Road to past the school underway now and will be completed early in 2022.
- Upgrade of the Main Street is programmed for 2021/2022 construction season, subject to consultation with the community.
- Installation of additional lights on Helenslee Road to be completed by June 2021.

Design for all other upgrades will be completed in 2021/2022 financial year, these projects include:

- Pokeno Road Culvert/bridge
- Munro Road bridge
- Munro Road Intersection with Pokeno Road
- Munro Road Widening
- Intersection of Pokeno Road and Great South Road upgrade
- Reconfiguration of roading network to the east of Great South Road

Timing of all these projects is detailed in the LTP and all are planned for completion in first 5 years of LTP.
