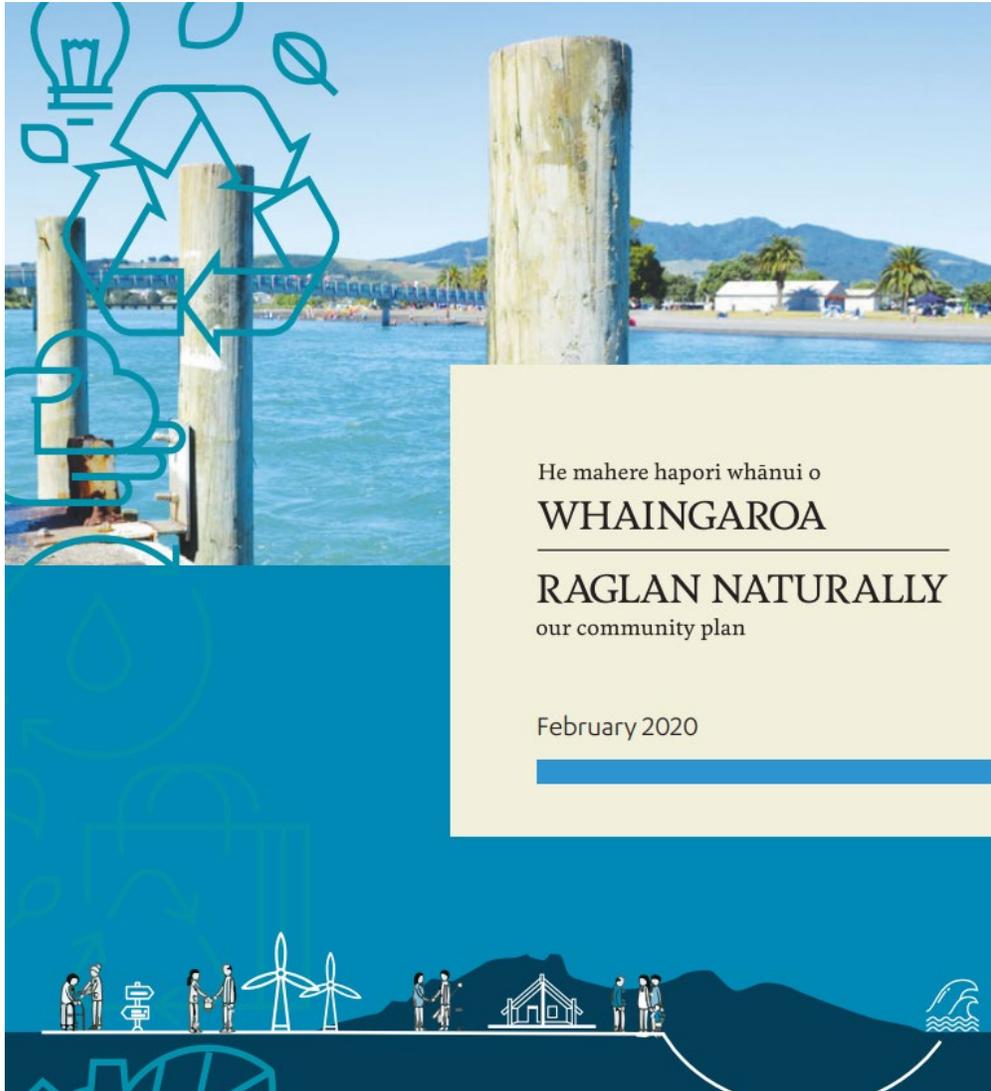


# Community Plans



- 17 communities
- Most completed 2004 – 2013 (sometimes a review of earlier version)
- Typically led by Community Board or Committee (with some Council assistance)
- Short (10-15 pages) with photos and graphics
- Standard content:
  - History and demographics
  - Issues and potential projects
  - Links to Community Outcomes
  - Clear statements that these are community plans, not Council plans
  - References to Council plans (LTCCPs, District Plans, Structure Plans)

# Community Plans: current status



- No new / revised ones on Council website since Huntly (2015) and Raglan Naturally (2020)
- 9 of 17 directly overlap with and potentially superseded by Local Area Blueprints (but not formally repealed)
- Others remain 'live' but increasingly dated
- Still a potentially useful source of community aspirations for areas without Local Area Blueprints, though community-led development (CLD) work is more recent

# Blueprints

- Districtwide Blueprint, plus Local Area Blueprints for 17 communities
- Initial 15 Developed 2018, approved 2019, 'check-in' 2020 and light review 2023
- Port Waikato and Gordonton added 2022
- Led by Council (staff and Elected Members) with significant consultant expertise
- Standard process: meetings with community boards / committees, local and districtwide community workshops. and staff sessions

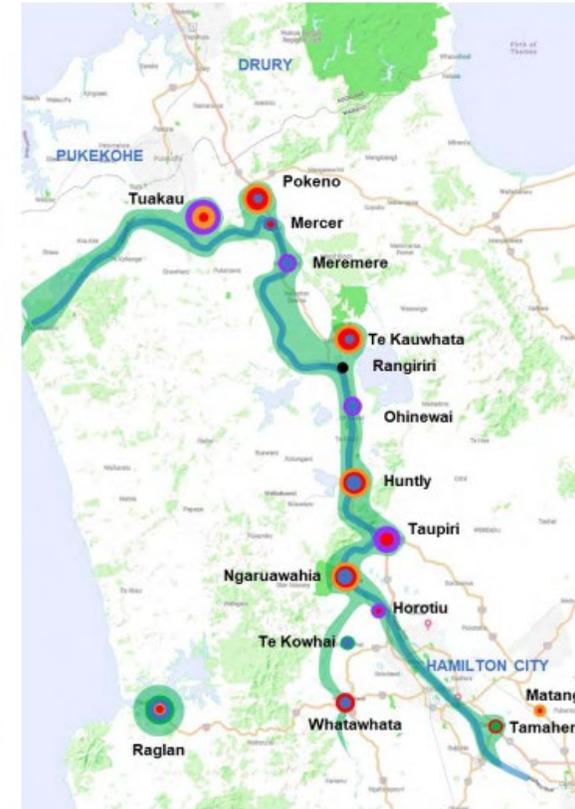

	PW4.2	Redevelop the <b>wharf area</b> : - Improve the layout of and opportunities for parking, while improving pedestrian safety - Work with the community to determine whether heritage status should be sought for the Yacht Club and support the restoration of this building if possible - Promote the development of the local services zone next to general store with a hospitality / commercial use	Very high	Council and Community
	PW4.3	Improve the trailer parking around the existing <b>second boat ramp</b> to encourage its use and relieve the pressure on the boat ramp in the wharf area	Very high	Council

- 60 pages for 17 Local Area Blueprints
- Format
  - Snapshot
  - Proposed Initiatives under 9 themes
  - Priority Levels for each initiative
  - Lead Entity (Council, Community, or Council / Community)

# Blueprints: Current Status



- Refreshed via survey of community boards / committees in mid-2023 (most had additional initiatives, clarifications, or revised priorities)
- Direct input to 2024 LTP considerations as with 2021 LTP, BUT:
  - ✓ Many not Council-led or influenced
  - ✓ Council funding constraints
  - ✓ Legislative or operational priorities may prevail over some Blueprint initiatives
  - ✓ Some face technical or timing hurdles
- Many initiatives not yet complete but in progress

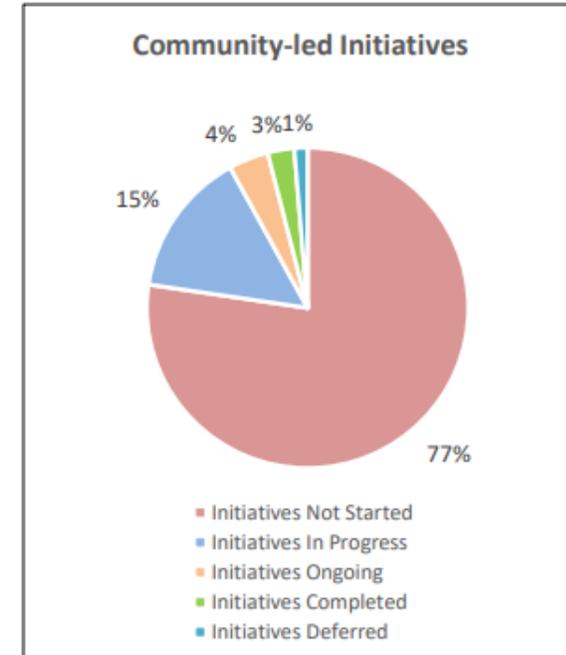
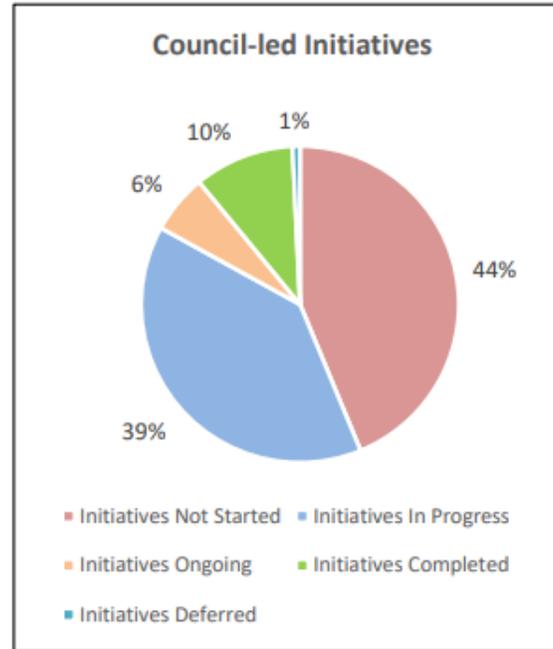
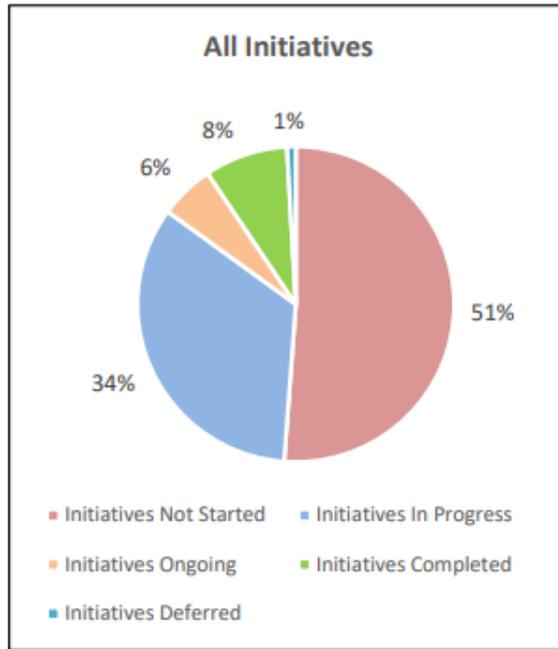
# Blueprints: Implementation Methods



- LTP is typical source of funding for Council-led initiatives (unless external sources e.g. Govt grants)
- Recently created Blueprint and Community Aspirations Fund can assist with some Community-led initiatives (upcoming slides)
- Community Led Development approach assists with advice, capacity-building etc even where no direct funding is provided (upcoming slides)

# Community Led Blueprints and aspirations



Project definition	Description	Requirements from Community	Our Value
Council led	The council has an action to achieve something and it must be delivered in a certain time and within a certain cost.	The Council would like feedback from the community about this project to seek understanding from community	The ECLD Team can possibly identify groups, business or individuals who should be aware of the project and should possibly be consulted with. ECLD can pass those names over to the project team. IAP 2 standards should be implemented.
Co Design	The Council would like to undertake a project whereby the community have a much larger say in the design or possibly delivery of a project	Input from the Community on features such as design or deliverables of service are required. A possible handover to the community of this project may also be in the thinking.	ECLD Team could identify groups, businesses or individuals that could participate in the co-design and also support those groups manage future outputs from the project through capability building and connections with agencies
Community Led	When the community have an idea of a project that they would like to be realized. The project will require input from council (e.g. such as facilities etc)	The Community will be responsible for the project and its success and ongoing sustainability. The Council will be invited as a partner	The ECLD Team will work within the community, providing capability training and liaise with the right council staff to support on going project and involve wider agencies to contribute to the project

# The Funding Review, Creation of Community Aspirations and Blueprint Budget

The principles for funding, as presented in the earlier councillor workshop, are to be included in the new funding model. These principles are:

- Wider community benefit needing to be demonstrated for funding eligibility
- Supportive of seed funding and co-funding initiatives
- Achieving maximum productivity with minimum waste or administrative expense
- Needing to balance risk with opportunity carefully (in discussions of accountability requirements for funding recipients vs efficiency and trust)
- Supportive of match funding initiatives, where Council can leverage its funding commitment to attract additional investment
- Stronger demonstrated links to the Council vision for Liveable, Thriving and Connected Communities.
