TERMS OF REFERENCE

COUNCIL

Chairperson: Her Worship the Mayor

Deputy Chairperson: Deputy Mayor

Membership: The Mayor and all Councillors

Meeting frequency: Six weekly – or as required

Quorum: Half of the members (including vacancies)

Purpose

1. To provide leadership to, and advocacy on behalf of, the people of the Waikato District.

2. To define and represent the total communities' interests, ensuring ongoing community and economic development, the effective stewardship of existing assets, sustainable management of the environment, and the prudent management of the communities' financial resources.

Terms of Reference

The Council's terms of reference include the following powers which cannot be delegated to committees, subcommittees, officers or any other subordinate decision-making body:

- I. The power to make a rate.
- 2. The power to make a bylaw.
- 3. The power to borrow money, or purchase or dispose of assets, other than in accordance with the Long-Term Plan.
- 4. The power to adopt a Long-Term Plan, Annual Plan, or Annual Report.
- 5. The power to appoint a Chief Executive.
- 6. The power to adopt policies required to be adopted and consulted on under the Local Government Act 2002 in association with the Long-term Plan or developed for the purpose of the local governance statement, including the Council's Infrastructure Strategy.
- 7. The power to adopt a remuneration and employment policy.
- 8. The power to approve or amend the Council's Standing Orders.
- 9. The power to approve or amend the Code of Conduct for elected members, and consider any recommendations made in relation to a complaint lodged under the Code.
- 10. The power to appoint and discharge:
 - a. members (including chairpersons) of Council committees and subordinate decisionmaking bodies, subject to the Mayor's powers under section 41A Local Government Act 2002; and
 - b. elected member representatives on external organisations.
- 11. The power to establish a joint committee with another local authority or other public body and appoint elected members as representatives on such committees or bodies.
- 12. The power to make the final decision on a recommendation from the Ombudsman where it is proposed that Council not accept the Ombudsman's recommendation.
- 13. The power to approve or change the District Plan, or any part of that Plan, in accordance with the Resource Management Act 1991.

14. The power to amend or replace the delegations in Council's Delegations Register (except where expressly permitted in the Delegations Register).

To exercise the following powers and responsibilities of Council, which the Council chooses to retain:

- 1. To approve a proposed policy statement or plan under the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 2. To approve changes to boundaries of the District under the Resource Management Act 1991 or any other legislation.
- 3. In respect of District Plan decisions:
 - a. To appoint independent commissioners to a panel for hearings of a Proposed District Plan:
 - b. To approve the recommendation of hearings commissioners on a proposed plan, plan change or variation (including private plan change); and
 - c. To approve a proposed plan or a change to a district plan under Clause 17, Schedule 1 of the Resource Management Act 1991.
- 4. To adopt governance level strategies, plans and policies which advance Council's vision and strategic goals (e.g. Hamilton to Auckland rail), other than where expressly delegated to a committee.
- 5. To approve Council's recommendation to the Remuneration Authority for the remuneration of elected members.
- 6. To approve the Triennial Agreement.
- 7. To approve resolutions required to be made by a local authority under the Local Electoral Act 2001, including the appointment of an electoral officer and reviewing representation arrangements.
- 8. To approve any changes to the nature and delegations of any Council committees or subordinate-decision making bodies.
- 9. To approve the Local Governance Statement.
- To approve funding requests not allowed for within budgets, in accordance with Significance
 Engagement Policy parameters.
- 11. To approve any additional funding decisions required for the Watercare Services contract.
- 12. To approve development agreements as recommended by the Development Agreements Subcommittee where infrastructure is not allowed for within the Long Term Plan.
- 13. To receive six-monthly reports from each Community Board on its activities and projects.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE (CE) PERFORMANCE REVIEW POLICY GUIDELINES

21 February 2023

A. PERFORMANCE REVIEW PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the performance review of the CE are:

- 1. To provide the CE with formal feedback on their performance for the 12 month review period.
- 2. To provide guidance and support for the CE'S professional and personal development.
- 3. To enable structured review of the CE'S remuneration, in accordance with the CE's Remuneration Policy.

B. GUIDELINES

- 1. The CE's performance review process is to be facilitated by an independent HR Consultant appointed by the Council, in consultation with the CE, and in accordance with the CE's Performance Review (CEPR) Committee's Terms of Reference.
- 2. The timetable will be as follows:
 - June each year agree on performance expectations/KPIs for the next financial year;
 - September each year Review performance against the agreed KPIs for the previous year;
 - February each year undertake an Interim progress review against the agreed KPIs.
- 3. The CE will prepare in August, a summary report of their achievements for the previous 12 months, relative to the agreed KPIs outlined in their performance agreement. The CE will also complete the 12 month review column of the performance agreement.
- Both documents are then to be sent to the Chair, Deputy Chair and HR Consultant for their review at least one week before the scheduled performance review workshop meeting.
- 5. A meeting will then be held by the CEPR Committee to obtain their views on the CE's performance agreement review report. The CEPR Committee will formulate relevant questions for the CE on their report, primarily for clarification purposes.
- The CE will then be invited into the meeting to talk to their report, and to answer any questions from the CEPR Committee on their performance. The meeting will be facilitated by the HR Consultant.

- 7. Following this meeting with the CE, the CEPR Committee will finalise their assessment of the CE's performance and establish an overall rating of performance expectations met.
- 8. The CEPR Committee will then apply the CE's Remuneration Policy to establish if any adjustments are to be made to the level remuneration that the CE receives.
- 9. The CEPR Committee will prepare a report for Council outlining their overall assessment of the CE's performance for the review period.
- 10. The outcome of the CE's performance and remuneration review process will be confirmed in writing for the CE.
- 11. This policy is to be reviewed in February 2026.

WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCIL CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S (CE) REMUNERATION POLICY

21 February 2023

The Remuneration Policy is:

- 1. That the position be job evaluated by Strategic Pay remuneration consultants.
- 2. That Strategic Pay is used to provide remuneration benchmarking information.
- 3. That the market for remuneration benchmarking be the Local Government and Public Sectors.
- 4. That the remuneration policy line be the Market Median Base Salary.
- That the CE be positioned on the remuneration policy line to reflect their competency and experience (i.e., at a CE Performance Review (CEPR) Committee agreed percentage of the Base Salary Market Median), and to maintain their current base salary relativity to the market median.
- 6. That Strategic Pay provide an annual remuneration market report for the job sized position, based on their March Remuneration Survey, this being the closest remuneration data for the 1 July review date.
- 7. That the CE's annual Base Salary is adjusted by the percentage of market movement for the position reported by Strategic Pay annually based on the overall performance review ratings as determined by the CEPR Committee, effective from 1 July, in accordance with its Terms of Reference, as follows:

OVERALL PERFORMANCE ACHIEVEMENT RATING	% OF ANNUAL MARKET MOVEMENT FOR THE POSITION
90 – 100% Performance Expectations Met	100
70 – 90% Performance Expectations Met	75
< 70% Performance Expectations Met	0

- 8. If, in the opinion of CEPR Committee, with independent HR advice if necessary, the CE's performance is of a certain standard, or there is a strategic reason, it has the ability to increase the remuneration movement under special circumstances by resolution. The reason(s) for any movement is/are to be fully documented.
- 9. It is the intention of this policy is to ensure that the CE's remuneration is maintained at market relativity.
- 10. This policy is to be reviewed in February 2026.

1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To seek approval to amend the Infrastructure Committee road stopping resolution for Irish Road made on 02 February 2022 (Resolution INF2202/04).

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

In 2021 the landowner of 219 State Highway 2, requested Council stop an unformed section of Irish Road in Mangatawhiri which bisected their property (see attachment 1 for further detail).

This portion of road to be stopped has been historically fenced in and used as part of the adjacent landowner's property.


A resolution was made by the Infrastructure Committee on 02 February 2022 to stop this road and amalgamate the land with the landowners adjacent title. Council has been progressing the stopping process and is close to completion.

However, during recent discussions with the landowner it has become apparent that the resolution made an error.

The resolution states that the stopped road should be amalgamated with the adjacent land held in Record of Title NA35D/873, but the landowner throughout the process has requested amalgamation with NA34D/1218.

Council saw no reason why this error was made and has no issue amending this. There is no material change to the process or to Council, but it would be significant for the landowner.

Previous Resolution

<u>Proposed Road Stopping Irish Road, Mangatawhiri</u> Agenda Item 6.3

The report was received [INF2202/02 refers] and the General Manager Service Delivery spoke to the report. The following items were discussed:

- Had the Walking Access Commission been informed? Yes they had and they were comfortable with the proposal.
- Question raised whether the road was used for rallying? It was not as it was an unformed road on a farm.

- b. the section of land resulting from the road stopping action be transferred, at a price established by market valuation and to be within the Council Property Policy, for amalgamation with Allotment 11-14 Settlement of Pokeno (RTNA35D/873);
- c. the proceeds of sale be credited to the Property Proceeds Reserve; and
- d. the Chief Executive be delegated authority to execute all relevant documentation to give effect to this resolution.

<u>CARRIED</u> INF2202/04

- b. approves the portion of unformed Irish Road, Mangatawhiri, as shown marked Section A on SO51992 Plan of Road to be Stopped (attached to the staff report), be declared surplus to Council roading requirements, and be legally stopped in accordance with the Public Works Act 1981;

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

The property at 219 State Highway 2, Mangatawhiri is bisected by an unformed legal road that is adjacent to Irish Road.

This portion of unformed road has historically been fenced into, and utilised as part of the adjacent property, and has not otherwise been in public use.

The adjoining owner has requested that this portion of unformed road be legally stopped and transferred for amalgamation with the adjacent landholdings.

Throughout this process, the landowner asked for the stopped road to be amalgamated with title NA34D/1218. However, the report submitted for consideration by the Committee and resulting resolution (dated 02 February 2022) referred to NA35D/873.

Council is unaware why NA35D/873 was referred too instead of NA34D/1218 and presumes an error/oversight occurred. There are no apparent issues or concerns with amalgamating the land with NA34D/1218 instead.

There has been no change to the context or circumstances which could impact this stopping.

It is recommended that this amendment is progressed.

Discussion and analysisTaataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

Social

The road has no public use or connectivity to other roads/paths.

Economic

The sale of the road to the adjoining land owner will enable the better utilisation of the adjoining land as it would no longer be bisected by an unformed legal road.

Environmental

The stopping of this unformed legal road is not expected to have any physical change to the environment as the land is currently used a farmland and will continue for that purpose.

Culture

The portion of stopped road provides no cultural benefits.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

Staff have assessed that there are two reasonable and viable options for the Council and Infrastructure Committee to consider. This assessment reflects the level of significance (see paragraph 6.1). The options are set out below:

Option 1: Council approve the recommendations of this report

The recommendations of this report, if approved, will assist the applicant owner with the better utilisation of its land, and will allow the road stopping to be completed as requested by the landowner utilising the road stopping provisions within the Public Works Act 1981. While there are costs to Council throughout the road stopping process, all Councils costs are recovered and paid by the applicant. Furthermore, the applicant is required to pay for the section of land resulting from the road stopping action, at a price established by market valuation.

Option 1 is the recommended option.

Option 2: Council can decline the recommendations of this report. Council will still have resolution to stop the road but will not be able to amalgamate the road with title requested by the landowner. This has potential to impact the landowner.

Option 2 is not the recommended option.

Option 1 is the recommended option.

5.2 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

The costs are recovered from the Applicant as part of the road stopping process.

The Applicant, as the adjacent owner, has agreed to pay for the parcel of land that results from the road stopping action, and meet all associated costs including survey, valuation and legalisation fees.

The proceeds from the sale of the land are proposed to be held in the Property Proceeds Reserve to be applied to future land purchases.

5.3 Legal considerations

Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

The initial resolution approved the stopping of this road under the Public Works Act 1981 provisions. Section 116 of the Public Works Act enables roads to be stopped where adequate road access to other land adjoining the road is provided, or where the owners of other land adjoining the road or part of the road consent in writing to the stopping.

In this proposal the adjoining parcel has an alternate legal road frontage to Irish Road and is in the same ownership as parcels fronting both Irish Road and State Highway 2. The physical access to the adjoining properties remains unaffected.

Staff confirm that the staff recommendation complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements.

5.4 Strategy and policy considerations

Whaiwhakaaro whakamaaherehere kaupapa here

The report and recommendations are consistent with the Council's policies, plans and prior decisions and the road is proposed do be stopped in a manner consistent with the Decision Making Framework for Unformed Legal Roads and the Strategic Land Acquisition and Disposal Policy.

5.5 Maaori and cultural considerations

Whaiwhakaaro Maaori me oona tikanga

As there is no perceived impact on Maaori, no consultation with hapū or iwi has been completed in relation to the proposed road stopping.

5.6 Climate response and resilience considerations

Whaiwhakaaro-aa-tajao

The matters in this report have no known impact on climate change or resilience for the Council.

5.7 Risks

Tuuraru

The Overall Risk Profile is Low as determined by Council's Risk Profile Assessment Tool.

6. Significance and engagement assessment Aromatawai paahekoheko

6.1 Significance

Te Hiranga

The decisions and matters of this report are assessed as of low significance, in accordance with the Council's <u>Significance and Engagement Policy</u>.

6.2 Engagement

Te Whakatuutakitaki

The initial road stopping report/resolution (02 February 2022) engaged with the Walking Access Commission ("the Commission") but did not receive their comments in time for the report.

Recent discussions (February 2023) with the Commission identified that they have concerns about Council using the Public Works Act 1981 rather than the Local Government Act 1974.

This isn't a concern specific to this road stopping, it is a generic concern that the Commission holds for all road stoppings. Council is currently reaching out to LINZ separately to understand their expectations for which legislative process is appropriate.

It is advised that the Commissions concerns are managed outside of this historic process.

7. Next steps Ahu whakamua

The remaining steps for this road stopping (regardless of whether this resolution is approved) include:

- Working with Nicklin CE to seek LINZ approval for the survey plan of the road to be stopped.
- Engage with Align Services to publish the gazette and notify the stopped road.
- Engage with Lyfestyle Research to lift the stopped road land title.
- Draft a sale and purchase agreement.
 - o The land sale will be subject to amalgamation of the stopped road with the landowners adjacent land title and payment of process fees).

8. Confirmation of statutory compliance Te Whakatuuturutanga aa-ture

As required by the Local Government Act 2002, staff confirm the following:



Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

To inform the Infrastructure Committee of an application received requesting Council to stop a portion of unformed legal road.

AND

To seek approval for Infrastructure Committee to make the necessary recommendation to Council.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

The property at 219 State Highway 2, Mangatawhiri is bisected by an unformed legal road that is adjacent to Irish Road.

This portion of unformed road has historically been fenced into, and utilised as part of the adjacent property, and has not otherwise been in public use.

The adjoining owner has requested that this portion of unformed road be legally stopped and transferred for amalgamation with the adjacent landholdings.

This report makes a number of recommendations, which if approved, will enable the unformed road to be stopped utilising the Public Works Act 1981 road stopping provisions and the stopped road to be transferred (at a price established by market valuation and to be within the Council Property Policy) for amalgamation with the adjacent landholdings, currently held in Record of Title NA35D/873. The road stopping will assist the applicant with the future operations and development of their land.

The road stopping provisions within the Public Works Act 1981 do not require a road stopping action to be publicly notified, therefore public engagement has not taken place.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Infrastructure Committee recommends to the Council that:

- a. the portion of unformed Irish Road, Mangatawhiri, as shown marked Section A on SO51992 Plan of Road to be Stopped attached to the staff report be declared surplus to Council roading requirements, and be legally stopped in accordance with the Public Works Act 1981;
- b. the section of land resulting from the road stopping action be transferred, at a price established by market valuation and to be within the Council Property Policy, for amalgamation with Allotment 11-14 Settlement of Pokeno (RT NA35D/873);
- c. the proceeds of sale be credited to the Property Proceeds Reserve;
- d. the Chief Executive be delegated authority to execute all relevant documentation to give effect to this resolution;

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

The Council has been asked by an adjacent landowner for the portion of unformed legal road that runs into their property to be stopped and sold to them. The portion of unformed road to be stopped is shown on the attached aerial plan, Attachment 1. The Survey plan of the Road to be stopped is shown as Attachment 2.

The applicant is the owner of the property situated at 219 State Highway 2 Mangatawhiri, being the parcels on both sides of the unformed legal road.

The parcels of land that form this adjacent property are held in the same ownership and legally described as Allotment 11-14 Settlement of Pokeno held in Record of Title NA35D/873 (Attachment 3) which is comprised of 16.1874 hectares more or less and Lot 1 Deposited Plan 78984 held in Record of Title NA34D/1218 (Attachment 4) which is comprised of 8981 square metres more or less.

This property is bi-sected by an unformed legal road. The portion of unformed road that is proposed to be stopped, has been fenced into, and utilised as part of the adjacent property. This unformed road has not otherwise been in public use; does not provide sole legal road frontage or physical access to any other property; it does not form part of the Council maintained roading network.

The section of unformed road that is proposed to be stopped does not connect to another road as the adjoining parcel of land that was previously an extension of this unformed road was stopped in 1992. This adjoining parcel has an alternative legal road frontage to Irish Road.

The Roading Team Leader has confirmed that this portion of unformed road is surplus to Council's current and future roading requirements.

There are no public utilities or services located within the portion of road that is proposed to be stopped.

Discussion and analysisTaataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

Social

The portion of unformed legal road that is proposed to be stopped, does not currently provide any social benefits to the community. It is not used by the public and does not link to any other road.

Economic

The sale of the paper road to the adjoining owner will enable the better utilisation of the adjoining land as it would no longer be bisected by an unformed legal road.

Environmental

The stopping of this unformed legal road is not expected to have any physical change to the immediate environment as the land is currently used as farm land and will continue to be used for that purpose.

Culture

The portion of road to be stopped currently provides no cultural benefits.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

Staff have assessed that there are two reasonable and viable options for the Infrastructure Committee and Council to consider. This assessment reflects the level of significance (see paragraph 6.1). The options are set out below:

Option 1: Council approve the recommendations of this report

The recommendations of this report, if approved, will assist the applicant owner with the better utilisation of its land, and will allow the road stopping to be completed utilising the road stopping provisions within the Public Works Act 1981.

While there are costs to Council throughout the road stopping process, all Councils costs are recovered and paid by the applicant. Furthermore, the applicant is required to pay for the section of land resulting from the road stopping action, at a price established by market valuation.

Option 1 is the recommended option.

Option 2: Council can decline the recommendations of this report.

The road will remain as unformed legal road there is no need or intention to form it for the foreseeable future as alternative legal and physical access is provided to the adjoining land. No costs involved for Council or the applicant (except any costs the applicant may have already incurred by engaging other services).

Option 2 is not the recommended option.

Option 1 is the recommended option.

5.2 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

The costs are recovered from the Applicant as part of the road stopping process.

The Applicant, as the adjacent owner, has agreed to pay for the parcel of land that results from the road stopping action, and meet all associated costs including survey, valuation and legalisation fees.

The proceeds from the sale of the land are proposed to be held in the Property Proceeds Reserve to be applied to future land purchases.

5.3 Legal considerations

Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

Council must follow the correct legal framework to process a road stopping application. Applications are considered under either the Public Works Act 1981, or under the Local Government Act 1974.

Section 116 of the Public Works Act 1981 enables roads to be stopped where adequate road access to land adjoining the road is provided or the owners of the land adjoining provide written consent to the stopping

In this proposal the adjoining parcel has an alternate legal road frontage to Irish Road and is in the same ownership as parcels fronting both Irish Road and State Highway 2. The physical access to the adjoining properties remains unaffected.

AND

Staff confirm that the staff recommendation complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements.







1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To seek approval to rescind the Infrastructure Committee resolution made on 02 February 2022 (Resolution INF2202/09) and recommending a replacement resolution by Council.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

In February 2022 the Infrastructure Committee approved a variation to the Waikato District Alliance programme for Huntly footpath renewals (refer Attachment 1).

As the contract variation was changing budgets that were not previously within the Long-Term Plan the resolutions should have been forwarded to Council for ratification, which had not been done.

Further to this, when estimates were received the contract variation was noted to be \$1.6million rather than \$1.4 million, therefore we need to seek Council approval to rescind the previous resolution of the Infrastructure Committee and approve the total variation of \$1.6million.

The contractor has recently commenced the work and the additional funding will enable them to fully complete the project rather than partially completing the footpath renewal. The entire \$1.6million is 100% subsidised by Waka Kotahi.

Previous Resolution

WDA Variation for Huntly Renewals Programme 2021/22 PEX Agenda Item 2.1

The report was received [INF2202/02 refers] and the Asset Manager spoke to the report. The following items were discussed:

- This was not the Huntly revocation programme. The revocation process had some capital work improvements that needed to be progressed. This report looks at the renewals programme that will have 100% funding from Waka Kotahi.
- What work had been given up for this work? The variation can be accommodated and did not interfere with other work from the Waikato District Alliance. Downer had a lot of the capacity to prioritise Council's work.

Infrastructure Committee WDA Variation for Huntly Renewals Programme 2021/22

1. Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

The purpose of the report is to seek approval from the Infrastructure Committee for a variation to the Waikato District Alliance to carry out the Huntly renewals programme which is 100% funded by Waka Kotahi.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

Council staff have been working with Waka Kotahi on the revocation of State Highway 1 through Huntly over the past 18 months. As part of the revocation project a Memorandum of Understanding has been signed that provides funding for Waikato District Council to deliver the required renewals over the next 3 years including some of this work taking place prior to the official handover of the road from Waka Kotahi. The funding is at 100% FAR.

Council staff have provided justification to Waka Kotahi to fund up to \$1.4M for a 1.4km section of the road to be rehabilitated this financial year (2021/22), with works programmed to commence mid-February 2022. It is recommended that a variation to the Waikato District Alliance is approved to deliver the required renewals works on the basis that it provides council with a cost (and time) advantage to do so.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Infrastructure Committee:

- a. Approves the variation up to \$1.4M to the Waikato District Alliance to carry out the pavement rehabilitation project in Huntly that is 100% funded by Waka Kotahi.
- b. And Further that a budget is established for the Waikato District Alliance at the 100% Financial Assistance Rate associated with the three-year funding of the renewals for Huntly.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

Council has been working with Waka Kotahi over the past 18 months on the revocation of SH1 through Huntly. As part of this process, Waka Kotahi has available funding on a year by year basis for this current 2021 – 24 LTP period for renewals along the stretch of (to be) revocated road from Fisher Road in the north to the Taupiri interchange in the south. The Financial Assistance Rate (FAR) from Waka Kotahi for this renewals programme is 100%.

Renewals works include, pavement rehabilitation and surfacing works (chip seal or AC). Maintenance is not included in the available funding.

An MOU was drafted late last year between Waka Kotahi and Council to outline the available funding and the terms of its use. The MOU (now signed) includes that maintenance and renewals will be the responsibility of Waikato District Council in the interim whilst the revocation is being finalised. The official handover will occur when the revocation of the Old SH1 section is completed and gazetted at which point Waikato District Council will be the Road Controlling Authority of this section of roading network.

Council was provided the Waka Kotahi forward works programme and was able to undertake drive overs and inspections with regards to suitability of site selection and timing of the renewal intervention. The works undertaken by the Alliance was then presented to Waka Kotahi in December as Councils justification for the available funding in 2021/22, as well as the intended programme for 2022/23 and 2023/24. Any works after these dates would be included in Councils next LTP and funded at the normal FAR of 52%.

The basis of the MOU is that Council procures the works of the agreed programme rather than Waka Kotahi delivering the programme. This de-risks Council as the tendency is for Waka Kotahi to instruct a "do minimum" approach which leaves a legacy maintenance burden further down the line for Council and typically requires earlier intervention than it would otherwise arise under our asset management approach.

This approach provides Council the best ability to manage the programme and deliver a whole of life approach. However, as these works are outside the TCE and over \$1M a variation is required to be approved. The available funding over the next three years is as follows:

WAKA KOTA	HI FUNDING	WDC PROPOSED FUNDING
2021/2022	\$1.142M	\$1.4M
2022/2023	\$1.715M	\$1.417M
2023/24	\$0.417M	\$0.418M

The site selected and put forward for justification for funding to Waka Kotahi is known as Boaties Reserve, is 1.4km long from Bell Crossing heading north. The initial estimate from WDA is \$1.4M, however this is still being refined. Works have been programmed to commence in mid-February (pending approvals).

The discussion with Waka Kotahi regarding this estimate over the available funding raised whether or not further funding was available. The short answer was no.

Any over budget risk currently sits with Council and would be taken from the 2022/23 available budget. It is important to note that the funding outlined from the forward works programme generated by the Alliance requires less than the available funding in Year 2 of the programme. Given Council is being funded at 100% and at this time within the available funding from Waka Kotahi over the three years, any risk is considered low.

Staff have received confirmation from Waka Kotahi that the renewals programme funding has been approved.

It is important to note at this time the wider business case project that Council staff worked through with Waka Kotahi. This aspect of the revocation project which includes approximately \$10M of capital funding has not been finalised as yet and staff continue to work with Waka Kotahi to finalise. A Funding Agreement has been drafted by Waka Kotahi and Council staff are awaiting a final draft to carry out internal reviews.

Discussion and analysisTaataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

The purpose of the report is to seek approval to provide the Waikato District Alliance a variation to carry out renewals work in Huntly on the old State Highway 1 (to be revocated) funded 100% by Waka Kotahi.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

No other options are proposed for Council to consider. Variations to the WDA contract are permitted via Council resolution (WDC1706/23 and WDC2809/24) whereby Council has allowed a further 10% in contract variations (\$3M per annum) to be actioned where work is no more than \$1M per variation, and it could be shown that using the WDA will benefit the Council in terms of competitive pricing and reduction in administrative costs. This facility was approved in recognition of its ability to expedite efficient commissioning and delivery of other significant Service Delivery work programmes and where scope aligned to the type of work already undertaken by the WDA; and at a cost advantage i.e. variations are charged as actual cost plus profit only, with no overhead applied as it utilises existing resources within the WDA. Additional large scale projects have been delivered by the WDA via separate Council approvals, a recent example being the Mangawara Bridge project.

5.2 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

With a signed MOU, Waka Kotahi upon approval will make available funding at 100% Financial Assistance Rate (FAR) to Council to complete the desired forward works programme for the section of road outlined in this report. The funding is only to be used on this section of road.

There is no specific budget allocated to the Waikato District Alliance for this works and it is recommended that a budget item be established within the Roading budget at the 100% FAR.

5.3 Legal considerations

Purpose of the report Te Take moo te puurongo

To inform the Council of a successful application to the Tourism Infrastructure Fund to deliver the Raglan Town 2 Surf Shared Path project.

AND

To seek approval to increase the budget for this project by \$965,000, being 100% subsidised by the Ministry of Business, Innovations and Employment through Tourism Infrastructure Funds.

AND

To seek approval to award this work to the Waikato District Alliance.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

In Budget 2017, the Government established the Tourism Infrastructure Fund (TIF), providing \$25 million per year for the development of tourism-related public infrastructure.

The purpose of the TIF is to provide financial support for local tourism-related infrastructure where tourism growth (domestic and international) is placing pressure on, or potential growth is constrained by, existing infrastructure and where the local community is unable to respond in a timely way without assistance.

The TIF Panel, appointed by the Minister of Tourism, is responsible for assessing the eligible applications. The Panel recommends to the Minister of Tourism a package of projects that best contribute to the TIF objectives and align with the Minister's Priorities Statement.

In March 2022, Council applied for TIF Funding to support the Raglan Town 2 Surf Shared Path project. In October 2022, staff were advised that this application was approved by the Minister of Tourism and provided \$965,000 to support the project.

This funding allows Waikato District Council to deliver the final two sections of this project between the Raglan township and Wainui Reserve and Ngarunui Reserve, via the Poihākena Marae.

As this funding increases the capital works programme for the current year, Council approval is required despite having no financial implications on ratepayers.

Staff are also seeking approval to award this work to the Waikato District Alliance as they have already been engaged to undertake the previous portions of this project.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Council approves:

- a. a budget increase of \$965,000 to 8UF70583-CO-OOOO-O922 which is 100% externally subsidised by MBIE as per the TIF Funding Agreement.
- as a variation under contract 14/314, the final two sections of the Raglan Town
 2 Surf Shared Project, be awarded to the Waikato District Alliance.
- c. the variation sum of \$965,000 to the Waikato District Alliance contract.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

Tourism is hugely important to the New Zealand economy, and quality infrastructure and facilities help to ensure New Zealanders can continue to enjoy their own spaces - whether they are at home or visiting other parts of the country. The Tourism Infrastructure Fund supports local communities facing pressure from tourism growth and in need of assistance - areas with high visitor numbers but small ratepayer bases, for example.

The fund aims to protect and enhance New Zealand's reputation both domestically and internationally. Supporting robust infrastructure contributes to quality experiences for visitors and maintains the social licence for the sector to operate.

In March 2022, Council applied for \$965,000 to support an existing project to connect Raglan town centre to Wainui and Ngarunui Reserve via Poihākena Marae with a cycle and pedestrian path. The existing project was fully funded by local share through the Roading District Wide Development Contributions and is not subsidised by Waka Kotahi.

In October 2022, staff were advised that the funding application was successful, and the funding agreement was signed in December 2022. This additional fund allows for the final two stages of the project which are:

- Section 6 Rockit Kitchen to Poihākena Marae Construction
- Section 8 West of Karakare Ave to Raglan West Shops

5. Discussion and analysisTaataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

The scoping, planning and design phases of the projects identified in the TIF Funding application are complete and physical works can commence. The initial stages of this project have been awarded to the Waikato District Alliance (WDA) and to provide efficiencies and continuity, staff are requesting approval to award this additional work to them as well.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

- **Option 1:** (**Recommended Option**): To approve the recommendations of this report which will result in an increase to budget line 8UF70583-CO-OOOO-O922 and award the completion of the Raglan Town 2 Surf footpath project to the WDA. This will have no financial impact on ratepayers and enable the project to be completed in the most efficient way.
- **Option 2:** Do not support the recommendations of this report. This will make project reporting difficult as the available funds will not be accurately reflected in the budgets. It will also make completion less efficient and could delay the completion of the project.

Staff recommend Option 1 because it achieves a practical positive solution to delivery of this project.

5.2 Financial considerations

As this project is funded through TIF, there are no material financial considerations associated with the recommendations of this report. It is anticipated that a supplementary report will be required in the future to review the Approved Contract Sum of contract 14/314.

5.3 Legal considerations

1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To seek approval to access funds from the Disaster Recovery Fund to provide local share for Waka Kotahi subsidised emergency works funding. This is in response to damage incurred to roading assets due to two major storm events in February 2023.

Approval is also sought for additional Roading Replacement funding to maximise Waka Kotahi approved subsidies and undertake urgent works in the current financial year.

2. Executive summary Whakaraapopototanga matua

Due to two consecutive major storm events in February 2023, Waikato District Council has incurred significant damage to Roading assets across the district. Staff are still undertaking assessments of the network and are unable to provide a definitive cost of this repair work, but early indications estimate the cost of repair will be in excess of \$8,000,000. Waka Kotahi Emergency Works Funding is available but requires local share to support the application.

In the current Long Term Plan (LTP), there is Emergency Works budget which can be utilised for this purpose but this is limited. Staff propose to exhaust this budget and are seeking approval for additional funding from the Waikato District Council Disaster Recovery fund to provide local share.

In addition to this, there is an opportunity to maximise the total approved Waka Kotahi subsidised budget for the 2022/2023 financial year. Staff have identified urgent works that should be completed and are therefore requesting additional funds from the Roading Replacement Fund to support this work.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Waikato District Council:

- a. approves additional local share funding for Financial Year 2022/23 of \$786,900, funded from the Disaster Recovery Fund;
- b. approves additional local share funding for Financial Year 2023/24 up to the capacity of the Disaster Recovery Fund;
- c. acknowledges that further local share funding will be required in Financial Year 2023/24 to complete the work resulting from the Feb 2023 events. Funding solutions will be explored and requested by Council in a further report;
- approves additional local share funding from the roading replacement fund of \$1,219,500 for the 2022/2023 Financial Year to allow urgent additional works to be completed;
- e. approves that a proportion of the Emergency Response Work (total value estimate \$8,000,000) be awarded to the Waikato District Alliance Contract 14/314 to cover ongoing initial response and slip repair works, and with the balance to be put to market; and
- f. approves that the additional Urgent Work be awarded to the Waikato District Alliance Contract 14/314, up to the value of \$1,500,000.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

In February 2023, two major cyclones, Hale and Gabrielle, struck New Zealand and caused substantial damage to the WDC roading network as well as other assets throughout the district. To support recovery from disasters such as this, Waka Kotahi has funding available through the National Land Transport Fund (NTLF). This can be utilised when customers levels of transport service is reduced, or will reduce, below those that existed prior to the event and results in unforeseen, significant expenditure.

WDC, in conjunction with the Waikato District Alliance (WDA) and Waka Kotahi, have undertaken initial assessments of the network and are preparing two applications for funding support to undertake the required repairs. This is in response to each storm event.

To support these funding applications, WDC are required to provide local share. This share is calculated at the usual Funding Assistance Rate (FAR) of 51% up to 10% of the total cost of WDC's maintenance programme. If emergency works claims are higher than this threshold, the FAR increases to 71%.

For example -

- Waikato District Council's approved maintenance programme for FY2023 is \$36.5 million.
- the normal FAR is 51%.
- its cumulative claim (estimate) for emergency works for 2023 is \$4,000,000
- the FAR for the first \$3,650,000 (10% of \$36.5 million) will be 51%
- the FAR for the remaining \$350,000 above 10% will be 71%.

Through the LTP, budget was allocated to support Emergency Works and equates to \$1,394,082 in the current year 2022/2023 (including unspent carry forwards) and \$849,544 in year three 2023/2024. These budgets have FAR of 51% applied to them.

In addition to the Emergency Works response, repairs and funding applications, staff have also identified urgent works which are required to meet the network needs. By completing this work in the current financial year, the total approved NZTA subsidy will be maximised.

Discussion and analysisTaataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

The assessment of damage to the roading network is currently underway and is being completed by WDC, WDA and Waka Kotahi staff. All information is being recorded in into our Roading Asset Management System (RAMM). The initial estimate for cost of repairs for the two events is in excess of \$8,000,000 (final figures are yet to be confirmed).

Once funding is approved by both Council and Waka Kotahi, staff are seeking approval for a proportion of this work to be awarded to WDA through a variation to the existing District Wide Network Management Alliance Contract - 14/314 - this is to cover initial response costs incurred of approximately \$1.5m and for ongoing slip repair works. The balance relates to major repair works and is expected to be put to market in accordance with Waka Kotahi procurement requirements.

WDC staff are currently collating information for two applications for Cyclone hale and Cyclone Gabrielle to Waka Kotahi to secure emergency works funding. These applications include funding for initial response (clean up), on-going works and future/further work requirements (these are subject to change) on our roading network.

To secure Waka Kotahi emergency funds, we need to obtain local share to support these and are seeking approval for each application. Detailed assessments are still in progress but to allow applications to progress, estimates are currently being utilised. This methodology is accepted by Waka Kotahi and more accurate details will be provided to Council once costings are confirmed.

Emergency works First application - Cyclone Hale/ Auckland Anniversary storm

The rough order estimate is **\$3,000,000** total gross cost which will require local share of **\$1,470,000** based on Waka Kotahi FAR rates as per above.

The additional local share required over and above already approved in the LTP 2021-2031 is \$786,900. The recommended funding solution is to use the Disaster Recovery Fund.

Emergency works Second application – Cyclone Gabrielle

The rough order estimate is **\$5,000,000** total gross cost which requires local share of **\$2,159,079** as per above FAR rates.

The additional local share over and above already approved in the LTP 2021-2031 is \$1,742,803. The recommended funding solution is to use the Disaster Recovery Fund to its full capacity. The additional funding for this event will not be required until FY2024.

The Roading team are mindful of our existing programmes, budgets, delivery, and available resources. Therefore, the anticipated timing of this expenditure is \$3,000,000 in FY22/23 and \$5,000,000 in FY23/24.

ADDITIONAL URGENT ROADING WORKS

Additional urgent Roading works are required to respond to the network needs and to maximise the total approved Waka Kotahi subsidised budget for the 2022/2023 financial year. Additional local share funding from the Roading replacement fund is required as per below:

The Roading replacement fund is a reserve where depreciation accumulates to fund the renewal of existing Roading assets at the end of their useful lives.

The Roading Replacement Fund is in surplus and can accommodate the additional funding requested.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

Option 1 (**Recommended Option**): To approve the recommendations of this report which will allow staff to progress with funding applications to Waka Kotahi to allow for much needed works to be completed on the network. It also provides approval to partner with the Waikato District Alliance to deliver both the emergency response work and the urgent work; as well as commence market approach for the balance of works

Option 2: Do not support the recommendations of this report. This will limit the capacity of WDC to respond to the damage caused to the roading network and will provide a sub optimal solution to residents and users of these assets.

Staff recommend Option 1 because it achieves a practical positive solution to delivery of this project.
