TERMS OF REFERENCE

PŌKENO COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

Chairperson:	Allen Grainger

Membership:	Two Ward Councillors (Vern Reeve and Fabio Rodrigues) Ten community representatives (Ginny Bullock, Lynda Spicer, Janet Baillie, Sarah Baker, Rick Barber, Helen Clotworthy, Bronwyn Heath, Dhanak Humayn, Jay Singh)
Meeting frequency:	Six weekly
Quorum:	Half of the members if even or + 1

It is noted that the community committee terms of reference (TOR) are being reviewed at present and are likely to be revised again, as part of the representation review, in early 2027. In the interim these TOR apply to the four community committees listed on page 51.

Election and election process

1. Members of community committees shall be elected on a three-year cycle, following the local body elections and after the establishment of a governance structure with TOR.
2. Elections shall be held by public meeting conducted by the chief executive of Council or their nominee, at which candidates will be nominated and elected (the elections meeting). The elections meeting shall be conducted in a manner deemed appropriate by the chief executive.
3. Council will advertise the public meeting and call for nominations to the committee.
4. Any vacancies occurring during the term shall be filled as deemed appropriate by both Council and the committee. The committee may, by resolution, co-opt members to assist as required if the number of members does not exceed the maximum specified in paragraph 1 of the membership of community committee section (see below).
5. Council may assist in filling vacancies as appropriate.

Purpose

The Pōkeno Community Committee (the Community Committee) is set up by the Waikato

District Council (Council) to deal with local issues on behalf of Council in the township and surrounds of Pookeno.

Roles and delegations

The community committee's role shall be as follows:

1. Represent and act as an advocate for the interests of its community.
2. The consideration of and reporting on all matters referred by Council or any matter of interest or concern to the community committee.
3. Maintain an overview of services (e.g., road works, parks, recreational facilities, community activities, and traffic management) provided by Council within the community of Pookeno
4. The preparation of an annual submission to the budgetary process of the Waikato District Council for expenditure within the community of Pookeno
5. Communication with community organisations and special interest groups within the community of Pookeno
6. In the event that the committee that doesn't have specific discretionary funding to allocate, the committee can make an application to Council's Rural Ward Discretionary Fund for the funding of specific projects or events. These grants are available for projects and initiatives in rural areas and areas that are not served by a community board or other committee that receives discretionary funding.
7. To work with the elected hall committee to ensure the management and administration of halls within the Pookeno area.
8. Any other function and duties may be delegated from time to time to the community committee by Council.
 - o a. Pursuant to sch 7, cl 32(3) of the LGA, any sub-delegation of these responsibilities, duties and powers by community committee is hereby expressly prohibited.

Membership of community committee

1. The membership of the community committee shall consist of not fewer than three and no more than 12 elected members plus appointed member(s) from Council.
2. In line with representation reviews and any applicable Local Government Commission determinations, councillor(s) elected in the ward representing the community committee area shall be community committee members either by election or appointment.

3. The role of the appointed councillor(s) shall be the liaison link between Council and the community committee.
4. Community Committee members (of the four committees stated on page 51) are expected to act in accordance with Council's code of conduct and standing orders at all times. This includes the obligation to declare any actual, potential, or perceived conflicts of interest in relation to matters under consideration.

Chairperson

1. The community committee shall appoint a chairperson from within its membership.
2. The community committee shall appoint a deputy chairperson from within its membership.
3. The community committee shall appoint a secretary from within its membership.
4. For community committees with the delegation of discretionary funding, they will need to appoint a funding representative to work with council staff.

Meeting procedures

1. The community committee shall follow the general principles of the New Zealand Standards (NZS 9202:2003) Model Standing Orders including Amendment 1 for Meetings of Local Authorities and other public bodies.
2. Any variance to the standing orders can be decided by a simple majority vote of those members present at a meeting.
3. A quorum of members of the committee shall consist of no fewer than five members.
4. The committee will be responsible for completing, and submitting to Council's Democracy team, minutes for each committee meeting in accordance with guidance provided by Council.
5. Members of the public and external presenters (including Council staff) will be treated with respect and courtesy by committee members.
6. All councillors are entitled to attend community committee meetings and are granted 58 speaking rights on agenda items and general matters. Aside from those formally appointed as members of the committee, attending councillors do not hold voting rights.

Communication

1. The objective is to retain quality relationships between Council and the community

committee and the community committee and the public.

Responsibilities of Council

1. Council agrees to hold at least one combined workshop per annum, at which Council will participate with all community committees in discussing issues of mutual interest and clarification will be given on future Council direction.
2. Council may accept representations from the community committee at its ordinary meetings on issues of significance contained within the community board minutes.
3. Council employs the chief executive, and the chief executive employs all staff. The chief executive is accountable to Council, not to the community committee.

Winding-up of the committee

1. The committee may be wound up by resolution of Council in consultation with, or as a result of a request from the committee.

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident of Regina Street raised the question of speeding and burnouts on the road outside her home. She wants speed limits reduced. She also complained about the volume of traffic. The road is not designed for large trucks.

Complaints of similar behaviour on Avon Road/Fraser Road corner by cemetery, Hitchen Road, McIntosh Drive

Rick Barber advised that WDC is responsible for setting speed limits in conjunction with Waka Kotahi

Allen Grainger advised that since Community Constable Lorraine moved on, Pokeno has not had the level of police support which is required

Munro Road upgrade supposed to be completed 2024/25 has been put on hold for the time being due to budget constraints

New road markings to be done as soon as possible and Will Gauntlett agrees with public comments and will refer this to relevant department at Council for a speedy update

Bronwyn Heath asked that it be minuted that any abuse or misinformation said online about the PCC or personal unfair jabs be addressed by council or councillors to rectify the misinformation online and publically. Especially because the councillor knows who the aliases are and who the people who have put up the false information are and has knowledge of the misrepresentation. This makes the public distrust the PCC for the lies and misinformation that have been spread, Council or councillors need to rectify the false information online with the correct information or correct media releases so it can be attached to those pages making the false accusations

Gardens on Great South Road

A comment was made that these are extremely scruffy and no maintenance has been done in months. Allen Grainger advised that the larchwood trees had been removed as they were being damaged by traffic density, lack of soil depth and that carbon monoxide from trucks was killing them. A comment was made about the waste of ratepayers' money

A discussion was had about moving the trucks from the main street to use an alternative route via McDonald Road, Gateway Park Drive and Hitchen Road from/to SH1 which would reduce the trucks through the main street and remove the carbon monoxide issue. The roundabouts at Pokeno Road and at Gateway Park Drive/Hitchen Road are not really large enough for large and double trucks to negotiate safely. Truck stop operators are not in favour of this route change

Allen Grainger advised that he and a couple of people have cut back the overgrowth at the roundabout on the southbound exit of SH1 but more needs to be done and hopefully this will happen over the weekend. A question was raised by a member of the public regarding safety of these volunteers in traffic. Waka Kotahi only looks after land from the bridge and WDC and Auckland Council do not seem interested in taking responsibility.

Lynda advised that Menzshed are removing many bags of rubbish from the area at their own expense when this should be a council responsibility

Rubbish in the town centre is really bad with bins overflowing and it was determined that Higgins should look at installing more larger bins and that council should be emptying them daily (or more)

Community Patrol

Less Patrols than normal are taking place, owing to fact it is difficult to recruit volunteers.

The Paperwork required to become part of Patrol is quite large for people to complete.

The original Controller has moved out of Pokeno, and a replacement is being sourced.

More volunteers are required asap

COUNCILLOR'S REPORTS

Cr Fabio Rodrigues

Thank you for the opportunity to report back at our first committee meeting of the term. As a new Council, we are genuinely grateful for the trust our communities have placed in us. That trust comes with a clear expectation: put people first, spend wisely, and be transparent about how every dollar of rates is used. Across the district, we've heard consistently that affordability matters and that residents want a stronger voice in the decisions that affect them. Over the past few months, we've begun reshaping how Council works so that our structures, processes, and culture reflect those priorities.

We have already made several changes to strengthen governance and improve transparency. Council's committee structure has been reshaped to streamline decision-making, and a new Community Voice and Choice Committee has been established to strengthen how Council listens, partners, and responds to communities.

Public forums are now held ahead of major meetings, giving residents a clearer pathway to raise issues directly, and an online Community Voice Panel is being launched to make participation easier for those who cannot attend in person.

We also established a roading subcommittee to focus on the district's ongoing roading challenges, and more decisions are being delegated to community boards and ward committees, including road naming, leases, and non-rates-funded discretionary spending for small local projects.

Alongside these early changes, we are exploring further ways to involve communities earlier and more meaningfully in Council's work. This includes earlier engagement

before decisions are made, with tools such as citizen assemblies being considered for complex or high-impact issues.

We are also looking at holding Council meetings across the district, not just in Ngāruawāhia, where this can be done at no extra cost and with the right technical capability. Work is underway to determine how ward committees, community groups, marae, hall committees, and community boards could deliver minor capital projects that are already budgeted for. Initially, projects up to \$50,000 are being considered, ensuring the right projects are delivered at the right price, using local contractors and volunteers where appropriate, and reflecting community priorities more directly.

We have also begun early preparation for the next Long-Term Plan 2027–2037. Workshops this month will focus on reviewing our top-level community outcomes, which will guide the direction of the LTP. Following that, we will review our financial strategy, infrastructure strategy, levels of service, asset management, and work programmes. There will be opportunities for informal community involvement before the draft LTP is prepared for formal consultation early next year. In parallel, Council is reviewing the 2026–27 Annual Plan to ensure spending remains disciplined and aligned with community expectations.

Overall, the work to date reflects a clear shift toward a Council that is more transparent, more efficient, and more responsive to the communities it serves. The foundations are now in place for a more community-centred approach to decision-making and delivery, and we look forward to continuing this work with you over the coming months.

Capital Projects Update (as of 3 March 2026)

Roading

Project names found on provided Roading Projects Map and [Waikato District Council projects page](#) indicated in **blue**.

Helenslee Road Urban Upgrade ([Helenslee road minor improvements design](#))

The project to design this section of road to a “shovel ready” state with completed construction drawings and resource consents completed cannot progress further until additional budget is identified.

This project is being paused until funding can be confirmed to complete the stormwater design work.

Dean Road /Fraser Rd Roundabout ([Dean Road /Fraser Rd intersection upgrade design](#))

This project is to take the design to a “shovel ready” state until funding is available.

The intersection design is complete as is the separate footpath. Working through the footpath lighting design, and then Safe System Audit of the design and any minor changes needed to complete. The resource consenting to complete the shovel ready project.

Pokeno Road Urban Upgrade and Bridge Replacement ([RI POK Pokeno Road Traffic Bridge design](#))

Again this project is to take the design to a “shovel ready” state until funding is available.

The completed Pokeno Bridge to Munro Rd Urban upgrade is being amended to match into the existing Pokeno Road Bridge western abutment for construction next summer.

Also, we are designing the pedestrian bridge to enable the footpath link from Pokeno School through to Waikaha Rd residential development. If construction funding is confirmed, we will look to schedule construction for next summer also.

Pokeno Road / Munro Road Roundabout ([Pookeno Road / Munro Road - Intersection Upgrade - Roundabout design](#))

This project is to take the design to a “shovel ready” state until funding is available.

Counties Energy underground cables run under Munro Road and are proving to be an issue for all the Munro Road projects. Discussions are ongoing with Counties Energy on requirements and costing.

Munro Road Urban Upgrade and Culverts ([Huia road resilience improvements design](#))

The section of Munro Rd from the future roundabout on Pokeno Road through to Huia Rd intersection is in the detailed design phase, and is scheduled for construction starting around October 2026.

Munro Rd Bridge Replacement ([Pookeno Road Resilience - Road Upgrade from Bridge to Munro Road design](#))

This work is to provide “shovel ready” construction documents and resource consenting for the future replacement of the one-lane bridge on Munro Rd.

This project is also affected by the Counties Energy cables, and options are being developed to understand the options, costs and time implications, to then feed into the design of the replacement structure.

The funding timeline is unknown at this stage and dependant on Waka Kotahi funding approval.

Pookeno Sports Park, Munro Road

Playground & Amenities

- Destination playground concept design underway
- Survey expected to go live mid-march, the draft community consultation plan has been developed
- Community drop-in session was held on 17 February
- Mana whenua engagement is now complete
- Public Toilet Procurement has closed and is expected to be awarded in March
- Wastewater design has been commissioned
- Coordination with Munro Road project team is underway

Skatepark

- Concept design has been completed and supplied
- Cost estimate has been provided with a current shortfall of \$300-350k
- Skatepark location and connectivity is to be confirmed
- Consenting and service requirements are being progressed

Next Steps

- Review fundraising options for skate park
- Confirmation of power supply option
- Provide playground concept design for review in late March
- Finalise procurement plan/ approach for physical works or playground and amenities

Key Issues

- Additional funding for skatepark, understand funding pathways and requirements
- Interdependencies with Munro Road Upgrade

CCTV Cameras


There is no set completion date for CCTV install. It remains at the end of March. The date is dependent on the installation of services.

Market Street Hub

Staff are working through the moderation of the Enabling Works package with the aim to awards works by mid-March. The full build tender has been partially completed, and the contractor is expected to be awarded by mid-May.


Waikato District Council Roading Maintenance Boundary SH1

The below map shows the roading maintenance boundaries of State Highway 1.

All areas outlined in red, along with the Pōkeno Service Centre northbound on-ramp (shown in both blue and red), fall under the maintenance responsibility of NZTA Waka Kotahi as part of State Highway 1.

The areas highlighted in blue (Nikau Road and Razorback Road) are maintained by Waikato District Council.
