The project is going ahead. The purchase of the Mitsubishi ute has been organised and has now been paid for on the 19th May 2021. Fire and Emergency NZ purchased it on our behalf so we could take advantage of their purchasing power and we paid FENZ the purchase price.

The Ute is due for delivery at the end of June (all things going well). It has been booked into the canopy company for the canopy and other fittings as soon as delivery has happened. We expect it to be ready within a couple of weeks of canopy fitting and signwriting.

Te Kauwhata Community Patrol have purchased a replacement patrol vehicle.

It is a 2019 Silver Toyota Corolla GX Hybrid . LWU562 with 16,500kms on the clock.

The vehicle is currently at the signwriters following which it will have new lightbars installed. The lightbars are bespoke to comply with CPNZ standards and are ordered from Australia. This requires a two-week lead time plus shipping. On arrival the lightbar, in conjunction with the police radio equipment, will be fitted by police registered fitters.

We expect to take delivery of the new vehicle in the next 3-4 weeks at which stage we will be in touch to arrange publicity.

How the funding received was spent It was spent on upgrading the WEL Networks power connection to the Raglan Old School Arts Centre. WEL Networks installed an underground cable to a three phase 100 amp rated pillar on the street boundary. Local contractors installed the new underground cable in a trench to the new meter board. Meridian Energy moved the meters to the new meter board and the inspector connected them up.

Comment on the success of your project and describe the benefits to the community (Please provide photo documentation of project undertaken)

A second pottery kiln has been supplied and installed. It will be fired up for the first time this month allowing more clay art work to be created by adults and children.

Air Conditioning /Heat pumps for the 1st Community Room were installed late in 2020.

Now that the high capacity underground power cable is connected both kilns and heat pumps are able to be used. This is allowing more people and activities in the new Creative Space building.

(continued) In general the community need met was to provide additional general meeting space and local arts based recreational facilities for older people, women, and youth. As Raglan Whaingaroa has a large percentage of Māori in the population, Māori have also benefited. People using expanded facilities at the Arts Centre range from young children through to seniors. More women use the services than men.
It has been used for Māori rites of passage, drama rehearsals, youth drama school, yoga and similar activities.
The new building is beginning to serve well the community of Raglan Whaingaroa.

Waikato District Crime Prevention Technology Trust

The Waikato District Crime Prevention Technology Trust is pleased to showcase the 'star project' of the Huntly CCTV programme, completed late last year.

The programme saw intensive liaison between the Trust, Council staff and police to determine the hotspots where police felt the cameras would provide most benefit not only for better policing but also for the community of Huntly.

The project spanned three years and had more than its share of challenges. Because this was the first major town-wide project undertaken, most of that time was needed to line up the various players and work through funding and technical issues not considered at the outset. Once all those issues were resolved the installation was reasonably quick. In all, 19 cameras were installed over 8 locations (the Huntly rail cameras were a separate project not related to this funding source).

There were a number of lessons learned in this project including ensuring hardware compliant with NZ Police (due to security issues), the need for detailed design and a need for improved project and stakeholder planning.

There were also unforeseen costs where Security Guards were required to assist installation contractors in Huntly West, and full-blown State Highway level Traffic Management was required for Main Street camera install due to NZTA jurisdiction over that piece of road.

WEL Networks was a valuable partner in the project, and had input into redesign of their network as well as funding the installation of 'live' power poles because of the need for 24-hour power, not available on street lighting.

The Wellbeing Trust provided critical input to the project, and without this the project would not have happened. All up costs were around \$110,000 (including \$77,000 in planned costs and \$33,000 in unplanned costs, bearing in mind WDC and WEL Networks time were given freely in this instance. True cost for this project is estimated to be around \$200,000.

The Waikato District Crime Prevention Technology Trust thanks the Wellbeing Trust and also is very grateful not only to other funders who provided time and money, as mentioned above, but also to Waikato District Council staff who managed the project through to completion; in particular Paul McPherson and Niall McGrath.
